### Synonyms of "Forefront" as a noun (12 Words)

<b>cutting edge</b>	The activity of selecting the scenes to be shown and putting them together to create a film.
<b>fore</b>	The front part of something, especially a ship.
<b>foreground</b>	The part of a scene that is near the viewer. <i>The intricate garden depicted in the <b>foreground</b>.</i>
<b><u>front</u></b>	The part of a garment covering a person s front. <i>The CIA identified the company as a <b>front</b> for a terrorist group.</i>
<b>front line</b>	The immediate proximity of someone or something.

<b>head</b>	The pressure exerted by a head of water or by a confined body of steam. <i>Huge <b>heads</b> of fluffy cream flowers.</i>
<b>lead</b>	A position of being the initiator of something and an example that others will follow especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>She had the <b>lead</b> in a new film.</i>
<b>leading position</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b>position of prominence</b>	The role assigned to an individual player.
<b>spearhead</b>	The point of a spear. <i>She became the <b>spearhead</b> of a health education programme.</i>
<b>van</b>	A caravan. <i>A <b>van</b> driver.</i>
<b>vanguard</b>	The foremost part of an advancing army or naval force. <i>The experimental spirit of the modernist <b>vanguard</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Forefront" as a noun

- *He was in the forefront.*
- *The idea of motion was always to the forefront of his mind and central to his philosophy.*
- *The Cotswolds were once at the forefront of woollen manufacturing in England.*

## Associations of "Forefront" (30 Words)

<b>above</b>	At a higher level or layer. <i>See <b>above</b> left.</i>
<b>antecedence</b>	Preceding in time.
<b>apex</b>	The highest point in a plane or solid figure, relative to a base line or plane. <i>Melodic lines build up to the chorus and it <b>apexes</b> at the solo.</i>
<b>apical</b>	(of a consonant) formed with the tip of the tongue at or near the front teeth or the alveolar ridge, for example th or trilled r.
<b>best</b>	The person who is most outstanding or excellent; someone who tops all others. <i>He brought out the <b>best</b> in people.</i>

<b>chief</b>	Most important element. <i>A union <b>chief</b>.</i>
<b>first</b>	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>His <b>first</b> political race.</i>
<b>fore</b>	Situated at or toward the bow of a vessel. <i>The <b>fore</b> and hind pairs of wings.</i>
<b><u>foremost</u></b>	Before anything else in rank, importance, or position; in the first place. <i>He put his best foot <b>foremost</b>.</i>
<b><u>forward</u></b>	Toward the future forward in time. <i>I am not usually a <b>forward</b> sort of person.</i>
<b><u>front</u></b>	The part of a garment covering a person's front. <i>He led the national liberation <b>front</b>.</i>
<b>head</b>	The head regarded as the location of intellect, imagination, and memory. <i><b>Head</b> towards the town centre until the road takes a sharp right.</i>
<b>heyday</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its <b>heyday</b> in 1964.</i>
<b>leading</b>	The activity of leading. <i>The <b>leading</b> edge of technology.</i>
<b><u>main</u></b>	Capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence. <i>The camcorder can be run directly off the <b>mains</b>.</i>
<b><u>maximum</u></b>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>The <b>maximum</b> depth of the pool is 6 feet.</i>
<b><u>optimum</u></b>	The most favourable situation or level for growth, reproduction, or success. <i>The plant grows within a range of 68 and 78 F the <b>optimum</b> being 74.</i>
<b><u>paramount</u></b>	Having superior power and influence. <i>A <b>paramount</b> chief.</i>
<b>position</b>	A proposition laid down or asserted a tenet or assertion. <i>The <b>position</b> of the hands on the clock.</i>
<b>predate</b>	Prey on or hunt for. <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to <b>predate</b> Roman roads.</i>
<b>premier</b>	The person who holds the position of head of the government in the United Kingdom. <i>An architect of <b>premier</b> rank.</i>
<b><u>primal</u></b>	Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state. <i><b>Primal</b> eras before the appearance of life on earth.</i>
<b>prime</b>	A prime number. <i>Any hospital with high costs is a <b>prime</b> candidate for closure.</i>

<b>principal</b>	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>He had been an outstanding <b>principal</b> in the orchestra.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>So many highest <b>superlatives</b> achieved by man.</i>
<b>supreme</b>	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>The <b>supreme</b> confidence of youth.</i>
<b>top</b>	Situated at the top or highest position. <i>She bought a couple of new <b>tops</b>.</i>
<b><u>unsurpassed</u></b>	Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
<b>untimely</b>	At a time that is unsuitable or premature. <i>Alcohol brought him to an <b>untimely</b> end.</i>
<b><u>vanguard</u></b>	Any creative group active in the innovation and application of new concepts and techniques in a given field (especially in the arts). <i>The prototype was in the <b>vanguard</b> of technical development.</i>
