<b>cold-blooded</b>	Having cold blood (in animals whose body temperature is not internally regulated).
<b>distant</b>	(after a measurement) at a specified distance. <i>I remember that <b>distant</b> afternoon.</i>
<b>flinty</b>	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i><b>Flinty</b> soil.</i>
<b>formal</b>	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e g of formal dress. <i>A <b>formal</b> complaint.</i>
<b>freezing</b>	(used hyperbolically) very cold. <i>He was <b>freezing</b> and miserable.</i>
<b>frosty</b>	Covered with frost. <i>A <b>frosty</b> glass.</i>
<b>frozen</b>	Absolutely still. <i><b>Frozen</b> wastes.</i>
<b>gelid</b>	Extremely cold. <i><b>Gelid</b> waters of the North Atlantic.</i>
<b>glacial</b>	Extremely cold. <i>An official described progress in the talks as <b>glacial</b>.</i>
<b>ice-cold</b>	As cold as ice.
<b>icy</b>	Extremely cold. <i><b>Icy</b> northern waters.</i>
<b>impersonal</b>	Not relating to or responsive to individual persons. <i><b>Impersonal</b> criticism.</i>
<b>indifferent</b>	Fairly poor to not very good. <i>A pair of <b>indifferent</b> watercolours.</i>
<b>passionless</b>	Unmoved by feeling. <i>This <b>passionless</b> girl was like an icicle in the sunshine.</i>
<b>polar</b>	Of an animal or plant living in the north or south polar region. <i>The <b>polar</b> regions.</i>
<b>remote</b>	(of an electronic device) operating or operated at a distance by means of radio or infrared signals. <i>Considerations entirely removed or <b>remote</b> from politics.</i>

<b>reserved</b>	Marked by self-restraint and reticence-Victoria Sackville-West. <i>He is a <b>reserved</b> almost taciturn man.</i>
<b>siberian</b>	Of speech sounds produced by forcing air through a constricted passage (as `f', `s', `z', or `th' in both `thin' and `then.
<b>steely</b>	Resembling steel in hardness. <i><b>Steely</b> nerves like those of a steeplejack.</i>
<b>stiff</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>A <b>stiff</b> breeze stirring the lake.</i>
<b>stony</b>	Covered with or full of small pieces of rock. <i><b>Stony</b> ground.</i>
<b>unaffectionate</b>	Feeling, showing, or having no fondness or tenderness. <i>Her husband s isolated <b>unaffectionate</b> personality.</i>
<b>unapproachable</b>	Not welcoming or friendly. <i>Some regions were <b>unapproachable</b> to the Romans.</i>
<b>uncaring</b>	Lacking affection or warm feeling. <i>An <b>uncaring</b> father.</i>
<b>undemonstrative</b>	Not given to open expression of emotion. <i>The English are an <b>undemonstrative</b> lot.</i>
<b>unemotional</b>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>A flat <b>unemotional</b> voice.</i>
<b>unenthusiastic</b>	Not having or showing enthusiasm. <i><b>Unenthusiastic</b> applause.</i>
<b>unfeeling</b>	Unsympathetic, harsh, or callous. <i>My mother is a cold <b>unfeeling</b> woman.</i>
<b>unloving</b>	Not loving. <i>An <b>unloving</b> father.</i>
<b>unresponsive</b>	Aloof or indifferent. <i>Was <b>unresponsive</b> to her passionate advances.</i>
<b>unsmiling</b>	(of a person or their manner or expression) serious or unfriendly; not smiling. <i>A large <b>unsmiling</b> woman.</i>
<b>very cold</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<b>wintry</b>	Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. <i>Suffered severe <b>wintry</b> weather.</i>
<b>wooden</b>	Made or consisting of (entirely or in part) or employing wood. <i>A kind of dull <b>wooden</b> sound.</i>

<b>frozen</b>	Incapable of being changed or moved or undone; e.g. <i>The <b>frozen</b> North.</i>
<b>gelid</b>	Icy; extremely cold. <i>She gave a <b>gelid</b> reply.</i>
<b>glacial</b>	A glacial period. <i>Thick <b>glacial</b> deposits.</i>
<b>ice</b>	Put ice on or put on ice. <i>The <b>ice</b> in his <b>voice</b> was only to hide the pain.</i>
<b>iceberg</b>	A large mass of ice floating at sea; usually broken off of a polar glacier. <i><b>Iceberg</b> is still the most popular lettuce.</i>
<b>icecap</b>	A mass of ice and snow that permanently covers a large area of land (e.g., the polar regions or a mountain peak).
<b>icicle</b>	Ice resembling a pendent spear, formed by the freezing of dripping water.
<b>icy</b>	Very unfriendly; hostile. <i><b>Icy</b> hands.</i>
<b>midwinter</b>	The middle of winter. <i>In <b>midwinter</b> the track became a muddy morass.</i>
<b>polar</b>	Having electrical or magnetic polarity. <i>The <b>polar</b> regions.</i>
<b>refrigeration</b>	The process of cooling or freezing (e.g., food) for preservative purposes. <i><b>Refrigeration</b> by immersing the patient's body in a cold bath.</i>
<b>rime</b>	Correspondence in the sounds of two or more lines (especially final sounds). <i>The <b>rime</b> was thick and crisp on the grass.</i>
<b>sherbet</b>	A flavoured sweet effervescent powder eaten alone or made into a drink. <i>I went down the local pub for a few <b>sherbets</b>.</i>
<b>sleet</b>	Sleet falls. <i>It was <b>sleeting</b> so hard we could barely see.</i>
