### Definitions of "Forego" as a verb

- *Do without or cease to hold or adhere to.*
- *Be earlier in time; go back further.*

<b>antecede</b>	Be earlier in time; go back further. <i>Investigative reporting long <b>antecedes</b> the invention of miniature cameras.</i>
<b>antedate</b>	Indicate or discover that (a document, event, or word) should be assigned to an earlier date. <i>There are no references to him that would <b>antedate</b> his birth.</i>
<b>dispense with</b>	Administer or bestow, as in small portions.
<b>foreswear</b>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>I am <b>foreswearing</b> women forever.</i>

<b>forfeit</b>	Lose or give up (something) as a necessary consequence of something else. <i>Those unable to meet their taxes were liable to <b>forfeit</b> their estates.</i>
<b>forgo</b>	Be earlier in time; go back further. <i>She wanted to <b>forgo</b> the tea and leave while they could.</i>
<b>give up</b>	Deliver in exchange or recompense.
<b>precede</b>	Be earlier in time; go back further. <i>Most English adjectives <b>precede</b> the noun they modify.</i>
<b>predate</b>	Exist or occur at a date earlier than (something). <i>Here parish boundaries seem clearly to <b>predate</b> Roman roads.</i>
<b>relinquish</b>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>He <b>relinquished</b> his managerial role to become chief executive.</i>
<b>throw overboard</b>	Utter with force; utter vehemently.
<b>waive</b>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>Her tuition fees would be <b>waived</b>.</i>
