- *Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion.*
- *Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way.*



Synonyms of "Frantic" as an adjective (16 Words)

agitated	Physically disturbed or set in motion. <i>She was red and agitated with the effort of arguing.</i>
berserk	Out of control with anger or excitement; wild or frenzied. <i>Berserk with grief.</i>
<u>delirious</u>	In a state of wild excitement or ecstasy. <i>A crowd of delirious baseball fans.</i>
<u>distraught</u>	Very worried and upset. <i>Distraught with grief.</i>
distressed	Generalized feeling of distress. <i>Women in distressed circumstances.</i>
excited	Very enthusiastic and eager. <i>They were excited about the prospect.</i>

frenetic	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>A frenetic pace of activity.</i>
frenzied	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>A frenzied attack.</i>
mad	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>I got mad respect for him.</i>
overwrought	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>She was too overwrought to listen to reason.</i>
panic-stricken	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation.
panic-struck	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation.
panicky	Feeling or characterized by uncontrollable fear or anxiety. <i>I started to feel panicky and breathless.</i>
phrenetic	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion.
<u>unrestrained</u>	Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion. <i>A display of unrestrained delight.</i>
worked up	Open.

- *Something frantic in their gaiety.*

celerity	Swiftness of movement.
crazy	Extremely. <i>Wore a crazy hat.</i>
delirium	Wild excitement or ecstasy. <i>A chorus of delirium from the terrace.</i>
dizzy	Make dizzy or giddy. <i>He looked around dizzy with happiness.</i>
frenetic	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>Frenetic screams followed the accident.</i>
frenzied	Wildly excited or uncontrolled. <i>The prosecutor's frenzied denunciation of the accused.</i>
frenzy	State of violent mental agitation. <i>Doreen worked herself into a frenzy of rage.</i>
fury	The hideous snake-haired monsters (usually three in number) who pursued unpunished criminals. <i>The fury of a gathering storm.</i>

hectic	A hectic fever or flush. <i>A hectic business schedule.</i>
hie	Move hurridly. <i>I hied down to New Orleans.</i>
hurry	A condition of urgency making it necessary to hurry. <i>Hurry it's late.</i>
hysteria	Excessive or uncontrollable fear. <i>The anti Semitic hysteria of the 1890s.</i>

<u>insane</u>	In a state of mind which prevents normal perception, behaviour, or social interaction; seriously mentally ill. <i>Was declared insane.</i>
<u>lunatic</u>	An insane person. <i>He would be asked to acquiesce in some lunatic scheme.</i>
mad	Make someone mad. <i>A mad whirl of pleasure.</i>
mania	An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. <i>Many people suffering from mania do not think anything is wrong.</i>
manic	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>The pace is utterly manic.</i>
overwrought	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>A pseudo Gothic church far too overwrought for such a small town.</i>
psychosis	A severe mental disorder in which thought and emotions are so impaired that contact is lost with external reality. <i>They were suffering from a psychosis.</i>
quicken	Give or restore life to. <i>The fetus quickened.</i>
<u>rabid</u>	(of an animal) affected with rabies. <i>Rabid isolationist.</i>
raving	In a raving manner. <i>Raving mad.</i>
rush	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>She felt a rush of cold air.</i>
rushing	The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner. <i>He is becoming the best rushing quarterback in NFL history.</i>
schizophrenia	Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact. <i>Gibraltar s schizophrenia continues to be fed by colonial pride.</i>
swiftness	Lack of delay; promptness. <i>Kay had the upper hand with her agility and swiftness.</i>
urgently	In a way which requires immediate action or attention. <i>Health care reform is needed urgently.</i>
wild	A wild primitive state untouched by civilization. <i>A wild stretch of land.</i>
