Forewarn as a Verb

Definitions of "Forewarn" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “forewarn” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem.*
- *Warn in advance or beforehand; give an early warning.*

Synonyms of "Forewarn" as a verb (18 Words)

advise	Give advice to. <i>I advised him to go home.</i>
apprise	Increase the value of. <i>I thought it right to apprise Chris of what had happened.</i>
forecast	Predict or estimate (a future event or trend). <i>Coal consumption in Europe is forecast to increase.</i>
give advance warning	Bring about.
give fair warning	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
give notice	Occur.

harbinger	Foreshadow or presage.
herald	Be a sign that (something) is about to happen. <i>The speech heralded a change in policy.</i>
	Act as an informer. <i>He had been recruited by the KGB to inform on his fellow students.</i>
inform	
omen	Indicate as with a sign or an omen.
presage	Indicate by signs. <i>Lands he could measure terms and tides presage.</i>
prewise	Realize beforehand. <i>He had intelligence to prewise the possible future.</i>
	Inform (someone) of a possible future danger or problem; forewarn.
prewarn	<i>People living within areas that have been prone to flooding would be prewarned.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>I ve been promised to him for years.</i>
sign	Indicate with signposts or other markers. <i>He signed on the dotted line.</i>
signal	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The Community could signal displeasure by refusing to cooperate.</i>
warn	Notify, usually in advance. <i>His father had warned him of what might happen.</i>
warn in advance	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior.

Usage Examples of "Forewarn" as a verb

- *He had been forewarned of a coup plot.*
- *I forewarned him of the trouble that would arise if he showed up at his ex-wife's house.*

Associations of "Forewarn" (30 Words)

admonish	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone s behavior. <i>He admonished the people against the evil of such practices.</i>
aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.

avalanche	Engulf or carry off by an avalanche. <i>An avalanche of mud.</i>
<u>beware</u>	Be on one's guard; be cautious or wary about; be alert to. <i>We should beware the incompetence of legislators.</i>
carelessly	In a rakish manner. <i>Roadsides are full of litter thrown carelessly by passers by.</i>
caution	A warning against certain acts. <i>Advisers have cautioned against tax increases.</i>
<u>cautious</u>	People who are fearful and cautious. <i>Firms have been unusually cautious about hiring new workers.</i>
danger	A dangerous place. <i>There was a danger he would do the wrong thing.</i>
dangerous	Likely to cause problems or to have adverse consequences. <i>Unemployment reached dangerous proportions.</i>
<u>earthquake</u>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity. <i>Selling the company caused an earthquake among the employees.</i>
flammability	The quality of being easily ignited and burning rapidly.
<u>gamble</u>	A risky action undertaken with the hope of success. <i>He gambles on football.</i>
<u>hazard</u>	Put at risk. <i>A safety hazard.</i>
<u>hazardous</u>	Involving risk or danger. <i>It is hazardous to personal safety.</i>
imminence	The state of being imminent and liable to happen soon. <i>The populace was largely unaware of the imminence of war.</i>
imminent	Overhanging. <i>They were in imminent danger of being swept away.</i>
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>His impending retirement.</i>
jeopardy	Danger of loss, harm, or failure. <i>The whole peace process is in jeopardy.</i>
landslide	An overwhelming majority of votes for one party or candidate in an election. <i>Roosevelt defeated Hoover in a landslide.</i>
parlous	Greatly or excessively. <i>The General's position was parlous.</i>

peril	Pose a threat to; present a danger to. <i>A setback to the state could present a peril to the regime.</i>
<u>perilous</u>	Full of danger or risk. <i>A perilous voyage across the Atlantic in a small boat.</i>
risk	Take a risk in the hope of a favorable outcome. <i>Western banks regarded Romania as a good risk.</i>
<u>risky</u>	Risqu. <i>It was much too risky to try to disarm him.</i>
threatened	(of flora or fauna) likely in the near future to become endangered. <i>The spotted owl is a threatened species not yet an endangered one.</i>
<u>toxicity</u>	The degree to which something is poisonous. <i>The toxicity of a drug depends on its dosage.</i>
venture	Any venturesome undertaking especially one with an uncertain outcome. <i>A joint venture between two aircraft manufacturers.</i>
volatility	The trait of being unpredictably irresolute. <i>The volatility of chemicals in an indoor environment.</i>
<u>warn</u>	Admonish or counsel in terms of someone's behavior. <i>The director warned him that he might be fired.</i>
warning	Serving to warn. <i>She had only had four days warning before leaving Berlin.</i>
