Definitions of "Fortified" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fortified” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Denoting wine of a type to which spirits have been added so as to produce port, sherry, or a similar drink.*
- *(of a place) provided with defensive works as protection against attack.*
- *Secured with bastions or fortifications.*
- *Having something added to increase the strength.*
- *(of food) having had vitamins or other supplements added so as to increase the nutritional value.*



Synonyms of "Fortified" as an adjective (1 Word)

bastioned Having a bastion or bastions; fortified or defended with or as if with bastions.

<u>assertive</u>	Aggressively self-assured. <i>Pointing directly at a listener is an assertive act.</i>
athletic	Relating to athletes or athletics. <i>Athletic events.</i>
convinced	Having a strong belief or conviction. <i>I am convinced the war will be over in a matter of months.</i>
determined	Determined or decided upon as by an authority. <i>Helen was a determined little girl.</i>
<u>emphatic</u>	An emphatic consonant. <i>An emphatic movement of his hand.</i>
entrench	Establish (an attitude, habit, or belief) so firmly that change is very difficult or unlikely. <i>This matter entrenches on other domains.</i>
<u>entrenched</u>	(of an attitude, habit, or belief) firmly established and difficult or unlikely to change; ingrained. <i>The entrenched power of the nobility.</i>
firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>She will stand firm against the government's proposal.</i>
<u>firmly</u>	In a way that uses steady power or strength. <i>We firmly believed it.</i>
firmness	The application of steady but not excessive power or strength. <i>So certain were we of the firmness of our plan.</i>
hard	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>He'd been a hard worker all his life.</i>
hardheaded	Guided by practical experience and observation rather than theory. <i>A hardheaded appraisal of our position.</i>
<u>hardness</u>	The property of being rigid and resistant to pressure; not easily scratched; measured on Mohs scale. <i>People complained about the hardness of the chairs.</i>
<u>might</u>	Asking for information, especially condescendingly. <i>You might have told me.</i>
rampart	Fortify or surround with or as if with a rampart. <i>A castle with ramparts and a moat.</i>
rigidity	Unwillingness to be adaptable in outlook, belief, or response. <i>The rigidity of the school system.</i>

rigidness	The physical property of being stiff and resisting bending.
rigor	The quality of being valid and rigorous. <i>The rigors of boot camp.</i>
rigorous	Demanding strict attention to rules and procedures. <i>Rigorous discipline.</i>
rigour	The quality of being valid and rigorous. <i>The full rigour of the law.</i>
securely	In a manner free from fear or risk. <i>She held the child securely.</i>
solidly	In a way that is physically strong. <i>Fleetwood batted solidly if unspectacularly.</i>
stalwart	A person who is loyal to their allegiance (especially in times of revolt). <i>He was of stalwart build.</i>
stiffness	The quality of being firm and difficult to bend or move. <i>A charming host without any touch of stiffness or pomposity.</i>
stoutly	In a resolute manner. <i>He stoutly maintained his innocence.</i>
strong	Having a strong physiological or chemical effect. <i>The company was in a strong position to negotiate a deal.</i>
strongly	To a great degree or extent. <i>The rebel movement strongly denied responsibility for the attack.</i>
sturdy	(of a person or their body) strongly and solidly built. <i>He had a sturdy muscular physique.</i>
tightly	Securely fixed or fastened. <i>Public companies are tightly regulated.</i>
unshaken	Unshaken in purpose. <i>Their trust in him remained unshaken.</i>
