Synonyms of "Forcibly" as an adverb (16 Words)

aggressively	In a manner resulting from or betraying aggression. <i>He resisted violently and continued to behave aggressively in the police car.</i>
by force	So as to pass a given point.
compulsorily	In a way that is required by law or a rule. <i>Every dog that is neutered is compulsorily vaccinated against rabies.</i>
dynamically	Used in relation to web pages that update frequently or are generated according to an individual's search terms. <i>This situation can change dynamically on the timescale of minutes.</i>

eagerly	Used to emphasize a strong desire to do or have something. <i>Original illustrations are eagerly sought by collectors.</i>
energetically	In an energetic manner. <i>He energetically pursued his business activities.</i>
forcefully	Using considerable physical strength or violence. <i>He forcefully shoved her back into the wall.</i>
heartily	In a hearty manner. <i>Yes the children chorused heartily.</i>
potently	In a manner having a powerful influence. <i>Clytemnestra's ghost crying in the night for vengeance remained most potently in the audience's mind.</i>
powerfully	In a manner having a powerful influence. <i>A powerfully moving human drama.</i>
strenuously	With great effort and determination. <i>She campaigned strenuously for cheaper fares.</i>
under coercion	Down to defeat, death, or ruin.
under compulsion	Down below.
under protest	Below the horizon.
vigorously	Forcefully. <i>He defended his ideas vigorously.</i>
zealously	With great energy or enthusiasm in pursuit of a cause or objective. <i>He laboured zealously for the promotion of education.</i>

Usage Examples of "Forcibly" as an adverb

- They argued forcibly against the proposal.
- No one will be forcibly evicted.

Associations of "Forcibly" (30 Words)

abduction	Moving of a body part away from the central axis of the body. <i>Abductions by armed men in plain clothes.</i>
blackmail	Money demanded by a person or group engaged in blackmail. <i>He had blackmailed her into sailing with him.</i>
captivity	The state of being a slave-Shakespeare. <i>So every bondman in his own hand bears the power to cancel his captivity.</i>

coercion	Using force to cause something to occur. <i>Our problem cannot be solved by any form of coercion but only by agreement.</i>
compel	Necessitate or exact. <i>His striking appearance compelled attention.</i>
<u>compelling</u>	Not able to be resisted; overwhelming. <i>There is compelling evidence that the recession is ending.</i>
<u>compulsion</u>	An urge to do or say something that might be better left undone or unsaid. <i>Her compulsion to wash her hands repeatedly.</i>
<u>compulsory</u>	Required by rule. <i>It was compulsory to attend mass.</i>
confinement	The act of restraining of a person's liberty by confining them. <i>He was immediately released from his confinement.</i>
<u>conscription</u>	Compulsory enlistment for state service, typically into the armed forces. <i>Conscription was extended to married men.</i>
constrain	Compel to behave in a certain way. <i>Duty constrains one to act often contrary to one's desires or inclinations.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i>The disarmament of the aggressor nations must be complete.</i>
dispossess	Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. <i>A champion of the poor and the dispossessed.</i>
<u>duress</u>	Compulsory force or threat. <i>Confessed under duress.</i>
enforced	Forced or compelled or put in force. <i>Enforced obedience.</i>
enslavement	The state of being a slave-Shakespeare. <i>The enslavement of millions of Africans.</i>
<u>fixation</u>	The process by which some plants and microorganisms assimilate nitrogen or carbon dioxide. <i>Fixation at the oral phase might result in dependence on others.</i>
force	Force into or from an action or state either physically or metaphorically. <i>She forced her diet fads on him.</i>
forced	Forced or compelled. <i>A forced landing.</i>
<u>imprisonment</u>	Putting someone in prison or in jail as lawful punishment. <i>The imprisonment of captured soldiers.</i>

mandatory	Required by law or mandate; compulsory. <i>Attendance is mandatory.</i>
<u>must</u>	Something that should not be overlooked or missed. <i>You must show your ID card.</i>
oblige	Bind by an obligation; cause to be indebted. <i>Obligate money.</i>
obligatory	Morally or legally constraining or binding. <i>He made all the obligatory apologies.</i>
<u>obsession</u>	An idea or thought that continually preoccupies or intrudes on a person's mind. <i>He was in the grip of an obsession he was powerless to resist.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the required female shape.</i>
sequester	Take legal possession of (assets) until a debt has been paid or other claims have been met. <i>In November 1956 the property was sequestered by the authorities.</i>
<u>servitude</u>	The subjection of property to an easement. <i>You ve got thousands of years of peasant servitude to make up for.</i>
