<b>comfortable</b>	(of a person) physically relaxed and free from constraint. <i>The home team had a <b>comfortable</b> lead.</i>
<b><u>convenient</u></b>	Large and roomy convenient is archaic in this sense. <i>I phoned your office to confirm that this date is <b>convenient</b>.</i>
<b>encouraging</b>	Giving someone support or confidence; supportive. <i><b>Encouraging</b> advances in medical research.</i>
<b>expedient</b>	Appropriate to a purpose; practical. <i>Holding a public enquiry into the scheme was not <b>expedient</b>.</i>
<b>favourable</b>	(of weather, or a period of time judged in terms of its weather) fine. <i>Their demands rarely received a <b>favourable</b> response.</i>
<b>favoured</b>	Preferred or recommended. <i>The most <b>favoured</b> destination of visitors to Canada.</i>
<b>felicitous</b>	Well chosen or suited to the circumstances. <i>A <b>felicitous</b> life.</i>
<b><u>fortuitous</u></b>	Happening by chance rather than intention. <i>Profits were enhanced by a <b>fortuitous</b> drop in the cost of raw materials.</i>
<b><u>fruitful</u></b>	(of a person) producing many offspring. <i>Be <b>fruitful</b> and multiply.</i>
<b>gainful</b>	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found <b>gainful</b> employment.</i>
<b><u>golden</u></b>	Suggestive of gold. <i>A <b>golden</b> crown.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>A <b>happy</b> outcome.</i>
<b>heaven-sent</b>	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention.
<b>helpful</b>	Giving or ready to give help. <i><b>Helpful</b> staff.</i>
<b>in luck</b>	Directed or bound inward.

<b>lucky</b>	Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome. <i>Three s my <b>lucky</b> number.</i>
<b>moneyed</b>	Characterized by affluence. <i><b>Moneyed</b> interests.</i>
<b><u>opportune</u></b>	Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose. <i>An <b>opportune</b> arrival.</i>
<b><u>opulent</u></b>	Wealthy. <i>His more <b>opulent</b> tenants.</i>
<b><u>profitable</u></b>	(of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>A professionally run and <b>profitable</b> company.</i>
<b>promising</b>	Showing signs of future success. <i>A <b>promising</b> young man.</i>
<b><u>propitious</u></b>	Presenting favorable circumstances; likely to result in or show signs of success. <i>The timing for such a meeting seemed <b>propitious</b>.</i>
<b>prosperous</b>	Presaging or likely to bring good luck. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a <b>prosperous</b> New Year.</i>
<b>providential</b>	Resulting from divine providence. <i><b>Providential</b> care.</i>
<b>rewarding</b>	Providing satisfaction; gratifying. <i>A <b>rewarding</b> career as a paramedic.</i>
<b>rich</b>	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Novels have always been a <b>rich</b> source of material for the film industry.</i>
<b>rosy</b>	Presaging good fortune. <i><b>Rosy</b> predictions.</i>
<b><u>timely</u></b>	Done or occurring sufficiently early; prompt. <i>A <b>timely</b> warning.</i>
<b>useful</b>	Having a useful function. <i>A <b>useful</b> member of society.</i>
<b>valuable</b>	Having worth or merit or value. <i>My time is <b>valuable</b>.</i>
<b>wealthy</b>	Having a great deal of money, resources, or assets; rich. <i>The burden of taxation on the <b>wealthy</b>.</i>

<b>flushed</b>	Reddened or suffused with or as if with blood from emotion or exertion. <i><b>Flushed</b> with success I was getting into my stride.</i>
<b><u>fortuitous</u></b>	Occurring by happy chance. <i><b>Fortuitous</b> encounters strange accidents of fortune.</i>
<b><u>fortune</u></b>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another. <i>I spent a <b>fortune</b> on drink.</i>
<b>hope</b>	Be optimistic be full of hope have hopes. <i>I <b>hope</b> that the kids are OK.</i>
<b>hopefully</b>	With hope; in a hopeful manner. <i>He rode on <b>hopefully</b>.</i>
<b>incidentally</b>	In an incidental manner; as a chance occurrence. <i><b>Incidentally</b> it was many months before the whole truth was discovered.</i>
<b><u>kismet</u></b>	Destiny; fate. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>luck</b>	Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you). <i>They say <b>luck</b> is a lady.</i>
<b>lucky</b>	Having, bringing, or resulting from good luck. <i>My <b>lucky</b> day.</i>



<b><u>miraculous</u></b>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A <b>miraculous</b> cure.</i>
<b>optimism</b>	The belief that good must ultimately prevail over evil in the universe. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for <b>optimism</b>.</i>
<b><u>optimistic</u></b>	Expecting the best. <i>The government was <b>optimistic</b> that reform would take place.</i>
<b><u>propitious</u></b>	Favourably disposed towards someone. <i>A <b>propitious</b> alignment of planets for space exploration.</i>
<b>providential</b>	Resulting from divine providence. <i>They took it for granted that the order of the world reflects a designing <b>providential</b> hand.</i>
<b>rosy</b>	Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>A <b>rosy</b> cheeked schoolgirl.</i>
<b>ruddy</b>	Make ruddy in colour. <i>Young people today they re a <b>ruddy</b> shower.</i>
<b><u>superstition</u></b>	Excessively credulous belief in and reverence for the supernatural. <i>He dismissed the ghost stories as mere <b>superstition</b>.</i>
<b>tallow</b>	Smear something especially the bottom of a boat with tallow. <i>I <b>tallowed</b> my boats with our candles.</i>
<b>want</b>	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>It <b>wanted</b> twenty minutes to midnight.</i>
