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Associations of "For trap" (30 Words)

bait	Lure entice or entrap with bait. <i>Many potential buyers are reluctant to take the bait.</i>
bound	Move forward by leaps and bounds. <i>Children bound for school.</i>
cavity	An empty space within a solid object. <i>The abdominal cavity.</i>
comb	An act of untangling or arranging the hair with comb. <i>They combed the area for the missing child.</i>
dint	A blow or stroke, typically one made with a weapon in fighting. <i>The soft dints at the top of a coconut.</i>
disentangle	Remove knots or tangles from (wool, rope, or hair). <i>It was difficult to disentangle fact from fiction.</i>
ensnare	Catch in or as if in a trap. <i>They were ensnared in city centre traffic.</i>
entrap	Trick (someone) into committing a crime in order to secure their prosecution. <i>He argued that his client had been entrapped by an undercover police officer.</i>
extricate	Free (someone or something) from a constraint or difficulty. <i>I cannot extricate myself from this task.</i>
hole	Hit the ball into the hole. <i>A fuel tank was holed by the attack and a fire started.</i>
lariat	A rope used as a lasso or for tethering.
lasso	Catch with a lasso. <i>At last his father lassoed the horse.</i>
loiter	Stand or wait around without apparent purpose. <i>The weather had tempted them to loiter along the banks of the Cherwell.</i>

lurk	(of an unpleasant quality) be present in a latent or barely discernible state, although still presenting a threat. <i>Danger lurks beneath the surface.</i>
obstacle	A thing that blocks one's way or prevents or hinders progress. <i>The poverty of a district is an obstacle to good education.</i>
peephole	A small hole that may be looked through, especially one in a door through which callers may be identified before the door is opened. <i>She was wearing a black peephole bra.</i>
perdition	Complete and utter ruin. <i>She used her last banknote to buy herself a square meal before perdition.</i>
pit	Sink in or contract so as to form a pit or hollow. <i>A bear pit.</i>
pitfall	A covered pit for use as a trap. <i>The pitfalls of buying goods at public auctions.</i>
shackle	Chain with shackles. <i>They seek to shackle the oil and gas companies by imposing new controls.</i>
snare	Catch a bird or mammal in a snare. <i>The car salesman had snared three potential customers.</i>
solve	Find an answer to, explanation for, or means of effectively dealing with (a problem or mystery). <i>Solve an equation.</i>
tied	(of a game or contest) with both or more competitors or teams achieving the same score. <i>A tied vote.</i>
trammel	A restraint that confines or restricts freedom (especially something used to tie down or restrain a prisoner). <i>We have no wish to be trammelled by convention.</i>
unearth	Find (something) in the ground by digging. <i>Workmen unearthed an ancient artillery shell.</i>
unknot	Become or cause to become undone by separating the fibers or threads of. <i>His shoulders unknotted.</i>
unravel	(of twisted, knitted or woven threads) become undone. <i>His painstaking diplomacy of the last eight months could quickly unravel.</i>
unscramble	Make intelligible. <i>Can you unscramble the message.</i>
untangle	Become or cause to become undone by separating the fibers or threads of. <i>Fishermen untangled their nets.</i>
