- Act in advance of; deal with ahead of time.
- Realize beforehand.

Synonyms of "Foresee" as a verb (12 Words)

Come or take place before (an event or process expected or scheduled for a **anticipate** later time.

She **anticipate**d scorn on her return to the theatre.

Speak in response.

Counter He countered with some very persuasive arguments.

envisage Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case.

The Rome Treaty **envisage**d free movement across frontiers.

envision Picture to oneself; imagine possible.

I cannot **envision** him as President.



expect Consider obligatory request and expect.

It s as well to **expect** the worst.

forecast Predict in advance.

Coal consumption in Europe is **forecast** to increase.

foreknow Be aware of (an event) before it happens. He **foreknow**s his death like a saint.

forestall Prevent or obstruct (an anticipated event or action) by taking advance action.

They will present their resignations to **forestall** a vote of no confidence.

make a prediction about tell in advance.

He **predict**s that the trend will continue.

previse Foresee or predict (an event.

He had intelligence to **previse** the possible future.

Go to see for professional or business reasons.

We went to **see** the Eiffel Tower in the morning.

think likely Bring into a given condition by mental preoccupation.

Usage Examples of "Foresee" as a verb

• It is impossible to foresee how life will work out.

• We did not foresee any difficulties.

anticipate Regard as probable; expect or predict.

anticipation The action of anticipating something; expectation or prediction.

expectancy Something expected (as on the basis of a norm.

They waited with an air of **expectancy**.

expectation One's prospects of inheritance.

Students had high **expectation**s for their future.

forebodeMake a prediction about; tell in advance.

This lull **forebode**d some new assault upon him.

forecast A prediction about how something (as the weather) will develop.

Rain is **forecast** for Scotland.

forecasting A statement made about the future.

foreshadow Indicate by signs.

Other new measures are **foreshadow**ed in the White Paper.

foretell Foreshadow or presage.

A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.

guess An estimate or conclusion formed by guessing.

She **guess**ed the child s age at 14 or 15.

The process or results of guessing.

guesswork Answering this question will involve you in a certain amount of

quesswork.

preconception A partiality that prevents objective consideration of an issue or situation.

He did not even try to confirm his **preconception**s.

Make a prediction about tell in advance.

He **predict**s that the trend will continue.

predictionThe act of predicting (as by reasoning about the future.

A **prediction** that economic growth would resume.

An omen or portent.

Lands he could measure terms and tides **presage**.

Take liberties or act with too much confidence.

Forgive me if I have **presume**d.

presupposeTake for granted or as a given; suppose beforehand.

This step **presuppose**s two prior ones.

prognosticate Foretell or prophesy (a future event.

The economists were prognosticating financial Armageddon.



prognostication A sign of something about to happen.

These gloomy **prognostication**s proved to be unfounded.

A prediction uttered under divine inspiration.

A bleak **prophecy** of war and ruin.

prophesyPredict or reveal through, or as if through, divine inspiration.

Jacques was **prophesy**ing a bumper harvest.

soothsayer A person supposed to be able to foresee the future.

A hypothesis that has been formed by speculating or conjecturing

speculation (usually with little hard evidence.

There has been widespread **speculation** that he plans to quit.

The cognitive process of supposing.

suppositionThey were working on the **supposition** that his death was murder.
