<u><a href="#">coincidence</a></u>	The presence of ionizing particles or other objects in two or more detectors simultaneously, or of two or more signals simultaneously in a circuit. <i>They met by <b>coincidence</b>.</i>
<b>condition</b>	The procedure that is varied in order to estimate a variable's effect by comparison with a control condition. <i>A skin <b>condition</b>.</i>
<b>deep pockets</b>	A long steep-sided depression in the ocean floor.
<u><a href="#">destiny</a></u>	The ultimate agency regarded as predetermining the course of events (often personified as a woman). <i>She was unable to control her own <b>destiny</b>.</i>
<b>estate</b>	A class or order regarded as forming part of the body politic in particular in Britain one of the three groups constituting Parliament now the Lords spiritual the heads of the Church the Lords temporal the peerage and the Commons They are also known as the three estates. <i>The spiritual welfare of all <b>estates</b> of men.</i>
<u><a href="#">fate</a></u>	Three goddesses who presided over the birth and life of humans. Each person's destiny was thought of as a thread spun, measured, and cut by the three Fates, Clotho, Lachesis, and Atropos. <i>His injury is a cruel twist of <b>fate</b>.</i>
<b>fortuity</b>	The state of being controlled by chance. <i>It was due to an accident or <b>fortuity</b>.</i>
<b>freak</b>	A person addicted to a particular drug. <i>The teacher says the accident was a total <b>freak</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">hazard</a></u>	A permanent feature of a golf course which presents an obstruction to playing a shot, such as a bunker or stream. <i>The <b>hazards</b> of childbirth.</i>
<u><a href="#">karma</a></u>	Good or bad luck, viewed as resulting from one's actions.
<u><a href="#">kismet</a></u>	Destiny; fate. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>Officers were elected rather than selected by <b>lot</b>.</i>
<b>luck</b>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that leads to a favorable outcome. <i>They're supposed to bring good <b>luck</b>.</i>
<b>material position</b>	Things needed for doing or making something.

<b>material situation</b>	Information (data or ideas or observations) that can be used or reworked into a finished form.
<b>material status</b>	Artifact made by weaving or felting or knitting or crocheting natural or synthetic fibers.
<b>means</b>	Substantial resources; wealth. <i>He came from a family of very modest <b>means</b>.</i>
<b>millions</b>	The number that is represented as a one followed by 6 zeros. <i>There were <b>millions</b> of flies.</i>
<b><u>portion</u></b>	The part or share of an estate given or descending by law to an heir. <i>His <b>portion</b> was larger than hers.</i>
<b>possessions</b>	(sport) the act of controlling the ball (or puck). <i>They took possession of the ball on their own goal line.</i>
<b>predestination</b>	(theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<b>property</b>	Shares or investments in property. <i>The president was concerned about the <b>property</b> across from the White House.</i>
<b><u>providence</u></b>	The protective care of God or of nature as a spiritual power. <i>They found their trust in divine <b>providence</b> to be a source of comfort.</i>
<b>resources</b>	Available source of wealth; a new or reserve supply that can be drawn upon when needed. <i>A man of resource.</i>
<b>riches</b>	An abundance of material possessions and resources. <i>The <b>riches</b> of the world s waters.</i>
<b>serendipity</b>	The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way. <i>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b>.</i>
<b>state of affairs</b>	The group of people comprising the government of a sovereign state.
<b>substance</b>	The quality of having a solid basis in reality or fact. <i>A woman of <b>substance</b>.</i>
<b>the stars</b>	A celestial body of hot gases that radiates energy derived from thermonuclear reactions in the interior.



<b>treasure</b>	A very valuable object. <i>The children returned from the seashore with their shells and other <b>treasures</b>.</i>
<b>twist of fate</b>	An unforeseen development.
<b>wealth</b>	The quality of profuse abundance. <i>Great <b>wealth</b> is not a sign of great intelligence.</i>
<b>what is written in the stars</b>	A light strong brittle grey toxic bivalent metallic element.

<b><u>astrology</u></b>	The study of the movements and relative positions of celestial bodies interpreted as having an influence on human affairs and the natural world.
<b>augur</b>	(of an event or circumstance) portend a good or bad outcome. <i>The end of the cold war seemed to <b>augur</b> well.</i>
<b>bode</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>Their argument did not <b>bode</b> well for the future.</i>
<b>confiscation</b>	The action of taking or seizing someone's property with authority; seizure. <i>A court ordered the <b>confiscation</b> of her property.</i>

<b>cookie</b>	A packet of data sent by a web server to a browser, which is returned by the browser each time it subsequently accesses the same server, used to identify the user or track their access to the server. <i>Chocolate chip <b>cookies</b>.</i>
<b><u>destined</u></b>	(of a person's future) regarded as developing as though according to a pre-existing plan. <i>Your heroine will be united with her <b>destined</b> mate.</i>
<b><u>destiny</u></b>	Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you). <i>She was unable to control her own <b>destiny</b>.</i>
<b>divination</b>	The practice of seeking knowledge of the future or the unknown by supernatural means. <i>The Celtic art of <b>divination</b>.</i>
<b><u>fate</u></b>	The development of events outside a person's control, regarded as predetermined by a supernatural power. <i>The regime was <b>fated</b> to end badly.</i>
<b>fateful</b>	Having momentous consequences; of decisive importance. <i>That <b>fateful</b> meeting of the U N when it declared war on North Korea.</i>
<b>felicitate</b>	Express congratulations. <i>The award winner was <b>felicitated</b> by the cultural association.</i>
<b>forecaster</b>	A person who predicts or estimates a future event or trend. <i>Economic <b>forecasters</b> are predicting a downturn.</i>
<b>foreknowledge</b>	Knowledge of an event before it occurs. <i>There was the <b>foreknowledge</b> of every role she would dance.</i>
<b><u>foresee</u></b>	Realize beforehand. <i>It is impossible to <b>foresee</b> how life will work out.</i>
<b>foretell</b>	Foreshadow or presage. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
<b>future</b>	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the future. <i>Nobody can predict the <b>future</b>.</i>
<b><u>kismet</u></b>	Destiny; fate. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>luck</b>	Success or failure apparently brought by chance rather than through one's own actions. <i>Bad <b>luck</b> caused his downfall.</i>
<b>lucky</b>	Presaging or likely to bring good luck. <i>A <b>lucky</b> guess.</i>

<b>omen</b>	Indicate as with a sign or an omen. <i>The ghost's appearance was an ill <b>omen</b>.</i>
<b>predict</b>	Make a prediction about tell in advance. <i>It is too early to <b>predict</b> a result.</i>
<b>prefigure</b>	Indicate by signs. <i>It wasn't as bad as I had <b>prefigured</b>.</i>
<b>prognosticate</b>	Foretell or prophesy (a future event). <i>The economists were <b>prognosticating</b> financial Armageddon.</i>
<b>prognostication</b>	A statement made about the future. <i>An unprecedented amount of soul searching and <b>prognostication</b>.</i>
<b><u>prophecy</u></b>	The faculty or practice of prophesying. <i>A bleak <b>prophecy</b> of war and ruin.</i>
<b>prophecy</b>	Predict or reveal through, or as if through, divine inspiration. <i>Jacques was <b>propheying</b> a bumper harvest.</i>
<b>soothsayer</b>	Someone who makes predictions of the future (usually on the basis of special knowledge).
<b><u>superstition</u></b>	An irrational belief arising from ignorance or fear. <i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she'd had since childhood.</i>
<b>tallow</b>	Smear something especially the bottom of a boat with tallow. <i>I <b>tallowed</b> my boats with our candles.</i>
<b>wealth</b>	The state of being rich and affluent; having a plentiful supply of material goods and money. <i>Some people buy boats and cars to display their <b>wealth</b>.</i>
