mad Affected with madness or insanity.

**overwrought** Deeply agitated especially from emotion.

She was too **overwrought** to listen to reason.

panic-stricken Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation.

**panic-struck** Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation.

**panicky**Feeling or characterized by uncontrollable fear or anxiety.

Let arted to feel panicky and breathless.

I started to feel **panicky** and breathless.

**phrenetic** Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion.

Marked by uncontrolled excitement or emotion.

unrestrained

A display of unrestrained delight.

A severe mental disorder in which thought and emotions are so impaired

**psychosis** that contact is lost with external reality.

They were suffering from a **psychosis**.

**quicken** Give or restore life to.

The fetus **quicken**ed.

rabid (of an animal) affected with rabies.

**Rabid** isolationist.

raving In a raving manner.

**Raving** mad.

rush Cause to move fast or to rush or race.

She felt a **rush** of cold air.

**rushing**The act of moving hurriedly and in a careless manner.

He is becoming the best **rushing** quarterback in NFL history.

Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality

schizophrenia and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social

contact.
