Associations of "Free will" (30 Words)

autonomous	Denoting or performed by a device capable of operating without direct human control. <i>The spread of autonomous robotic weaponry.</i>
complimentary	Expressing a compliment; praising or approving. <i>A complimentary bottle of wine.</i>
discretion	Freedom to act or judge on one’s own. <i>Local authorities should use their discretion in setting the charges.</i>
disengage	Release from something that holds fast, connects, or entangles. <i>They clung together for a moment then she disengaged herself.</i>
dislodge	Knock or force out of position. <i>The hoofs of their horses dislodged loose stones.</i>
emancipate	Free from slavery or servitude. <i>The plaintiffs had not been entirely emancipated from their father’s control.</i>
emancipation	The fact or process of being set free from legal, social, or political restrictions; liberation. <i>The early struggle for emancipation from slavery.</i>
footloose	(of a commercial, industrial, or financial operation) unrestricted in its location or field of operations and able to respond to fluctuations in the market. <i>I am footloose and fancy free I can follow my job wherever it takes me.</i>
freedom	The state of being unrestricted and able to move easily. <i>He was a champion of Irish freedom.</i>
gratis	Given or done for nothing; free. <i>A monthly programme was issued gratis.</i>
illimitable	Without limits in extent or size or quantity. <i>The illimitable human capacity for evil.</i>

<u>inexpensive</u>	Relatively low in price or charging low prices. <i>Inexpensive family restaurants.</i>
leeway	The amount of freedom to move or act that is available. <i>The leeway is only about 2.</i>
<u>liberate</u>	Steal (something). <i>Twelve months earlier Paris had been liberated.</i>
<u>liberation</u>	The action of setting someone free from imprisonment, slavery, or oppression; release. <i>The struggle for women's liberation.</i>
<u>liberty</u>	The personification of liberty as a female figure. <i>How did he know what she was thinking it was a liberty.</i>
<u>limitless</u>	Without end, limit, or boundary. <i>The limitless reaches of outer space.</i>
<u>loosely</u>	Without regard to specific details or exceptions. <i>Cover loosely with foil and bake in a preheated oven.</i>
looseness	A lack of strict accuracy; laxity of practice. <i>Misunderstandings can often be traced to a looseness of expression.</i>
manumit	Free from slavery or servitude. <i>Old Angus had never manumitted a single slave.</i>
renewable	A natural resource or source of energy that is not depleted by use, such as water, wind, or solar power. <i>A shift away from fossil fuels to renewable energy.</i>
separatist	Relating to separatists or separatism. <i>Religious separatists.</i>
<u>unbounded</u>	Seemingly boundless in amount, number, degree, or especially extent. <i>Unbounded enthusiasm.</i>
<u>unbridled</u>	Not restrained or controlled. <i>Unbridled lust.</i>
unencumbered	Free of encumbrance. <i>He needed to travel light and unencumbered.</i>
unfettered	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
<u>unofficial</u>	Denoting strike action not called or endorsed by the union to which the strikers belong. <i>He participated in an unofficial capacity.</i>
<u>unorganized</u>	Not represented by or formed into a trade union. <i>Unorganized data.</i>

unrestricted Accessible to all.
***Unrestricted** access to both military bases.*

untie Cause to become loose.
*She knelt to **untie** her laces.*
