Definitions of "Forever" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “forever” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *For all future time; for always.*
- *Without interruption.*
- *For a limitless time- P.P.Bliss.*
- *Continually.*
- *For a very long or seemingly endless time.*
- *For a limitless time.*
- *A very long time (used hyperbolically).*
- *Used in slogans of support after the name of something or someone.*



Synonyms of "Forever" as an adverb (23 Words)

always	Repeatedly and annoyingly. <i>She will always be missed.</i>
constantly	Continuously over a period of time; always. <i>The world is constantly changing.</i>
<u>continually</u>	Seemingly without interruption. <i>I was continually moving around.</i>
continuously	With unflagging resolve. <i>These images loop continuously.</i>
<u>endlessly</u>	Without bounds. <i>The original episodes were endlessly repeated.</i>
<u>eternally</u>	Used to emphasize expressions of admiration, gratitude, etc. <i>His eternally optimistic attitude.</i>
everlastingly	For a limitless time.

evermore	For a limitless time- P.P.Bliss. <i>We pray that we may evermore dwell in him and he in us.</i>
for all time	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’.
for always	Forever; throughout all time.
for ever	At any time.
for ever and ever	At any time.
for good	Completely and absolutely (‘good’ is sometimes used informally for ‘thoroughly’.
for good and all	Completely and absolutely (‘good’ is sometimes used informally for ‘thoroughly’.
forever and a day	For a very long or seemingly endless time.
in perpetuity	To or toward the inside of.
incessantly	With unflagging resolve. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
once and for all	At a previous time.
permanently	For a long time without essential change. <i>His lungs are permanently damaged.</i>
perpetually	In a way that never ends or changes; constantly. <i>She seems perpetually to have a mournful look on her face.</i>
persistently	In a persistent manner; continuously. <i>The rules are persistently flouted.</i>
<u>regularly</u>	On a habitual basis; usually. <i>Make a point of regularly consulting the noticeboard.</i>
repeatedly	Several time. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>



Usage Examples of "Forever" as an adverb

- *They are forever on the move.*
- *No one can live forever.*
- *We had to wait forever and a day.*
- *She would love him forever.*
- *She took forever to write the paper.*
- *Scotland Forever!*
- *It took forever to get a passport.*

endless	Countless; innumerable. <i>Endless loop cassette tapes.</i>
<u>endlessly</u>	With unflagging resolve. <i>The original episodes were endlessly repeated.</i>
<u>eternal</u>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>She is an eternal optimist.</i>
eternity	A state to which time has no application; timelessness. <i>This state of affairs has lasted for all eternity.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Caravan holidays remain as popular as ever.</i>
everlasting	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>An everlasting reminder of this evening.</i>
<u>every</u>	Each and all of the members of a group considered singly and without exception. <i>Had every hope of success.</i>
<u>grinding</u>	A harsh and strident sound as of the grinding of gears. <i>Crush it and add it to the honey with a grinding of pepper and salt.</i>
immortality	The ability to live forever; eternal life. <i>Eating the fruit gave the gods immortality.</i>
incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
indefinite	Not decided or not known. <i>Plans are indefinite.</i>
<u>infinite</u>	A space or quantity that is infinite. <i>He bathed the wound with infinite care.</i>
<u>infinity</u>	An infinite or very great number or amount. <i>The lawns stretched into infinity.</i>
interminable	Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>An interminable sermon.</i>
permanence	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<u>permanent</u>	A perm for the hair. <i>Permanent address.</i>

- perpetual** (of an investment) having no fixed maturity date; irredeemable.
*A **perpetual** secretary of the society.*
- perpetually** Without interruption.
*She seems **perpetually** to have a mournful look on her face.*
- perpetuity** The property of being perpetual (seemingly ceaseless).
*He did not believe in the **perpetuity** of military rule.*
- unceasing** Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
*Man's **unceasing** warfare with drought and isolation.*
- unceasingly** With unflagging resolve.
- undying** Never dying.
*His **undying** fame.*
- unlimited** Not limited or restricted in terms of number, quantity, or extent.
*To start with a theory of **unlimited** freedom is to end up with **unlimited** despotism.*
