- Warn in advance or beforehand; give an early warning.

**give fair warning** Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.

**give notice** Occur.



**harbinger** Foreshadow or presage.

herald Be a sign that (something) is about to happen.

The speech **herald**ed a change in policy.

Act as an informer.

**inform** He had been recruited by the KGB to **inform** on his fellow

students.

**omen** Indicate as with a sign or an omen.

Indicate by signs.

presage Lands he could measure terms and tides **presage**.

**previse** Realize beforehand.

He had intelligence to **previse** the possible future.

Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem;

forewarn.

**Prewarn**People living within areas that have been prone to flooding would

be **prewarn**ed.

**promise** Promise to undertake or give.

I ve been **promise**d to him for years.

sign Indicate with signposts or other markers.

He **sign**ed on the dotted line.

signal Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs.

The Community could **signal** displeasure by refusing to cooperate.

Notify, usually in advance.

Warn

His father had warned him of what might happen.

**warn in advance** Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior.

• He had been forewarned of a coup plot.

• I forewarned him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex-wife's house.

admonish Admonish or counsel in terms of someone s behavior.

He **admonish**ed the people against the evil of such practices.

**aftershock** A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an

earthquake.



**avalanche** Engulf or carry off by an avalanche.

danger A dangerous place.

There was a **danger** he would do the wrong thing.

**dangerous** Likely to cause problems or to have adverse consequences.

Unemployment reached **dangerous** proportions.

Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from

**<u>earthquake</u>** underground movement along a fault plane of from volcanic activity.

Selling the company caused an **earthquake** among the employees.

flammability The quality of being easily ignited and burning rapidly.

A risky action undertaken with the hope of success.

He **gamble**s on football.

hazard Put at risk.

A safety **hazard**.

hazardous Involving risk or danger.

It is **hazardous** to personal safety.

**imminence** The state of being imminent and liable to happen soon.

The populace was largely unaware of the **imminence** of war.

imminent Overhanging.

They were in **imminent** danger of being swept away.

impending Close in time; about to occur. His impending retirement.

Danger of loss, harm, or failure.

jeopardy

The whole peace process is in jeopardy.

landslide An overwhelming majority of votes for one party or candidate in an election.

Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.

• Greatly or excessively.

The General's position was parlous.



**peril** Pose a threat to; present a danger to.

A setback to the state could present a **peril** to the regime.

**perilous** Full of danger or risk.

A **perilous** voyage across the Atlantic in a small boat.

Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome.

Western banks regarded Romania as a good **risk**.

risky Risqu.

It was much too **risky** to try to disarm him.

threatened (of flora or fauna) likely in the near future to become endangered.

The spotted owl is a **threatened** species not yet an endangered one.

The degree to which something is poisonous.

The **toxicity** of a drug depends on its dosage.

venture

Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome.

A joint **venture** between two aircraft manufacturers.

volatility The trait of being unpredictably irresolute.

The **volatility** of chemicals in an indoor environment.

warn Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior.

The director **warn**ed him that he might be fired.

Serving to warn.

She had only had four days warning before leaving Berlin.
