- *A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations.*
- *The state of being friends (or friendly).*



## Synonyms of "Friendship" as a noun (17 Words)

<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>An <b>alliance</b> between medicine and morality.</i>
<b>association</b>	(chemistry) any process of combination (especially in solution) that depends on relatively weak chemical bonding. <i>There s nothing new in the <b>association</b> of fasting with spirituality.</i>
<b>attachment</b>	Legal seizure of property. <i>He formed an <b>attachment</b> with a young widow.</i>
<b>bond</b>	Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial. <i>There was a <b>bond</b> of understanding between them.</i>
<b><u>camaraderie</u></b>	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>

<b>close association</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time.
<b>close relationship</b>	The last section of a communication.
<b>companionship</b>	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>company</b>	A group of Guides. <i>He missed their <b>company</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The company and friendship of others with common aims. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b>fellowship</b>	A guild or corporation. <i>They valued fun and good <b>fellowship</b> as the cement of the community.</i>
<b>friendly relationship</b>	Troops belonging to or allied with your own military forces.
<a href="#"><u>link</u></a>	The means of connection between things linked in series. <i>The walls are held together with metal <b>links</b> placed in the wet mortar during construction.</i>
<b>relationship</b>	A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness. <i>She has a daughter from a previous <b>relationship</b>.</i>
<b>social intercourse</b>	A party of people assembled to promote sociability and communal activity.
<a href="#"><u>tie</u></a>	A shoe tied with a lace. <i>He wore a vest and <b>tie</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>union</u></a>	A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff. <i>Their <b>union</b> had not been blessed with children.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Friendship" as a noun

- *She formed close friendships with women.*
- *Old ties of love and friendship.*
- *This is an ideal group for finding support and friendship.*
- *Because of the friendship between our countries, we had a very frank exchange.*



## Associations of "Friendship" (30 Words)

- affiliation** A social or business relationship.  
*The group has no **affiliation** to any preservation society.*
- buddy** A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.  
*I decided to **buddy** up to them.*
- companionship** The state of being with someone.  
*The love and **companionship** of marriage.*
- conjugal** Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband.  
***Conjugal** visits.*
- connubial** Of or relating to marriage or to the relationship between a wife and husband.  
*Their **connubial** bed.*

<b>cooperation</b>	Joint operation or action. <i>They worked in close <b>cooperation</b> with the British Tourist Authority.</i>
<b><u>couple</u></b>	Two items of the same kind. <i>We got some eggs would you like a <b>couple</b>.</i>
<b><u>darling</u></b>	(in affected use) pretty; charming. <i>A <b>darling</b> little pillbox hat.</i>
<b><u>dear</u></b>	A sweet or endearing person. <i>A <b>dear</b> friend.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Befriend someone. <i>All of a sudden you ve got 50 <b>friends</b> online who need to stay connected.</i>
<b>heterosexual</b>	A heterosexual person. <i><b>Heterosexual</b> relationships.</i>
<b><u>husband</u></b>	A married man; a woman's partner in marriage. <i>She and her <b>husband</b> are both retired.</i>
<b>interpersonal</b>	Relating to relationships or communication between people. <i>You will need good <b>interpersonal</b> skills.</i>
<b>intimate</b>	Involving very close connection. <i>This girl so <b>intimate</b> with nature.</i>
<b>kiss</b>	(of a ball) lightly touch (another ball) in passing. <i>A quick <b>kiss</b> on the cheek.</i>
<b>kissing</b>	Affectionate play (or foreplay without contact with the genital organs).
<b>marry</b>	Join in marriage. <i>Most Chardonnays don t <b>marry</b> well with salmon.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>It was his first start against his former <b>teammates</b>.</i>
<b><u>mutual</u></b>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>Life insurance firms are <b>mutuals</b> owned by their policyholders.</i>
<b>mutuality</b>	A reciprocity of sentiments. <i>The <b>mutuality</b> of love between father and son.</i>
<b><u>pal</u></b>	Used as a form of address, especially to indicate anger or aggression. <i>We ve been <b>pals</b> for a long time.</i>
<b><u>paramour</u></b>	A woman's lover.
<b><u>partner</u></b>	A person s partner in marriage. <i>She and her dance <b>partner</b> were on the show for seven weeks.</i>
<b>platonic</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of Plato or his philosophy. <i>Their relationship is purely <b>platonic</b>.</i>

**relationship**

A relation between people relationship is often used where relation would serve as in the relationship between inflation and unemployment but the preferred usage of relationship is for human relations or states of relatedness.

*He didn't want his wife to know of the **relationship**.*

**romantic**

A person with romantic beliefs or attitudes.

**Romantic fiction.**

**sisterhood**

The kinship relation between a female offspring and the siblings.

*Canadian feminists acknowledge their **sisterhood** with women around the globe.*

**uncle**

The brother of one's father or mother or the husband of one's aunt.

*He played **uncle** to lonely students.*

**wed**

Having been taken in marriage.

*Will you **wed** your daughter to him.*

**wife**

The wife of a person with a specified occupation.

*He and his **wife** are keen gardeners.*
