- *A numerical quantity that is not a whole number (e.g. 1/2, 0.5).*
- *A small or tiny part, amount, or proportion of something.*
- *A small part or item forming a piece of a whole.*
- *(in the Christian Church) the breaking of the Eucharistic bread.*
- *Each of the portions into which a mixture may be separated according to a physical property such as boiling point or solubility.*
- *A component of a mixture that has been separated by a fractional process.*
- *The quotient of two rational numbers.*

bit	The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press. <i>A bit of rock caught him in the eye.</i>
dash	A journey or period of time characterized by urgency or eager haste. <i>An indicator on the dash tells you what gear you are in.</i>
fragment	A piece broken off or cut off of something else. <i>Fragments of a play.</i>
hint	A just detectable amount. <i>A hint mockery in her manner.</i>
jot	A very small amount. <i>You didn't care a jot.</i>
little	A small amount or duration. <i>He accepted the little they gave him.</i>

mite	A minute arachnid which has four pairs of legs when adult, related to the ticks. Many kinds live in the soil and a number are parasitic on plants or animals.
modicum	A small or moderate or token amount- Ian Jack. <i>England still expects a modicum of eccentricity in its artists.</i>
<u>scrap</u>	Worthless material that is to be disposed of. <i>The unhappy couple got into a terrible scrap.</i>
selection	A plot of land acquired by selection. <i>There has been more than enough time for selection to generate specific DNA sequences of the required length.</i>
<u>shade</u>	A lampshade. <i>Don't argue about shades of meaning.</i>
small part	A garment size for a small person.
smattering	A small number or amount. <i>Edward had only a smattering of Welsh.</i>
snippet	A small piece of anything (especially a piece that has been snipped off). <i>Snippets of information about the war.</i>
soupçon	A slight but appreciable amount.
<u>spot</u>	A small feature or part of something with a particular quality. <i>A nice secluded spot.</i>
touch	An act of touching someone or something. <i>The cooling touch of the night air.</i>
trifle	A detail that is considered insignificant. <i>Syllabubs trifles and other dishes.</i>

- *He hesitated for a fraction of a second.*

divide Allocate (different parts of one's time or efforts) to different activities or places.
Divide 4 into 20.

apportion

Give out as one's portion or share.

*Voting power will be **apportioned** according to contribution.*

bit

The cutting part of a drill usually pointed and threaded and is replaceable in a brace or bitstock or drill press.

*A **bit** of lint.*

cleavage

The hollow between a woman's breasts when supported, especially as exposed by a low-cut garment.

*The cell undergoes **cleavage** and segmentation and develops into a blastula.*

cleave

Split (a molecule) by breaking a particular chemical bond.

*They watched a coot **cleave** the smooth water.*

dichotomy

A division or contrast between two things that are or are represented as being opposed or entirely different.

*The **dichotomy** between eastern and western culture.*

<u>divide</u>	Separate into parts or portions. <i>The cell clusters began to divide rapidly.</i>
division	A group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>The main divisions of the book.</i>
<u>flake</u>	A snowflake. <i>Cook until the fish flakes easily.</i>
fractional	Constituting or comprising a part or fraction of a possible whole or entirety. <i>There was a fractional hesitation before he said yes.</i>
<u>fracture</u>	A diphthong substituted by fracture. <i>Fracture the balance of power.</i>
fragment	Break or cause to break into fragments. <i>Lough Erne fragmented into a series of lakes.</i>
fragmentation	Separating something into fine particles. <i>Fragmentation slows system performance because it takes extra time to locate and assemble the parts of the fragmented file.</i>
moiety	A part or portion, especially a lesser share. <i>The enzyme removes the sulphate moiety.</i>
part	That which concerns a person with regard to a particular role or situation. <i>There was a good deal of kissing before we parted.</i>
<u>partially</u>	In part; in some degree; not wholly. <i>He was partially paralyzed.</i>
partition	Divide a room into smaller rooms or areas by erecting partitions. <i>Partition chromatography.</i>
piece	To join or unite the pieces of. <i>She pieced a quilt.</i>
<u>portion</u>	A part of a whole. <i>Earthy fresh and generously portioned food.</i>
<u>rupture</u>	The act of making a sudden noisy break. <i>The rupture with his father would never be healed.</i>
schism	The formal separation of a church into two churches or the withdrawal of one group over doctrinal differences. <i>Another schism like that and they will wind up in bankruptcy.</i>
<u>scrap</u>	Make into scrap or refuse. <i>A bold decision was taken to scrap existing plant.</i>
secant	A straight line that cuts a curve in two or more parts.

<u>section</u>	Commit someone compulsorily to a psychiatric hospital in accordance with a section of a mental health act. <i>She began to section the grapefruit.</i>
<u>sector</u>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The public sector.</i>
segment	Divide into segments. <i>A large segment of the local population.</i>
segmentation	Division into separate parts or sections. <i>Segmentation of myocardial cells.</i>
splinter	Break up into splinters or slivers. <i>He got a splinter in his finger.</i>
<u>split</u>	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. <i>The river had split into a number of channels.</i>
subdivision	An area composed of subdivided lots. <i>Subject subdivisions.</i>
sunder	Break apart or in two, using violence. <i>A universe sundered ages ago in a divine war.</i>
