Forthwith as an Adverb

Definitions of "Forthwith" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “forthwith” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *(especially in official use) immediately; without delay.*
- *Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening.*
- *From a particular thing or place or position ('forth' is obsolete).*
- *Forward in time or order or degree.*
- *Out into view.*

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| by return | In reserve; not for immediate use. |
| directly | Exactly in a specified position. <i>The path leads directly to the lake.</i> |
| here and now | In or at this place; where the speaker or writer is. |
| immediately | Near or close by. <i>I rang immediately for an ambulance.</i> |

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| in a flash | To or toward the inside of. |
| instantaneously | Without any delay. <i>Soldiers must be ready to react instantaneously.</i> |
| instantly | At once; immediately. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i> |
| now | At the time directly following the present moment; immediately. <i>They should be back by now.</i> |
| post-haste | As fast as possible; with all possible haste. |
| right away | Precisely, exactly. |
| straight away | In a forthright manner; candidly or frankly. |
| straight off | Without deviation. |
| straightaway | Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>Found an answer straightaway.</i> |
| that very minute | Used as intensifiers; 'real' is sometimes used informally for 'really'; 'rattling' is informal. |
| then and there | In that case or as a consequence. |
| there and then | To or toward that place; away from the speaker. |
| this very minute | Precisely so. |
| unhesitatingly | Without hesitation. |
| without further ado | To or at a greater distance in time or space ('farther' is used more frequently than 'further' in this physical sense. |
| without more ado | Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent. |

- *An official accused of dishonesty should be suspended forthwith.*
- *We undertake to pay forthwith the money required.*

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| apart | Used to indicate that one is dismissing something from consideration or moving from one tone or topic to another. <i>Studies from as far apart as America and Iceland.</i> |
| away | Out of the way especially away from one's thoughts. <i>In front of them the land fell away to the river.</i> |

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| <u>backlash</u> | An adverse reaction to some political or social occurrence. <i>Typical gearbox backlash in these systems is 2.</i> |

| farther | To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>Farther down the corridor.</i> |
| <u>further</u> | To or at a greater distance in time or space farther is used more frequently than further in this physical sense. <i>Let s not discuss it further.</i> |
| <u>galaxy</u> | The galaxy of which the solar system is a part the Milky Way. <i>Extragalactic nebula is a former name for galaxy.</i> |
| inaccessible | Unable to be used. <i>A rare work today almost inaccessible.</i> |
| <u>leap</u> | A thing to be leaped over or from. <i>A successful leap from college to the major leagues.</i> |
| mile | A race extending over a mile. <i>The second tape is miles better.</i> |
| out-of-town | United States architect who was noted for his design and construction of truss bridges (1784-1844). |
| outback | Inaccessible and sparsely populated. <i>The outback of Ontario.</i> |
| outlying | Situated far from a centre; remote. <i>An outlying village.</i> |

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| outpost | A military post stationed at a distance from the main body of troops. <i>A few scattered outposts along the west coast.</i> |
| <u>outside</u> | Leading to or from the outside. <i>An outside job.</i> |
| <u>rebound</u> | The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>He proved that he can score and rebound as well as any of his peers.</i> |
| <u>remote</u> | A remote control device. <i>The remote past or future.</i> |
| resurface | Put a new coating on or re-form (a surface, especially a road). <i>He resurfaced beside the boat.</i> |
| <u>secluded</u> | Providing privacy or seclusion. <i>The gardens are quiet and secluded.</i> |
| <u>solitary</u> | (of a flower or other part) borne singly. <i>Solitary bees.</i> |
| spring | Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>The president sought to spring the hostages.</i> |
| underpopulated | Having an insufficient or very small population. <i>The richly endowed but underpopulated Ivory Coast.</i> |
| upstage | Move upstage forcing the other actors to turn away from the audience. <i>Most of the action remains upstage.</i> |
| yon | At or in an indicated usually distant place yon is archaic and dialectal. <i>The hills yonder.</i> |
