Frequency as a Noun

Definitions of "Frequency" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “frequency” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The fact or state of being frequent or happening often.*
- *The ratio of the number of observations in a statistical category to the total number of observations.*
- *The number of observations in a given statistical category.*
- *The rate per second of a vibration constituting a wave, either in a material (as in sound waves), or in an electromagnetic field (as in radio waves and light).*
- *The rate at which something occurs over a particular period of time or in a given sample.*
- *The number of occurrences within a given time period.*
- *The particular waveband at which radio signals are broadcast or transmitted.*



Synonyms of "Frequency" as a noun (9 Words)

absolute frequency	Something that is conceived or that exists independently and not in relation to other things; something that does not depend on anything else and is beyond human control; something that is not relative.
amount	A quantity of something, especially the total of a thing or things in number, size, value, or extent. <i>An adequate amount of food for four people.</i>
commonness	Sharing of common attributes.
frequence	The number of occurrences within a given time period.
<u>incidence</u>	The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>He measured the angle of incidence of the reflected light.</i>
oftenness	The number of occurrences within a given time period.
<u>prevalence</u>	A superiority in numbers or amount. <i>He was surprised by the prevalence of optimism about the future.</i>
rate of occurrence	The relative speed of progress or change.
relative frequency	A person related by blood or marriage.



Usage Examples of "Frequency" as a noun

- *The frequency of modulation was 40 cycles per second.*
- *A radio station on a single AM radio frequency.*
- *An increase in the frequency of accidents due to increased overtime.*
- *The frequency of his seizures increased as he grew older.*
- *A coding sequence to ensure that everyone changes frequency in the correct manner.*
- *Different thicknesses of glass will absorb different frequencies of sound.*



Associations of "Frequency" (30 Words)

always	Repeatedly and annoyingly. <i>There is always some pollution in the air.</i>
<u>amplitude</u>	Breadth, range, or magnitude. <i>The amplitude of the crime of manslaughter lies beneath murder.</i>
<u>dabble</u>	(of a duck or other waterbird) move the bill around in shallow water while feeding. <i>They dabbled their feet in the rock pools.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Ever hoping to strike it rich.</i>
<u>frequent</u>	Be a regular or frequent visitor to a certain place. <i>Pubs frequented by soldiers.</i>
<u>frequently</u>	Regularly or habitually; often. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i>
<u>incidence</u>	The striking of a light beam on a surface. <i>The entire incidence falls on the workers.</i>
infrequently	Not often; rarely. <i>A storage area for infrequently used items.</i>
intermittently	In an intermittent manner. <i>An intermittently amusing plot.</i>
modulated	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
occasional	Recurring or reappearing from time to time. <i>He wrote occasional verse for patrons.</i>
<u>occasionally</u>	At infrequent or irregular intervals; now and then. <i>We met up occasionally for a drink.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i>
often	In many instances. <i>Vocabulary often reflects social standing.</i>
oftentimes	Many times at short intervals. <i>Sensory processing is oftentimes a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
periodically	From time to time; occasionally. <i>The students received help from a friend only periodically.</i>
<u>proportional</u>	One of the quantities in a mathematical proportion. <i>The punishment should be proportional to the crime.</i>

quite	To a degree (not used with a negative). <i>You've no intention of coming back I'm quite sorry but no I have not.</i>
rare	Not widely known; especially valued for its uncommonness. <i>Rare gasses.</i>
rarely	Not often; seldom. <i>We rarely met.</i>
rareness	Noteworthy scarcity.
recidivism	Habitual relapse into crime. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing recidivism.</i>
recurrent	(of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction. <i>The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i>
regularity	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He came to see her with increasing regularity.</i>
rife	In an unchecked or widespread manner. <i>The streets were rife with rumour and fear.</i>
sometimes	On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i>
sparse	Scanty; in short supply. <i>Areas of sparse population.</i>
sporadically	In a sporadic manner. <i>He only works sporadically.</i>
successively	In proper order or sequence. <i>He served successively as a major and a lieutenant colonel.</i>
wave	Set waves in. <i>Fear came over me in waves.</i>
