<b>correspondent</b>	Someone who communicates by means of letters. <i>A cricket <b>correspondent</b>.</i>
<b>feature writer</b>	An article of merchandise that is displayed or advertised more than other articles.
<b>free lance</b>	People who are free.
<b>free-lance</b>	A writer or artist who sells services to different employers without a long-term contract with any of them.
<b>freelancer</b>	A person who works freelance.
<b>hireling</b>	A person who works purely for material reward. <i>The government s paid <b>hirelings</b> assure us that we re on our way out of recession.</i>

<b>independent</b>	An independent person or body. <i>He stood unsuccessfully as an <b>independent</b> in 1992.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	A person who writes for newspapers, magazines, or news websites or prepares news to be broadcast. <i>Foreign <b>journalists</b> had been expelled from the area.</i>
<b>penman</b>	Informal terms for journalists. <i>This talented <b>penman</b> s work.</i>
<b>professional soldier</b>	An authority qualified to teach apprentices.
<b>reporter</b>	A person who reports, especially one employed to report news or conduct interviews for the press or broadcasting media.
<b>self-employed person</b>	A human body (usually including the clothing).
<b>soldier of fortune</b>	A wingless sterile ant or termite having a large head and powerful jaws adapted for defending the colony.
<b>writer</b>	A person who has written something or who writes in a particular way. <i>A <b>writer</b> of short stories.</i>

***Mercenary** killers.*
- paid** (of a person in a specified occupation) in receipt of pay.  
*Five weeks **paid** holiday a year.*
- professional** Worthy of or appropriate to a professional person competent skilful or assured.  
*She s a wonderful actress to work with and of course very **professional**.*
- self-employed** Working for yourself.
- venal** Showing or motivated by susceptibility to bribery; corrupt.  
*A **venal** police officer.*

## Associations of "Freelance" (30 Words)

**annalist**

A person who writes annals.

**argument**

An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression  $y = F(x)$  the arguments of the function  $F$  are  $x$  and  $x$  and the value is  $y$ .

*The **argument** over foreign aid goes on and on.*

**article**

The definite or indefinite article.

*An **article** of clothing.*

**author**

Be the author of a book or piece of writing.

*He is the **author** of several books on the subject.*

**bard**

A poet, traditionally one reciting epics and associated with a particular oral tradition.

*Our national **bard** Robert Burns.*

<b>biographer</b>	A person who writes an account of someone's life. <i>An important <b>biographer</b> of contemporary artists.</i>
<b>broadcaster</b>	A person who presents a radio or television transmission. <i>The <b>broadcaster</b> aired the news item on Tuesday.</i>
<b>cameraman</b>	A photographer who operates a movie camera.
<b>cartoonist</b>	A person who draws cartoons. <i>A political <b>cartoonist</b> for the local newspaper.</i>
<b>commentator</b>	A writer who reports and analyzes events of the day. <i><b>Commentators</b> noted that the demonstration was part of a wider strategy.</i>
<b>contributor</b>	A causal factor in the existence or occurrence of something. <i>Australia is also a major <b>contributor</b> of development assistance to the region.</i>
<b>correspondent</b>	A person employed to report for a newspaper or broadcasting organization. <i>A cricket <b>correspondent</b>.</i>
<b>debate</b>	Think about carefully; weigh. <i>He <b>debated</b> whether he should leave the matter alone or speak to her.</i>
<b>dramatist</b>	A person who writes plays.
<b>editor</b>	A person responsible for the editorial aspects of publication the person who determines the final content of a text especially of a newspaper or magazine. <i>A sports <b>editor</b>.</i>
<b>free</b>	People who are free. <i>She was always <b>free</b> with her money.</i>
<b>journal</b>	Write in a journal or diary. <i>Medical <b>journals</b>.</i>
<b>journalist</b>	Someone who keeps a diary or journal. <i>Foreign <b>journalists</b> had been expelled from the area.</i>
<b>lyricist</b>	A person who writes the words to a popular song or musical.
<b>magazine</b>	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>Tripped over a pile of <b>magazines</b>.</i>
<b>newspaper</b>	A business firm that publishes newspapers. <i>Murdoch owns many <b>newspapers</b>.</i>
<b>novelist</b>	One who writes novels.



<b>pamphleteer</b>	A writer of pamphlets (usually taking a partisan stand on public issues. <i>The right to <b>pamphleteer</b> and post bills anonymously is as important today as it was three centuries ago.</i>
<b>photographer</b>	A person who takes photographs, especially as a job. <i>A freelance press <b>photographer</b>.</i>
<b>readership</b>	The audience reached by written communications (books or magazines or newspapers etc. <i>The magazine has a <b>readership</b> of just 65 000.</i>
<b>reporter</b>	A person who investigates and reports or edits news stories.
<b>reporting</b>	The news as presented by reporters for newspapers or radio or television.
<b>subscriber</b>	Someone who contracts to receive and pay for a service or a certain number of issues of a publication. <i><b>Subscribers</b> to the distress fund.</i>
<b>tragedian</b>	An actor who specializes in tragic roles.
<b>writer</b>	A scribe. <i>Dickens was a prolific <b>writer</b>.</i>
