| altercation | A noisy argument or disagreement, especially in public. <i>I had an altercation with the ticket collector.</i> |
| argue | Present reasons and arguments. <i>I wasn't going to argue with a gun.</i> |
| argument | An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value. For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y . <i>The argument over foreign aid goes on and on.</i> |
| bellicose | Having or showing a ready disposition to fight. <i>A mood of bellicose jingoism.</i> |
| bicker | Argue over petty things. <i>The restless wheels whose flashing spokes bicker and burn.</i> |
| brawl | A rough or noisy fight or quarrel. <i>He'd got into a drunken brawl in a bar.</i> |
| combative | Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A combative impulse.</i> |
| conflict | Be in conflict. <i>Parents and children's interests sometimes conflict.</i> |
| confrontational | Tending to deal with situations in an aggressive way; hostile or argumentative. <i>He distanced himself from the confrontational approach adopted by his predecessor.</i> |
| contend | To make the subject of dispute, contention, or litigation. <i>He contends that the judge was wrong.</i> |
| contention | The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>The captured territory was the main area of contention between the two countries.</i> |

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| <u>contentious</u> | Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>The socio economic plan had been the subject of contentious debate.</i> |
| <u>controversy</u> | A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The design of the building has caused controversy.</i> |
| counterattack | Make a counterattack. |
| <u>disagree</u> | (of statements or accounts) be inconsistent or fail to correspond. <i>No one was willing to disagree with him.</i> |
| <u>disagreement</u> | Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some disagreement about the details.</i> |
| <u>discord</u> | (of things) be different. <i>The party's views were apt to discord with those of the leading members of the government.</i> |
| disputatious | Fond of having heated arguments. <i>A disputatious lawyer.</i> |
| dispute | Take exception to. <i>An industrial dispute.</i> |
| dissension | Disagreement among those expected to cooperate. <i>These issues caused bitter dissension in the party.</i> |
| factious | Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>A factious country.</i> |
| <u>quarrel</u> | Have a heated argument or disagreement. <i>We quarreled over the question as to who discovered America.</i> |
| quarrelsome | Given to quarreling. <i>Quarrelsome when drinking.</i> |
| <u>rivalry</u> | Competition for the same objective or for superiority in the same field. <i>There always has been intense rivalry between the clubs.</i> |
| strife | Angry or bitter disagreement over fundamental issues; conflict. <i>Decades of civil strife.</i> |
| struggle | A forceful or violent effort to get free of restraint or resist attack. <i>The centre is the result of the scientists struggle to realize their dream.</i> |
| tussle | Make messy or untidy. <i>There was a tussle for the ball.</i> |
| <u>wrangle</u> | An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining). <i>Wrangle horses.</i> |
| wrangling | An instance of intense argument (as in bargaining). <i>Weeks of political wrangling.</i> |

wrestle

The act of engaging in close hand-to-hand combat.
*A lifelong **wrestle** with depression.*
