## Foregoing as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Foregoing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “foregoing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Just mentioned or stated; preceding.*
- *Especially of writing or speech; going before.*

### Synonyms of "Foregoing" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>above</b>	Appearing earlier in the same text. <i>Flaws in the <b>above</b> interpretation.</i>
<b>aforementioned</b>	Denoting a thing or person previously mentioned. <i>Works of all the <b>aforementioned</b> authors.</i>
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<a href="#">earlier</a>	Expected in the near future. <i>His <b>earlier</b> work reflects the influence of his teacher.</i>
<a href="#">preceding</a>	Coming before something in order, position, or time. <i>A growth in sales above those of the <b>preceding</b> year.</i>

## Associations of "Foregoing" (30 Words)

<b>aforementioned</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of. <i>Works of all the <b>aforementioned</b> authors.</i>
<b>allude</b>	Mention without discussing at length. <i>He <b>alluded</b> to the problem but did not mention it.</i>
<b>chat</b>	Birds having a chattering call. <i>Online <b>chat</b> has been widely accepted by average internet users.</i>
<b>cite</b>	A short note recognizing a source of information or of a quoted passage. <i>Authors who are highly regarded by their peers tend to be <b>cited</b>.</i>
<b>confabulate</b>	Have a conference in order to talk something over. <i>She has lapses in attention and concentration—she may be confabulating a little.</i>
<b>consult</b>	An act of consulting a professional a consultation. <i>They had to <b>consult</b> before arriving at a decision.</i>
<b>consultation</b>	A meeting with an expert, such as a medical doctor, in order to seek advice. <i>A <b>consultation</b> of several medical specialists.</i>
<b>contentiousness</b>	An inclination to be quarrelsome and contentious.
<b>debate</b>	A formal discussion on a particular matter in a public meeting or legislative assembly, in which opposing arguments are put forward and which usually ends with a vote. <i>We <b>debated</b> the question of abortion.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Give a description of. <i>Discreet Italian police <b>described</b> it in a manner typically continental.</i>
<b>description</b>	A statement that represents something in words. <i>People who had seen him were able to give a <b>description</b>.</i>
<b>dialogue</b>	Provide a film or play with a dialogue. <i>Interfaith <b>dialogue</b>.</i>
<b>discourse</b>	Carry on a conversation. <i>The language of political <b>discourse</b>.</i>
<b>discussion</b>	An exchange of views on some topic. <i>We had a good <b>discussion</b>.</i>

<b>disputation</b>	Formal academic debate. <i>A lengthy <b>disputation</b> about the rights and wrongs of a particular request.</i>
<b>explain</b>	Serve as a reason or cause or justification of. <i>It s a device of great age the professor <b>explained</b>.</i>
<u><b>exposition</b></u>	The part of a movement, especially in sonata form, in which the principal themes are first presented. <i>The country squires dreaded the <b>exposition</b> of their rustic conversation.</i>
<b>expound</b>	Present and explain (a theory or idea) in detail. <i>The abbess <b>expounded</b> the scriptures to her nuns.</i>
<b>forum</b>	A meeting or medium where ideas and views on a particular issue can be exchanged. <i>We hope these pages act as a <b>forum</b> for debate.</i>
<u><b>glib</b></u>	Marked by lack of intellectual depth. <i><b>Glib</b> promises.</i>
<b>mention</b>	Make mention of. <i>He is still regularly <b>mentioned</b> as a possible secretary of state.</i>
<u><b>narrative</b></u>	The narrated part of a literary work, as distinct from dialogue. <i>The dialogue and the <b>narrative</b> suffer from awkward syntax.</i>
<u><b>preceding</b></u>	Coming before something in order, position, or time. <i>The <b>preceding</b> pages.</i>
<u><b>quote</b></u>	Put quote marks around. <i>The examples <b>quoted</b> above could be multiplied from case studies from all over England.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	Musical declamation of the kind usual in the narrative and dialogue parts of opera and oratorio, sung in the rhythm of ordinary speech with many words on the same note. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>reference</b>	(computer science) the code that identifies where a piece of information is stored. <i>He argued that <b>reference</b> is a consequence of conditioned reflexes.</i>
<b>speak</b>	Express in speech. <i>Insufficient air circulates for the pipes to <b>speak</b>.</i>
<u><b>specify</b></u>	Specify as a condition or requirement in a contract or agreement make an express demand or provision in an agreement. <i>The coup leader promised an election but did not <b>specify</b> a date.</i>

<b>statement</b>	A message that is stated or declared; a communication (oral or written) setting forth particulars or facts etc. <i>A reassessment of <b>statemented</b> children.</i>
<b>talk</b>	The act of giving a talk to an audience. <i>Keep on walking and <b>talk</b> your way out of it.</i>
