<b><u>attend</u></b>	Escort and wait on (a member of royalty or other important person). <i>People feared that the switch to a peacetime economy would be <b>attended</b> by a severe slump.</i>
<b>attend frequently</b>	Take charge of or deal with.
<b>be a regular client of</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun).
<b>be a regular visitor to</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>buy at</b>	Make illegal payments to in exchange for favors or influence.
<b>go to regularly</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
<b>go to repeatedly</b>	Begin or set in motion.
<b><u>haunt</u></b>	Haunt like a ghost pursue. <i>He <b>haunts</b> street markets.</i>
<b>patronise</b>	Treat condescendingly.
<b>patronize</b>	Be a regular customer or client of. <i>She was determined not to be put down or <b>patronized</b>.</i>
<b>shop</b>	Visit one or more shops or websites to buy goods. <i>She goes <b>shopping</b> every Friday.</i>
<b>shop at</b>	Do one's shopping at; do business with; be a customer or client of.
<b><u>sponsor</u></b>	Assume sponsorship of. <i>The USA <b>sponsored</b> negotiations between the two sides.</i>
<b>visit</b>	Pay a brief visit. <i>He shall <b>visit</b> earth in mercy.</i>
<b>visit often</b>	Pay a brief visit.



## Usage Examples of "Frequent" as a verb

- *Pubs frequented by soldiers.*
- *Bears which persisted in frequenting developed areas.*



## Frequent as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Frequent" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "frequent" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Coming at short intervals or habitually.*
- *Occurring or done many times at short intervals.*
- *(of a person) doing something often; habitual.*
- *Frequently encountered.*
- *Found at short distances apart.*
- *(of the pulse) rapid.*
- *Frequently encountered.*

- chronic** Of a person having a chronic illness.  
*A **chronic** shortage of funds.*
- common** Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual.  
*The **common** gull.*
- constant** Unvarying in nature.  
***Constant** as the northern star.*
- continual** Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.  
*The **continual** banging of the shutters.*
- continuing** Remaining in force or being carried on without letup.  
*The act provided a **continuing** annual appropriation.*
- customary** According to a person's habitual practice.  
*It is **customary** to mark an occasion like this with a toast.*

<b>daily</b>	Done, produced, or occurring every day or every weekday. <i>Daily routine.</i>
<b>endless</b>	Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>Endless ocean wastes.</i>
<b>everyday</b>	Happening or used every day; daily. <i>A placid everyday scene.</i>
<b>habitual</b>	Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His habitual comment.</i>
<b>incessant</b>	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i>
<b>perennial</b>	(of a plant) living for several years. <i>Perennial efforts to stipulate the requirements.</i>
<b>periodic</b>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>Periodic feelings of anxiety.</i>
<b>persistent</b>	(of chemicals or radioactivity) remaining within the environment for a long time after introduction. <i>Persistent leaves remain attached past maturity.</i>
<b>recurrent</b>	Occurring often or repeatedly. <i>The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i>
<b>recurring</b>	Coming back. <i>Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.</i>
<b>regular</b>	Regularly scheduled for fixed times. <i>A regular customer.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>It was a routine day.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Frequent" as an adjective

- *A frequent guest.*
- *Frequent complaints.*
- *The showers will become heavier and more frequent.*
- *A frequent (or common) error is using the transitive verb 'lay' for the intransitive 'lie.'*
- *Frequent changes in policy.*
- *Walls flanked by frequent square towers.*
- *A frequent visitor to Scotland.*

<b>always</b>	Throughout a long period of the past. <i>There is <b>always</b> some pollution in the air.</i>
<b>common</b>	Having no special distinction or quality widely known or commonly encountered average or ordinary or usual. <i>The swordfish is not <b>common</b> in European waters.</i>
<u><a href="#">continual</a></u>	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>His plane went down after <b>continual</b> attacks.</i>
<u><a href="#">ever</a></u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Don t you <b>ever</b> regret giving up all that money.</i>
<u><a href="#">frequently</a></u>	Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad <b>frequently</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">incidence</a></u>	The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>An increased <b>incidence</b> of cancer.</i>
<b>infrequently</b>	Not often; rarely. <i>A storage area for <b>infrequently</b> used items.</i>
<b>intermittently</b>	In an intermittent manner. <i>An <b>intermittently</b> amusing plot.</i>
<b>modulated</b>	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
<b>occasional</b>	Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly. <i>The <b>occasional</b> car went by but no taxis.</i>
<u><a href="#">occasionally</a></u>	Sporadically and infrequently. <i>We met up <b>occasionally</b> for a drink.</i>
<b>oft</b>	Many times at short intervals. <i>An <b>oft</b> quoted tenet.</i>
<b>often</b>	Frequently; many times. <i>He <b>often</b> goes for long walks by himself.</i>
<b>oftentimes</b>	Frequently; many times. <i>Sensory processing is <b>oftentimes</b> a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
<u><a href="#">perennial</a></u>	A perennial plant. <i><b>Perennial</b> happiness.</i>
<u><a href="#">periodic</a></u>	Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i><b>Periodic</b> feelings of anxiety.</i>
<b>periodically</b>	From time to time; occasionally. <i>The students received help from a friend only <b>periodically</b>.</i>



<b>prevailing</b>	Most frequent or common. <i>The <b>prevailing</b> mood within Whitehall circles.</i>
<b>punctuality</b>	The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time. <i>Improvements in the <b>punctuality</b> of trains.</i>
<u><b>recidivism</b></u>	Habitual relapse into crime. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing <b>recidivism</b>.</i>
<u><b>recurrent</b></u>	(of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction. <i>The <b>recurrent</b> nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i>
<b>regular</b>	A regular patron. <i>A <b>regular</b> verb.</i>
<b>regularity</b>	The state or quality of being regular. <i>He came to see her with increasing <b>regularity</b>.</i>
<b>repeated</b>	Recurring again and again. <i>There were <b>repeated</b> attempts to negotiate.</i>
<b>repeating</b>	(of a pattern) recurring uniformly over a surface.
<b>rife</b>	Excessively abundant. <i>Male chauvinism was <b>rife</b> in medicine.</i>
<u><b>sometimes</b></u>	On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <i><b>Sometimes</b> I want to do things on my own.</i>
<b>sporadically</b>	Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>The comedy is only <b>sporadically</b> funny.</i>
<b>time</b>	The length of time taken to run a race or complete an event or journey. <i>He called four <b>times</b>.</i>
<u><b>yearly</b></u>	Occurring or payable every year. <i><b>Yearly</b> medical examinations.</i>
