notable	Worthy of notice. <i>The gardens are notable for their collection of magnolias and camellias.</i>
noteworthy	Worthy of attention because interesting, significant, or unusual. <i>It is noteworthy that no one at the Bank has accepted responsibility for the failure.</i>
outstanding	Having a quality that thrusts itself into attention. <i>Much of the work is still outstanding.</i>
premier	Preceding all others in time. <i>An architect of premier rank.</i>
prime	Being at the best stage of development- Robert Browning. <i>Prime number.</i>
principal	First in order of importance; main. <i>The principal amount of your investment.</i>
supreme	Highest in excellence or achievement. <i>Supreme among musicians.</i>

top	Situated at the top or highest position. <i>The top end of Fulham Road.</i>
world-class	Ranking above all others.

- *One of the foremost art collectors of his day.*

- *Prominently forward.*

Synonyms of "Foremost" as an adverb (4 Words)

first	Before anything else. <i>First we must consider the garter snake.</i>
first of all	Before anything else.
first off	Prominently forward.
<u>firstly</u>	Used to introduce a first point or reason. <i>Firstly it is wrong and secondly it is extremely difficult to implement.</i>

heyday	The period of a person's or thing's greatest success, popularity, activity, or vigour. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its heyday in 1964.</i>
leading	The activity of leading. <i>The country s leading poet.</i>
main	Chief in size or importance. <i>The main doors were of solid glass.</i>
major	A major key interval or scale. <i>She is a linguistics major.</i>

<u>optimum</u>	Most favorable conditions or greatest degree or amount possible under given circumstances. <i>The optimum childbearing age.</i>
<u>overlord</u>	A person of great power or authority. <i>Charles was overlord of vast territories in Europe.</i>
<u>paramount</u>	More important than anything else; supreme. <i>The interests of the child are of paramount importance.</i>
predominant	Present as the strongest or main element. <i>The predominant mood among policy makers is optimism.</i>
premier	The person who holds the position of head of the government in the United Kingdom. <i>The premiere showing.</i>
preponderant	Having superior power and influence. <i>The preponderant influence of the US within the alliance.</i>
prima	Used primarily as eating apples. <i>Prima donna.</i>
<u>primal</u>	Most important; primary or fundamental. <i>Rivers were the primal highways of life.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part; mainly. <i>Around 80 per cent of personal computers are used primarily for word processing.</i>
<u>primary</u>	A primary feather. <i>Primary sources.</i>
prime	Insert a primer into a gun mine or charge preparatory to detonation or firing. <i>Prime a cannon.</i>
principal	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>The winners are paid from the interest without even touching the principal.</i>
<u>staple</u>	A piece of thin wire with two short right angled end pieces which are driven by a stapler through sheets of paper to fasten them together. <i>Staple the papers together.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>The supreme confidence of youth.</i>
