comfortable	(of a person) physically relaxed and free from constraint. <i>The home team had a comfortable lead.</i>
<u>convenient</u>	Large and roomy convenient is archaic in this sense. <i>I phoned your office to confirm that this date is convenient.</i>
encouraging	Giving someone support or confidence; supportive. <i>Encouraging advances in medical research.</i>
expedient	Appropriate to a purpose; practical. <i>Holding a public enquiry into the scheme was not expedient.</i>
favourable	(of weather, or a period of time judged in terms of its weather) fine. <i>Their demands rarely received a favourable response.</i>
favoured	Preferred or recommended. <i>The most favoured destination of visitors to Canada.</i>
felicitous	Well chosen or suited to the circumstances. <i>A felicitous life.</i>
<u>fortuitous</u>	Happening by chance rather than intention. <i>Profits were enhanced by a fortuitous drop in the cost of raw materials.</i>
<u>fruitful</u>	(of a person) producing many offspring. <i>Be fruitful and multiply.</i>
gainful	Serving to increase wealth or resources; providing money or other benefit. <i>He soon found gainful employment.</i>
<u>golden</u>	Suggestive of gold. <i>A golden crown.</i>
happy	Eagerly disposed to act or to be of service. <i>A happy outcome.</i>
heaven-sent	Peculiarly fortunate or appropriate; as if by divine intervention.
helpful	Giving or ready to give help. <i>Helpful staff.</i>
in luck	Directed or bound inward.

lucky	Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome. <i>Three s my lucky number.</i>
moneyed	Characterized by affluence. <i>Moneyed interests.</i>
<u>opportune</u>	Suitable or at a time that is suitable or advantageous especially for a particular purpose. <i>An opportune arrival.</i>
<u>opulent</u>	Wealthy. <i>His more opulent tenants.</i>
<u>profitable</u>	(of a business or activity) yielding profit or financial gain. <i>A professionally run and profitable company.</i>
promising	Showing signs of future success. <i>A promising young man.</i>
<u>propitious</u>	Presenting favorable circumstances; likely to result in or show signs of success. <i>The timing for such a meeting seemed propitious.</i>
prosperous	Presaging or likely to bring good luck. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.</i>
providential	Resulting from divine providence. <i>Providential care.</i>
rewarding	Providing satisfaction; gratifying. <i>A rewarding career as a paramedic.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Novels have always been a rich source of material for the film industry.</i>
rosy	Presaging good fortune. <i>Rosy predictions.</i>
<u>timely</u>	Done or occurring sufficiently early; prompt. <i>A timely warning.</i>
useful	Having a useful function. <i>A useful member of society.</i>
valuable	Having worth or merit or value. <i>My time is valuable.</i>
wealthy	Having a great deal of money, resources, or assets; rich. <i>The burden of taxation on the wealthy.</i>
welcome	Allowed or invited to do a specified thing. <i>You are welcome to join us.</i>

Resulting favorably.

well off

Wise or advantageous and hence advisable.

well timed

In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury.

<u>coincide</u>	Occur at the same time. <i>Publication is timed to coincide with a major exhibition.</i>
<u>coincidence</u>	The fact of corresponding in nature or in time of occurrence. <i>The interval determining the coincidence gate is adjustable.</i>
confiscation	Seizure by the government. <i>A court ordered the confiscation of her property.</i>
<u>crimson</u>	Turn red, as if in embarrassment or shame. <i>A pair of corduroy trousers in livid crimson they were horrid to behold.</i>

hope	Be optimistic be full of hope have hopes. <i>I hope that the kids are OK.</i>
hopefully	With hope; in a hopeful manner. <i>He rode on hopefully.</i>
incidentally	In an incidental manner; as a chance occurrence. <i>Incidentally it was many months before the whole truth was discovered.</i>
<u>kismet</u>	Destiny; fate. <i>What chance did I stand against kismet.</i>
luck	Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you). <i>They say luck is a lady.</i>
lucky	Having, bringing, or resulting from good luck. <i>My lucky day.</i>

<u>miraculous</u>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A miraculous cure.</i>
optimism	The belief that good must ultimately prevail over evil in the universe. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for optimism.</i>
<u>optimistic</u>	Expecting the best. <i>The government was optimistic that reform would take place.</i>
<u>propitious</u>	Favourably disposed towards someone. <i>A propitious alignment of planets for space exploration.</i>
providential	Resulting from divine providence. <i>They took it for granted that the order of the world reflects a designing providential hand.</i>
rosy	Promising or suggesting good fortune or happiness; hopeful. <i>A rosy cheeked schoolgirl.</i>
ruddy	Make ruddy in colour. <i>Young people today they re a ruddy shower.</i>
<u>superstition</u>	Excessively credulous belief in and reverence for the supernatural. <i>He dismissed the ghost stories as mere superstition.</i>
tallow	Smear something especially the bottom of a boat with tallow. <i>I tallowed my boats with our candles.</i>
want	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>It wanted twenty minutes to midnight.</i>
<u>wish</u>	Order politely express a wish for. <i>Anne wishes me to visit her.</i>
