## Synonyms of "Freely" as an adverb (27 Words)

<b>all over the place</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
<b>amply</b>	Enough or more than enough; plentifully. <i>The persistent reader is <b>amply</b> rewarded.</i>
<b>bluntly</b>	In a blunt direct manner. <i>He spoke <b>bluntly</b>.</i>
<b>candidly</b>	It is sincerely the case that (used as intensives reflecting the speaker’s attitude). <i>He <b>candidly</b> discussed his efforts to find employment.</i>
<b>copiously</b>	In an expansive or wide-ranging way. <i>I was drinking <b>copiously</b>.</i>
<b>directly</b>	In a frank way. <i>I went <b>directly</b> after breakfast.</i>

<b>everywhere</b>	In or to all places. <i>You find fast food stores <b>everywhere</b>.</i>
<b>explicitly</b>	(in reference to representations of sexual activity) graphically and vividly. <i>The essay should state <b>explicitly</b> how the facts support the thesis.</i>
<b><u>extensively</u></b>	To a large or detailed degree. <i>He has written <b>extensively</b> about the project.</i>
<b>exuberantly</b>	In an exuberant manner. <i>The <b>exuberantly</b> baroque decoration of the church.</i>
<b><u>frankly</u></b>	Used to emphasize the truth of a statement, however unpalatable this may be. <i>She talks very <b>frankly</b> about herself.</i>
<b>in abundance</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in great quantity</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in huge numbers</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in large quantities</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in plenty</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in profusion</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>openly</b>	Without concealment, deception, or prevarication, especially where these might be expected; frankly or honestly. <i>A lecturer who had <b>openly</b> criticized the government.</i>
<b>outspokenly</b>	In an outspoken manner.
<b>plainly</b>	Unmistakably plain is often used informally for plainly. <i>She is <b>plainly</b> dressed in a T shirt and trousers.</i>
<b>plentifully</b>	In a bountiful manner.
<b><u>profusely</u></b>	In an abundant manner. <i>The waiter was <b>profusely</b> apologetic.</i>
<b><u>readily</u></b>	Without delay or difficulty; easily. <i>Transport is <b>readily</b> available.</i>
<b>straightforwardly</b>	In a way that is uncomplicated and easy to do or understand. <i>Dealt <b>straightforwardly</b> with all issues.</i>
<b>unreservedly</b>	Without reservations; completely. <i>We like to be able to talk <b>unreservedly</b> about ourselves.</i>
<b>voluntarily</b>	Of one's own free will. <i>He <b>voluntarily</b> attended a police station.</i>

**willingly**

Readily; of one's own free will.  
*She went **willingly**.*

<b><u>adaptable</u></b>	Able to be modified for a new use or purpose. <i>To succeed one must be <b>adaptable</b>.</i>
<b><u>alacrity</u></b>	Liveliness and eagerness. <i>She accepted the invitation with <b>alacrity</b>.</i>
<b>changeable</b>	Varying in color when seen in different lights or from different angles. <i><b>Changeable</b> behavior.</i>

<b>easily</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>He was <b>easily</b> the bravest man I've ever met.</i>
<b>easy</b>	With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily. <i>An <b>easy</b> mark.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Clearly expressing or indicating something. <i>An <b>eloquent</b> speech.</i>
<b>exoteric</b>	Suitable for the general public. <i>Writings of an <b>exoteric</b> nature.</i>
<b>flexible</b>	Capable of being changed. <i>A <b>flexible</b> personality.</i>
<b>flowing</b>	Designed or arranged to offer the least resistant to fluid flow. <i>A long <b>flowing</b> gown of lavender silk.</i>
<b>fluent</b>	Able to speak or write a particular foreign language easily and accurately. <i>She became <b>fluent</b> in French and German.</i>
<b>frankly</b>	(used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude) it is sincerely the case that. <i><b>Frankly</b> I was pleased to leave.</i>
<b>fraternize</b>	Associate or form a friendship with someone, especially when one is not supposed to. <i>She ignored Elisabeth's warning glare against fraternizing with the enemy.</i>
<b>freedom</b>	A special privilege or right of access, especially that of full citizenship of a city granted to a public figure as an honour. <i>Government policies to achieve <b>freedom</b> from want.</i>
<b>handy</b>	Ready to hand. <i>A hotel in a <b>handy</b> central location.</i>
<b>liberal</b>	Having political or social views favoring reform and progress. <i>Are we dealing with a polarization between <b>liberals</b> and conservatives.</i>
<b>openly</b>	In an open way. <i>A lecturer who had <b>openly</b> criticized the government.</i>
<b>promptly</b>	With little or no delay; immediately. <i>I won my appeal but instead of reinstating me they <b>promptly</b> sacked me again.</i>

<b><u>pushover</u></b>	A try in which one side in a scrum pushes the ball over the opponents' goal line. <i>This is going to be a <b>pushover</b>.</i>
<b><u>readily</u></b>	In a punctual manner. <i>Transport is <b>readily</b> available.</i>
<b>redeemable</b>	Able to be converted into ready money or the equivalent. <i>They were misguided but ultimately <b>redeemable</b>.</i>
<b><u>simply</u></b>	Absolutely; altogether; really. <i>It is <b>simply</b> a matter of time.</i>
<b>soul</b>	A human being. <i>He was the <b>soul</b> of discretion.</i>
<b>useful</b>	Having a useful function. <i>The girl felt motherly and <b>useful</b>.</i>
<b>utilizable</b>	Capable of being put to a profitable or practical use.
<b>warranty</b>	A written guarantee, issued to the purchaser of an article by its manufacturer, promising to repair or replace it if necessary within a specified period of time. <i>You have no <b>warranty</b> for such an audacious doctrine.</i>
