cutting edge	The activity of selecting the scenes to be shown and putting them together to create a film.
fore	The front part of something, especially a ship.
foreground	The part of a scene that is near the viewer. <i>The intricate garden depicted in the foreground.</i>
front	The part of a garment covering a person s front. <i>The CIA identified the company as a front for a terrorist group.</i>
front line	The immediate proximity of someone or something.

head	The pressure exerted by a head of water or by a confined body of steam. <i>Huge heads of fluffy cream flowers.</i>
lead	A position of being the initiator of something and an example that others will follow especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>She had the lead in a new film.</i>
leading position	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
position of prominence	The role assigned to an individual player.
spearhead	The point of a spear. <i>She became the spearhead of a health education programme.</i>
van	A caravan. <i>A van driver.</i>
vanguard	The foremost part of an advancing army or naval force. <i>The experimental spirit of the modernist vanguard.</i>

above	At a higher level or layer. <i>See above left.</i>
antecedence	Preceding in time.
apex	The highest point in a plane or solid figure, relative to a base line or plane. <i>Melodic lines build up to the chorus and it apexes at the solo.</i>
apical	(of a consonant) formed with the tip of the tongue at or near the front teeth or the alveolar ridge, for example th or trilled r.
best	The person who is most outstanding or excellent; someone who tops all others. <i>He brought out the best in people.</i>

chief	Most important element. <i>A union chief.</i>
first	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>His first political race.</i>
fore	Situated at or toward the bow of a vessel. <i>The fore and hind pairs of wings.</i>
<u>foremost</u>	Before anything else in rank, importance, or position; in the first place. <i>He put his best foot foremost.</i>
<u>forward</u>	Toward the future forward in time. <i>I am not usually a forward sort of person.</i>
<u>front</u>	The part of a garment covering a person's front. <i>He led the national liberation front.</i>
head	The head regarded as the location of intellect, imagination, and memory. <i>Head towards the town centre until the road takes a sharp right.</i>
heyday	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its heyday in 1964.</i>
leading	The activity of leading. <i>The leading edge of technology.</i>
<u>main</u>	Capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence. <i>The camcorder can be run directly off the mains.</i>
<u>maximum</u>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>The maximum depth of the pool is 6 feet.</i>
<u>optimum</u>	The most favourable situation or level for growth, reproduction, or success. <i>The plant grows within a range of 68 and 78 F the optimum being 74.</i>
<u>paramount</u>	Having superior power and influence. <i>A paramount chief.</i>
position	A proposition laid down or asserted a tenet or assertion. <i>The position of the hands on the clock.</i>
predate	Prey on or hunt for. <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to predate Roman roads.</i>
premier	The person who holds the position of head of the government in the United Kingdom. <i>An architect of premier rank.</i>
<u>primal</u>	Having existed from the beginning; in an earliest or original stage or state. <i>Primal eras before the appearance of life on earth.</i>
prime	A prime number. <i>Any hospital with high costs is a prime candidate for closure.</i>

principal	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>He had been an outstanding principal in the orchestra.</i>
superlative	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>So many highest superlatives achieved by man.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>The supreme confidence of youth.</i>
top	Situated at the top or highest position. <i>She bought a couple of new tops.</i>
<u>unsurpassed</u>	Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i>
untimely	At a time that is unsuitable or premature. <i>Alcohol brought him to an untimely end.</i>
<u>vanguard</u>	Any creative group active in the innovation and application of new concepts and techniques in a given field (especially in the arts). <i>The prototype was in the vanguard of technical development.</i>
