- *A state or period of uncontrolled excitement or wild behaviour.*



Synonyms of "Frenzy" as a noun (22 Words)

- agitation** A state of agitation or turbulent change or development.
*The techniques mostly involve **agitation** by stirring.*
- bout** A division during which one team is on the offensive.
*He fought 350 **bouts** losing only nine times.*
- craze** State of violent mental agitation.
*The new **craze** for step aerobics.*
- delirium** A usually brief state of excitement and mental confusion often accompanied by hallucinations.
*A chorus of **delirium** from the terrace.*
- dementedness** Mental deterioration of organic or functional origin.
- derangement** A state of mental disturbance and disorientation.

<u>distraction</u>	Extreme agitation of the mind. <i>The firm found passenger travel a distraction from the main business of moving freight.</i>
fever	Intense nervous anticipation. <i>Election fever reaches its climax tomorrow.</i>
feverishness	A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection.
fit	The particular way in which something especially a garment or component fits. <i>He had a fit.</i>
<u>fury</u>	Extreme strength or violence in an action or a natural phenomenon. <i>Tears of fury and frustration.</i>
<u>hysteria</u>	Excessive or uncontrollable fear. <i>The anti Semitic hysteria of the 1890s.</i>
<u>insanity</u>	Relatively permanent disorder of the mind. <i>It might be pure insanity to take this loan.</i>
<u>madness</u>	Unrestrained excitement or enthusiasm. <i>Poetry is a sort of divine madness.</i>
mania	An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. <i>He had a mania for automobiles.</i>
outburst	A sudden intense happening. <i>An outburst of heavy rain.</i>
paroxysm	A sudden attack or outburst of a particular emotion or activity. <i>A paroxysm of giggling.</i>
seizure	The act of taking of a person by force. <i>The seizure of the Assembly building.</i>
<u>spasm</u>	Prolonged involuntary muscle contraction. <i>The airways in the lungs go into spasm.</i>
tumult	A state of confusion or disorder. <i>His personal tumult ended when he began writing songs.</i>
<u>turmoil</u>	A violent disturbance. <i>He endured years of inner turmoil.</i>
wildness	Lack of sound reasoning or probability. <i>Liza had always had a tendency to wildness.</i>

Associations of "Frenzy" (30 Words)

bipolar

Of a person suffering from bipolar disorder.
*A sharply **bipolar** division of affluent and underclass.*

crazy

Extremely enthusiastic.
*I m **crazy** about Cindy.*

delirium

Wild excitement or ecstasy.
*Somewhere a patient shouted in **delirium**.*

enthusiasm

Something that arouses enthusiasm.
***Enthusiasm** for his program is growing.*

epilepsy

A disorder of the central nervous system characterized by loss of consciousness and convulsions.

excitement

Something that arouses a feeling of excitement.
*He could hardly conceal his **excitement** when she agreed.*

fanatic

A person motivated by irrational enthusiasm (as for a cause)-Winston Churchill.
*A **fanatic** is one who can t change his mind and won t change the subject.*

frantic	Conducted in a hurried, excited, and disorganized way. <i>She was frantic with worry.</i>
frenetic	Excessively agitated; distraught with fear or other violent emotion. <i>A frenetic pace of activity.</i>
frenzied	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason. <i>The prosecutor s frenzied denunciation of the accused.</i>
fury	Wild or violent anger. <i>Rachel shouted beside herself with fury.</i>
hypersensitive	Having extreme physical sensitivity to particular substances or conditions. <i>Hypersensitive to pollen.</i>
hysteria	Exaggerated or uncontrollable emotion or excitement. <i>The anti Semitic hysteria of the 1890s.</i>
hysterical	Extremely funny. <i>Hysterical laughter.</i>
insane	Very foolish. <i>Insane laughter.</i>
lunatic	Insane and believed to be affected by the phases of the moon. <i>He would be asked to acquiesce in some lunatic scheme.</i>
mad	Make someone mad. <i>Mad at his friend.</i>
mania	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>He had a mania for automobiles.</i>
manic	Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason- H.W.Carter. <i>The pace is utterly manic.</i>
neurosis	(in non-technical use) excessive and irrational anxiety or obsession. <i>Freud s two stage account of neurosis.</i>
overwrought	(of a piece of writing or a work of art) too elaborate or complicated in design or construction. <i>A pseudo Gothic church far too overwrought for such a small town.</i>
paranoia	Unjustified suspicion and mistrust of other people. <i>Mild paranoia afflicts all prime ministers.</i>
passionate	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>Passionate pleas for help.</i>
psychosis	Any severe mental disorder in which contact with reality is lost or highly distorted. <i>They were suffering from a psychosis.</i>

rabid

Of or infected by rabies.
*Her mother was bitten by a **rabid** dog.*

raving

In a raving manner.
*Have you gone **raving** mad.*

rushing

The action of moving with urgent haste.
*Despite all the **rushing** and hustling we still feel on Christmas there is something wonderful about life.*

schizophrenia

Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social contact.
*Gibraltar's **schizophrenia** continues to be fed by colonial pride.*

spinster

An elderly unmarried woman.

zealous

Marked by active interest and enthusiasm.
*The council was extremely **zealous** in the application of the regulations.*
