forestall Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time.

He would have spoken but David **forestall**ed him.

interdict Prohibit or forbid (something.

 $I\ have\ not\ been\ \textbf{interdict} ed\ from\ consuming\ alcoholic\ beverages.$

nix Put an end to; cancel.

Dad nixed our plans.

precludeKeep from happening or arising; make impossible.

The secret nature of his work **preclude**d official recognition.

prevent (of God) go before (someone) with spiritual guidance and help. The guards threatened to bar the gates to **prevent** him leaving.



prohibit (of a fact or situation) make (something) impossible; prevent.

All ivory trafficking between nations is **prohibit**ed.

Denounce or condemn.

proscribe Certain customary practices which the Catholic Church **proscribe**d such as

polygyny.

Exercise a veto against a decision or proposal.

I vetoed the idea of a holiday.
