throw overboard	Make on a potter's wheel.
<u>waive</u>	Refrain from insisting on or using (a right or claim). <i>Her tuition fees would be waived.</i>
yield	Be the cause or source of. <i>He yielded to the demands of his partners.</i>

- *Those unable to meet their taxes were liable to forfeit their estates.*
- *She didn't mind forfeiting an hour in bed to muck out the horses.*

disenfranchise	Deprive (someone) of the rights and privileges of a free inhabitant of a borough, city, or country. <i>A hard core of kids who are disenfranchised and don't feel connected to the school.</i>
foreswear	Turn away from; give up. <i>I am foreswearing women forever.</i>
forfeited	Surrendered as a penalty.
forfeiture	Something that is lost or surrendered as a penalty. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i>
forgo	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>She wanted to forgo the tea and leave while they could.</i>
impound	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>It will impound a reservoir 130 miles long.</i>
impoverish	Make poor. <i>The soil was impoverished by annual burning.</i>
kingship	The dignity or rank or position of a king. <i>Edmund assumed kingship of Mercia.</i>
loot	Money. <i>A gang looted Rs 15 lakh from a passenger.</i>
loss	A person who or thing that is badly missed when lost. <i>He will be a great loss to many people.</i>
property	Shares or investments in property. <i>The property of heat to expand metal at uniform rates.</i>
relinquish	Part with a possession or right. <i>Relinquish your grip on the rope you won't fall.</i>
renounce	Give up, such as power, as of monarchs and emperors, or duties and obligations. <i>Isabella offered to renounce her son's claim to the French Crown.</i>
seize	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>The patient was seized with unbearable pains.</i>

steal	Move stealthily. <i>A delicious languor was stealing over her.</i>
<u>surrender</u>	The action of surrendering to an opponent or powerful influence. <i>The last Taleban fighters finally surrendered.</i>
take	Ascertain or determine by measuring computing or take a reading from a dial. <i>It takes me about a quarter of an hour to walk to work.</i>
<u>usurp</u>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force; take as one's right or possession. <i>Gloom had usurped mirth at the party after the news of the terrorist act broke.</i>
usurpation	Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority). <i>A succession of generals who ruled by usurpation.</i>
<u>waive</u>	Refrain from insisting on or using (a right or claim). <i>Her tuition fees would be waived.</i>
