Frequently as an Adverb

Definitions of "Frequently" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “frequently” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Regularly or habitually; often.*
- *Many times at short intervals.*



Synonyms of "Frequently" as an adverb (13 Words)

all the time	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
commonly	Very often; frequently. <i>Shift workers commonly complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
customarily	In a way which follows customs or usual practices; usually. <i>The leaves are customarily used for animal fodder.</i>
habitually	By way of habit; customarily. <i>Does he lie habitually.</i>
<u>normally</u>	Under normal or usual conditions; as a rule. <i>Normally it takes three or four years to complete the training.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
often	In many cases or instances. <i>Vocabulary often reflects social standing.</i>
oftentimes	Frequently; many times. <i>I would oftentimes go there.</i>
ofttimes	Many times at short intervals.
<u>regularly</u>	In a regular way without variation. <i>The reunion has taken place regularly every two years.</i>
<u>routinely</u>	Frequently and without proper consideration of the consequences. <i>Owners routinely flout local laws about restraining and picking up after their pets.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>He usually arrives home about one o clock.</i>
very often	Used as intensifiers; ‘real’ is sometimes used informally for ‘really’; ‘rattling’ is informal.



Usage Examples of "Frequently" as an adverb

- *They go abroad frequently.*



Associations of "Frequently" (30 Words)

all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She s been all round the world.</i>
always	At any time or in any event. <i>The sun always rises in the east.</i>
<u>dabble</u>	(of a duck or other waterbird) move the bill around in shallow water while feeding. <i>They dabbled their feet in the rock pools.</i>
<u>ever</u>	At all times all the time and on every occasion. <i>Ever the man of action he was impatient with intellectuals.</i>
<u>every</u>	Each and all of a series of entities or intervals as specified. <i>Every person is mortal.</i>

frequency	The number of occurrences within a given time period. <i>A radio station on a single AM radio frequency.</i>
frequent	Frequently encountered. <i>Bears which persisted in frequenting developed areas.</i>
incidence	The way in which the burden of a tax falls upon the population. <i>The point of incidence of the beam.</i>
infrequently	Not many times. <i>He cooks but only infrequently.</i>
intermittently	At irregular intervals; not continuously or steadily. <i>An intermittently amusing plot.</i>
invariably	Without variation or change, in every case. <i>Ranch meals are invariably big and hearty.</i>
modulated	Changed or adjusted in pitch, tone, or volume.
occasional	(of furniture) made or adapted for use on a particular occasion or for infrequent use. <i>Took an occasional glass of wine.</i>
occasionally	Now and then or here and there. <i>Very occasionally the condition can result in death.</i>
oft	Many times at short intervals. <i>An oft quoted tenet.</i>
often	Many times at short intervals. <i>We often met over a cup of coffee.</i>
oftentimes	In many instances. <i>Sensory processing is oftentimes a challenge for someone with ASD.</i>
periodically	In a sporadic manner. <i>I will periodically check on your progress.</i>
proportional	(of a variable quantity) having a constant ratio to another quantity. <i>The punishment should be proportional to the crime.</i>
quite	Actually or truly or to an extreme. <i>Quite frankly I don't blame you.</i>
rare	Recurring only at long intervals. <i>Rare patches of green in the desert.</i>
rarely	To an unusual degree; exceptionally. <i>I rarely drive above 50 mph.</i>
rareness	Noteworthy scarcity.
recidivism	Habitual relapse into crime. <i>The prison has succeeded in reducing recidivism.</i>

<u>recurrent</u>	Recurring again and again. <i>The recurrent nerve leaves the hypocerebral ganglion.</i>
<u>sometimes</u>	Occasionally, rather than all of the time. <i>Sometimes I want to do things on my own.</i>
<u>sparse</u>	Not dense. <i>Trees were sparse.</i>
<u>sporadically</u>	In a sporadic manner. <i>He only works sporadically.</i>
<u>successively</u>	Immediately one after another. <i>Three letters of successively decreasing length.</i>
<u>usually</u>	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>Usually she was late.</i>
