altercation	A noisy argument or disagreement, especially in public. I had an <b>altercation</b> with the ticket collector.
argue	Present reasons and arguments. I wasn t going to <b>argue</b> with a gun.
<u>argument</u>	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression y F x x the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y. <i>The argument over foreign aid goes on and on.</i>
bellicose	Having or showing a ready disposition to fight. A mood of <b>bellicose</b> jingoism.
bicker	Argue over petty things. The restless wheels whose flashing spokes <b>bicker</b> and burn.
brawl	A rough or noisy fight or quarrel. He d got into a drunken <b>brawl</b> in a bar.
combative	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A combative impulse</i> .
conflict	Be in conflict. Parents and children s interests sometimes <b>conflict</b> .
<u>confrontational</u>	Tending to deal with situations in an aggressive way; hostile or argumentative. <i>He distanced himself from the</i> <b>confrontational</b> <i>approach adopted by his</i> <i>predecessor.</i>
<u>contend</u>	To make the subject of dispute, contention, or litigation. <i>He <b>contend</b>s that the judge was wrong.</i>
<u>contention</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. The captured territory was the main area of <b>contention</b> between the two countries.



<u>contentious</u>	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>The socio economic plan had been the subject of</i> <b>contentious</b> <i>debate</i> .
<u>controversy</u>	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. The design of the building has caused <b>controversy</b> .
counterattack	Make a counterattack.
<u>disagree</u>	(of statements or accounts) be inconsistent or fail to correspond. No one was willing to <b>disagree</b> with him.
<u>disagreement</u>	Lack of consensus or approval. There was some <b>disagreement</b> about the details.
<u>discord</u>	(of things) be different. The party s views were apt to <b>discord</b> with those of the leading members of the government.
disputatious	Fond of having heated arguments. A <b>disputatious</b> lawyer.
dispute	Take exception to. An industrial <b>dispute</b> .
dissension	Disagreement among those expected to cooperate. These issues caused bitter <b>dissension</b> in the party.
factious	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion. A <i>factious</i> country.
<u>quarrel</u>	Have a heated argument or disagreement. We <b>quarrel</b> ed over the question as to who discovered America.
quarrelsome	Given to quarreling. <i>Quarrelsome</i> when drinking.
<u>rivalry</u>	Competition for the same objective or for superiority in the same field. There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.
strife	Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. <i>Decades of civil strife</i> .
struggle	A forceful or violent effort to get free of restraint or resist attack. The centre is the result of the scientists <b>struggle</b> to realize their dream.
tussle	Make messy or untidy. There was a <b>tussle</b> for the ball.
<u>wrangle</u>	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining. <i>Wrangle</i> horses.
wrangling	An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining. Weeks of political <b>wrangling</b> .
