feverishness A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection.

He had a fit.

Extreme strength or violence in an action or a natural phenomenon. **fury**

Tears of **fury** and frustration.

Excessive or uncontrollable fear. **hysteria**

The anti Semitic **hysteria** of the 1890s.

Relatively permanent disorder of the mind. insanity

It might be pure **insanity** to take this loan.

Unrestrained excitement or enthusiasm. madness

Poetry is a sort of divine **madness**.

An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. mania

He had a **mania** for automobiles.

A sudden intense happening. outburst

An **outburst** of heavy rain.

A sudden attack or outburst of a particular emotion or activity. paroxysm

A paroxysm of giggling.

The act of taking of a person by force. seizure

The **seizure** of the Assembly building.

Prolonged involuntary muscle contraction. **spasm**

The airways in the lungs go into **spasm**.

A state of confusion or disorder.

tumult

His personal **tumult** ended when he began writing songs.

A violent disturbance. turmoil

He endured years of inner turmoil.

Lack of sound reasoning or probability. wildness

Liza had always had a tendency to wildness.

The prosecutor s **frenzied** denunciation of the accused.

fury Wild or violent anger.

Rachel shouted beside herself with **fury**.

hypersensitive Having extreme physical sensitivity to particular substances or conditions.

Hypersensitive to pollen.

hysteria Exaggerated or uncontrollable emotion or excitement.

The anti Semitic **hysteria** of the 1890s.

hysterical Extremely funny.

Hysterical laughter.

Hysterical laughter. Verv foolish.

insane Insane laughter.

lunatic Insane and believed to be affected by the phases of the moon.

He would be asked to acquiesce in some **lunatic** scheme.

mad Make someone mad.

Mad at his friend.

mania An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession.

He had a **mania** for automobiles.

Affected with or marked by frenzy or mania uncontrolled by reason-

manic H.W.Carter.

The pace is utterly **manic**.

neurosis (in non-technical use) excessive and irrational anxiety or obsession.

Freud s two stage account of **neurosis**.

(of a piece of writing or a work of art) too elaborate or complicated in

overwrought design or construction.

A pseudo Gothic church far too **overwrought** for such a small town.

Unjustified suspicion and mistrust of other people.

paranoia

Mild paranoia afflicts all prime ministers.

Arising from intense feelings of sexual love.

Passionate Passionate pleas for help.

Any severe mental disorder in which contact with reality is lost or highly

psychosis distorted.

They were suffering from a **psychosis**.



rabid Of or infected by rabies.

Her mother was bitten by a rabid dog.

raving In a raving manner.

Have you gone **raving** mad.

The action of moving with urgent haste.

rushing Despite all the **rushing** and hustling we still feel on Christmas there is

something wonderful about life.

Any of several psychotic disorders characterized by distortions of reality

and disturbances of thought and language and withdrawal from social

schizophrenia contact.

Gibraltar s **schizophrenia** continues to be fed by colonial pride.

spinster An elderly unmarried woman.

Marked by active interest and enthusiasm.

The council was extremely **zealous** in the application of the regulations.
