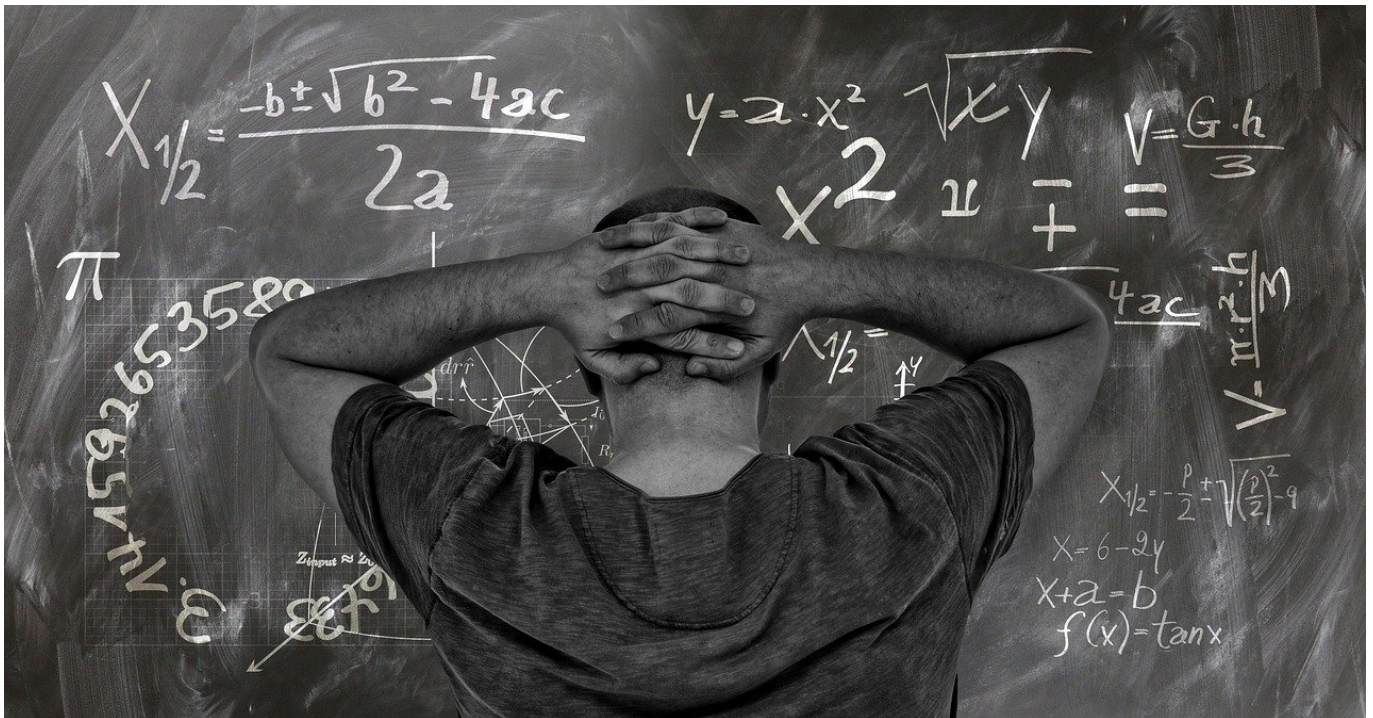

<b><u>aphorism</u></b>	A concise statement of a scientific principle, typically by a classical author. <i>The opening sentence of the first <b>aphorism</b> of Hippocrates.</i>
<b><u>basis</u></b>	The fundamental assumptions from which something is begun or developed or calculated or explained. <i>The <b>basis</b> of this drink is orange juice.</i>
<b><u>benchmark</u></b>	A surveyor's mark on a permanent object of predetermined position and elevation used as a reference point. <i>We thought we'd run some <b>benchmarks</b> on the smartphone.</i>
<b><u>blueprint</u></b>	Something intended as a guide for making something else. <i>The scheme was a <b>blueprint</b> for future development programmes.</i>
<b>canon</b>	A contrapuntal piece of music in which a melody in one part is imitated exactly in other parts. <i>The Shakespeare <b>canon</b>.</i>
<b>chemical formula</b>	Material produced by or used in a reaction involving changes in atoms or molecules.
<b><u>compound</u></b>	A whole formed by a union of two or more elements or parts. <i>Lead <b>compounds</b>.</i>
<b><u>concoction</u></b>	An elaborate or showy garment or hat. <i>Her story is an improbable <b>concoction</b>.</i>
<b><u>convention</u></b>	Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional. <i>Political <b>convention</b>.</i>
<b>creation</b>	A thing which has been made or invented, especially something showing artistic talent. <i><b>Creation</b> of a coalition government.</i>
<b>criterion</b>	A principle or standard by which something may be judged or decided. <i>They award a green label to products that meet certain environmental criteria.</i>
<b>example</b>	A task performed or problem solved in order to develop skill or understanding. <i>There is an <b>example</b> on page 10.</i>
<b><u>exemplar</u></b>	Something to be imitated. <i>The place is an <b>exemplar</b> of multicultural Britain.</i>
<b>expression</b>	Expression without words. <i>The testimony of musicians who worked with him proves that his overwhelming concern was with <b>expression</b>.</i>
<b>form of words</b>	A group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups.

<b>gauge</b>	The position of a sailing ship to windward (the weather gage) or leeward (the lee gage) of another. <i>500 <b>gauge</b> polythene.</i>
<b>guide</b>	A person who shows the way to others, especially one employed to show tourists around places of interest. <i>A comprehensive <b>guide</b> to British hotels and restaurants.</i>
<b>guideline</b>	A light line that is used in lettering to help align the letters. <i>The organization has issued <b>guidelines</b> for people working with prisoners.</i>
<b>ideal</b>	A person or thing regarded as perfect. <i>You re my <b>ideal</b> of how a man should be.</i>
<b>key</b>	A lever as in a keyboard that actuates a mechanism when depressed. <i>A safe deposit box usually requires two <b>keys</b> to open it.</i>
<b>magic formula</b>	Any art that invokes supernatural powers.
<b>method</b>	A way of doing something, especially a systematic way; implies an orderly logical arrangement (usually in steps). <i>Historical study is the rigorous combination of knowledge and <b>method</b>.</i>
<b>mixture</b>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>He drank a <b>mixture</b> of beer and lemonade.</i>
<b>model</b>	A representative form or pattern. <i>As she grew older she became a <b>model</b> of self control.</i>
<b>norm</b>	A standard or pattern, especially of social behaviour, that is typical or expected. <i>Strikes were the <b>norm</b>.</i>
<b>normal</b>	The usual, typical, or expected state or condition. <i>The service will be back to <b>normal</b> next week.</i>
<b>paradigm</b>	The class of all items that can be substituted into the same position or slot in a grammatical sentence are in paradigmatic relation with one another. <i>English determiners form a <b>paradigm</b> we can say a book or his book but not a his book.</i>
<b>pattern</b>	Something regarded as a normative example. <i>The house had been built on the usual <b>pattern</b>.</i>
<b>phrase</b>	An expression consisting of one or more words forming a grammatical constituent of a sentence. <i>The succession of downward <b>phrases</b> in the orchestra is so moving.</i>

<b>plan</b>	A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>I have no <b>plans</b> to retire.</i>
<b>point of reference</b>	A V-shaped mark at one end of an arrow pointer.
<b>preparation</b>	The cognitive process of thinking about what you will do in the event of something happening. <i>The project is in <b>preparation</b>.</i>
<b>prescription</b>	A medicine or remedy that is prescribed. <i>He scribbled a <b>prescription</b> for tranquillizers.</i>
<b>procedure</b>	A particular course of action intended to achieve a result. <i>The standard <b>procedure</b> for informing new employees about conditions of work.</i>
<a href="#"><u>recipe</u></a>	Something which is likely to lead to a particular outcome. <i>A traditional Yorkshire <b>recipe</b>.</i>
<b>rule</b>	Linguistics a rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>It was his <b>rule</b> to take a walk before breakfast.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A collection of short, pithy expressions identified with a particular person, especially a political or religious leader. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>
<b>scale</b>	A white deposit formed in a kettle, boiler, etc. by the evaporation of water containing lime. <i>Judging on a <b>scale</b> of 1 to 10.</i>
<b>set expression</b>	Evil Egyptian god with the head of a beast that has high square ears and a long snout; brother and murderer of Osiris.
<b>solution</b>	The action of separating or breaking down dissolution. <i>A <b>solution</b> of ammonia in water.</i>
<b>standard</b>	The value behind the money in a monetary system. <i>A <b>standard</b> rose.</i>
<b>substance</b>	The essential nature underlying phenomena, which is subject to changes and accidents. <i>He had yet to accomplish anything of <b>substance</b>.</i>
<b>system</b>	The living body considered as made up of interdependent components forming a unified whole. <i>The metric <b>system</b>.</i>
<b>technique</b>	Skill or ability in a particular field. <i>New surgical <b>techniques</b> mean a shorter hospital stay.</i>

<b>touchstone</b>	A basis for comparison; a reference point against which other things can be evaluated. <i>They tend to regard grammar as the <b>touchstone</b> of all language performance.</i>
<b>yardstick</b>	A measuring rod a yard long, typically divided into inches. <i>On what kind of <b>yardstick</b> is he basing his judgment.</i>

<b>enumeration</b>	The act of counting; reciting numbers in ascending order. <i>It is not necessary to give an exhaustive <b>enumeration</b> of the circumstances.</i>

<b>exactness</b>	The quality of being accurate or correct; precision. <i>He demanded <b>exactness</b> in all details.</i>

<b>exponent</b>	A quantity representing the power to which a given number or expression is to be raised, usually expressed as a raised symbol beside the number or expression (e.g. 3 in $2^3 = 2 \times 2 \times 2$ ). <i>He s the world s leading <b>exponent</b> of country rock guitar.</i>
<b>geometry</b>	A particular system of geometry. <i>The <b>geometry</b> of spiders webs.</i>
<b>math</b>	Mathematics. <i>She teaches <b>math</b> and science.</i>
<b>mathematical</b>	Relating to mathematics. <i><b>Mathematical</b> thinking.</i>
<b>mathematics</b>	The abstract science of number quantity and space either as abstract concepts pure mathematics or as applied to other disciplines such as physics and engineering applied mathematics. <i>A taste for <b>mathematics</b>.</i>
<b>multiplication</b>	The process or skill of multiplying. <i>These formulae involve a number of <b>multiplications</b>.</i>
<b>multiply</b>	Combine or increase by multiplication. <i>He managed to <b>multiply</b> his profits.</i>
<b>number</b>	Give numbers to. <i>Yvonne was wearing a little black <b>number</b>.</i>
<b>numerable</b>	Able to be counted. <i><b>Numerable</b> assets.</i>
<b>numerate</b>	Able to understand and use numbers. <i>Teachers should ensure that their pupils are literate and <b>numerate</b>.</i>
<b>numeric</b>	Measured or expressed in numbers. <i>A three digit <b>numeric</b> code.</i>
<b>numerical</b>	Of or relating to or denoting numbers. <i>The lists are in <b>numerical</b> order.</i>
<b>ordinal</b>	Relating to an ordinal number. <i>Held an <b>ordinal</b> rank of seventh.</i>
<b>subtrahend</b>	A quantity or number to be subtracted from another.
<b>sum</b>	Determine the sum of. <i>The abstract <b>sum</b>marizes the main ideas in the paper.</i>
<b>times</b>	A more or less definite period of time now or previously present. <i>It was a sign of the <b>times</b>.</i>
