## Forewarn as a Verb

### Definitions of "Forewarn" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “forewarn” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem.*
- *Warn in advance or beforehand; give an early warning.*

### Synonyms of "Forewarn" as a verb (18 Words)

<b>advise</b>	Give advice to. <i>I <b>advised</b> him to go home.</i>
<a href="#">apprise</a>	Increase the value of. <i>I thought it right to <b>apprise</b> Chris of what had happened.</i>
<b>forecast</b>	Predict or estimate (a future event or trend). <i>Coal consumption in Europe is <b>forecast</b> to increase.</i>
<b>give advance warning</b>	Bring about.
<b>give fair warning</b>	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
<b>give notice</b>	Occur.

<b>harbinger</b>	Foreshadow or presage.
<b>herald</b>	Be a sign that (something) is about to happen. <i>The speech <b>heralded</b> a change in policy.</i>
	Act as an informer. <i>He had been recruited by the KGB to <b>inform</b> on his fellow students.</i>
<b>inform</b>	
<b>omen</b>	Indicate as with a sign or an omen.
<b>presage</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>Lands he could measure terms and tides <b>presage</b>.</i>
<b>prewise</b>	Realize beforehand. <i>He had intelligence to <b>prewise</b> the possible future.</i>
	Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem; forewarn.
<b>prewarn</b>	<i>People living within areas that have been prone to flooding would be <b>prewarned</b>.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Promise to undertake or give. <i>I ve been <b>promised</b> to him for years.</i>
<b>sign</b>	Indicate with signposts or other markers. <i>He <b>signed</b> on the dotted line.</i>
<b>signal</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The Community could <b>signal</b> displeasure by refusing to cooperate.</i>
<b>warn</b>	Notify, usually in advance. <i>His father had <b>warned</b> him of what might happen.</i>
<b>warn in advance</b>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior.

## Usage Examples of "Forewarn" as a verb

- *He had been forewarned of a coup plot.*
- *I forewarned him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex-wife's house.*

## Associations of "Forewarn" (30 Words)

<b>admonish</b>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone s behavior. <i>He <b>admonished</b> the people against the evil of such practices.</i>
<b>aftershock</b>	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.

<b>avalanche</b>	Engulf or carry off by an avalanche. <i>An <b>avalanche</b> of mud.</i>
<b><u>beware</u></b>	Be on one's guard; be cautious or wary about; be alert to. <i>We should <b>beware</b> the incompetence of legislators.</i>
<b>carelessly</b>	In a rakish manner. <i>Roadsides are full of litter thrown <b>carelessly</b> by passers by.</i>
<b>caution</b>	A warning against certain acts. <i>Advisers have <b>cautioned</b> against tax increases.</i>
<b><u>cautious</u></b>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>Firms have been unusually <b>cautious</b> about hiring new workers.</i>
<b>danger</b>	A dangerous place. <i>There was a <b>danger</b> he would do the wrong thing.</i>
<b>dangerous</b>	Likely to cause problems or to have adverse consequences. <i>Unemployment reached <b>dangerous</b> proportions.</i>
<b><u>earthquake</u></b>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity. <i>Selling the company caused an <b>earthquake</b> among the employees.</i>
<b>flammability</b>	The quality of being easily ignited and burning rapidly.
<b><u>gamble</u></b>	A risky action undertaken with the hope of success. <i>He <b>gambles</b> on football.</i>
<b><u>hazard</u></b>	Put at risk. <i>A safety <b>hazard</b>.</i>
<b><u>hazardous</u></b>	Involving risk or danger. <i>It is <b>hazardous</b> to personal safety.</i>
<b>imminence</b>	The state of being imminent and liable to happen soon. <i>The populace was largely unaware of the <b>imminence</b> of war.</i>
<b>imminent</b>	Overhanging. <i>They were in <b>imminent</b> danger of being swept away.</i>
<b><u>impending</u></b>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>His <b>impending</b> retirement.</i>
<b>jeopardy</b>	Danger of loss, harm, or failure. <i>The whole peace process is in <b>jeopardy</b>.</i>
<b>landslide</b>	An overwhelming majority of votes for one party or candidate in an election. <i>Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a <b>landslide</b>.</i>
<b>parlous</b>	Greatly or excessively. <i>The General's position was <b>parlous</b>.</i>

<b>peril</b>	Pose a threat to; present a danger to. <i>A setback to the state could present a <b>peril</b> to the regime.</i>
<b><u>perilous</u></b>	Full of danger or risk. <i>A <b>perilous</b> voyage across the Atlantic in a small boat.</i>
<b>risk</b>	Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome. <i>Western banks regarded Romania as a good <b>risk</b>.</i>
<b><u>risky</u></b>	Risqu. <i>It was much too <b>risky</b> to try to disarm him.</i>
<b>threatened</b>	(of flora or fauna) likely in the near future to become endangered. <i>The spotted owl is a <b>threatened</b> species not yet an endangered one.</i>
<b><u>toxicity</u></b>	The degree to which something is poisonous. <i>The <b>toxicity</b> of a drug depends on its dosage.</i>
<b>venture</b>	Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome. <i>A joint <b>venture</b> between two aircraft manufacturers.</i>
<b>volatility</b>	The trait of being unpredictably irresolute. <i>The <b>volatility</b> of chemicals in an indoor environment.</i>
<b><u>warn</u></b>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>The director <b>warned</b> him that he might be fired.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Serving to warn. <i>She had only had four days <b>warning</b> before leaving Berlin.</i>
