- Coming at short intervals or habitually.
- $\bullet \ {\it Occurring or done \ many times \ at \ short \ intervals.}$
- $\bullet \ (of \ a \ person) \ doing \ something \ of ten; \ habitual.$
- Frequently encountered.
- Found at short distances apart.
- (of the pulse) rapid.
- Frequently encountered.

persistent time after introduction.
