| be a regular visitor to | Have life, be alive. |
| buy at | Make illegal payments to in exchange for favors or influence. |
| go to regularly | Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life. |
| go to repeatedly | Begin or set in motion. |
| <u>haunt</u> | Haunt like a ghost pursue. <i>He haunts street markets.</i> |
| patronise | Treat condescendingly. |
| patronize | Be a regular customer or client of. <i>She was determined not to be put down or patronized.</i> |
| shop | Visit one or more shops or websites to buy goods. <i>She goes shopping every Friday.</i> |
| shop at | Do one's shopping at; do business with; be a customer or client of. |

| visit | Pay a brief visit. <i>He shall visit earth in mercy.</i> |
| visit often | Pay a brief visit. |

Definitions of "Frequent" as an adjective

- *Coming at short intervals or habitually.*
- *Occurring or done many times at short intervals.*
- *(of a person) doing something often; habitual.*
- *Frequently encountered.*
- *Found at short distances apart.*
- *(of the pulse) rapid.*
- *Frequently encountered.*

- continual** Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption.

- customary** According to a person's habitual practice.
*It is **customary** to mark an occasion like this with a toast.*

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| daily | Done, produced, or occurring every day or every weekday. <i>Daily routine.</i> |
| endless | Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>Endless ocean wastes.</i> |
| everyday | Happening or used every day; daily. <i>A placid everyday scene.</i> |
| habitual | Commonly used or practiced; usual. <i>His habitual comment.</i> |
| incessant | Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The incessant beat of the music.</i> |
| perennial | (of a plant) living for several years. <i>Perennial efforts to stipulate the requirements.</i> |
| periodic | Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>Periodic feelings of anxiety.</i> |
| persistent | (of chemicals or radioactivity) remaining within the environment for a long time after introduction. <i>Persistent leaves remain attached past maturity.</i> |
| recurrent | Occurring often or repeatedly. <i>The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i> |
| recurring | Coming back. <i>Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.</i> |
| regular | Regularly scheduled for fixed times. <i>A regular customer.</i> |
| repeated | Done or occurring again several times in the same way. <i>Despite repeated requests neither company gave a satisfactory answer.</i> |
| routine | Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>It was a routine day.</i> |

- *A frequent guest.*
- *Frequent complaints.*
- *The showers will become heavier and more frequent.*
- *A frequent (or common) error is using the transitive verb 'lay' for the intransitive 'lie.'*
- *Frequent changes in policy.*
- *Walls flanked by frequent square towers.*
- *A frequent visitor to Scotland.*

| <u>ever</u> | At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Don t you ever regret giving up all that money.</i> |
| <u>frequently</u> | Many times at short intervals. <i>They go abroad frequently.</i> |
| <u>incidence</u> | The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>An increased incidence of cancer.</i> |

| modulated | Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume. |
| occasional | Occurring, appearing, or done infrequently and irregularly. <i>The occasional car went by but no taxis.</i> |
| <u>occasionally</u> | Sporadically and infrequently. <i>We met up occasionally for a drink.</i> |
| oft | Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i> |
| often | Frequently; many times. <i>He often goes for long walks by himself.</i> |
| oftentimes | Frequently; many times. <i>Sensory processing is oftentimes a challenge for someone with ASD.</i> |
| <u>perennial</u> | A perennial plant. <i>Perennial happiness.</i> |
| <u>periodic</u> | Relating to the periodic table of the elements. <i>Periodic feelings of anxiety.</i> |
| periodically | From time to time; occasionally. <i>The students received help from a friend only periodically.</i> |

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| prevailing | Most frequent or common. <i>The prevailing mood within Whitehall circles.</i> |
| punctuality | The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time. <i>Improvements in the punctuality of trains.</i> |
| <u>recidivism</u> | Habitual relapse into crime. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing recidivism.</i> |
| <u>recurrent</u> | (of a nerve or blood vessel) turning back so as to reverse direction. <i>The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i> |
| regular | A regular patron. <i>A regular verb.</i> |
| regularity | The state or quality of being regular. <i>He came to see her with increasing regularity.</i> |
| repeated | Recurring again and again. <i>There were repeated attempts to negotiate.</i> |
| repeating | (of a pattern) recurring uniformly over a surface. |
| rife | Excessively abundant. <i>Male chauvinism was rife in medicine.</i> |
| <u>sometimes</u> | On certain occasions or in certain cases but not always. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i> |
| sporadically | Occasionally or at irregular intervals. <i>The comedy is only sporadically funny.</i> |
| time | The length of time taken to run a race or complete an event or journey. <i>He called four times.</i> |
| <u>yearly</u> | Occurring or payable every year. <i>Yearly medical examinations.</i> |
