- *Extremely cold.*
- *Very cold in temperature.*

arctic	Extremely cold. <i>An arctic climate.</i>
<u>austere</u>	Having a plain and unadorned appearance. <i>He was an austere man with a rigidly puritanical outlook.</i>
<u>bitter</u>	Marked by strong resentment or cynicism. <i>A bitter five year legal battle.</i>
<u>bleak</u>	(of a person's expression) cold and forbidding. <i>Life in the Aran Islands has always been bleak and difficult.</i>
chilly	(of a person) feeling cold. <i>A chilly greeting.</i>

cold	Having a low or inadequate temperature or feeling a sensation of coldness or having been made cold by e g ice or refrigeration. <i>The boxer was out cold.</i>
cold-blooded	Having cold blood (in animals whose body temperature is not internally regulated).
distant	(after a measurement) at a specified distance. <i>I remember that distant afternoon.</i>
flinty	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>Flinty soil.</i>
formal	Being in accord with established forms and conventions and requirements as e g of formal dress. <i>A formal complaint.</i>
freezing	(used hyperbolically) very cold. <i>He was freezing and miserable.</i>
frosty	Covered with frost. <i>A frosty glass.</i>
frozen	Absolutely still. <i>Frozen wastes.</i>
gelid	Extremely cold. <i>Gelid waters of the North Atlantic.</i>
glacial	Extremely cold. <i>An official described progress in the talks as glacial.</i>
ice-cold	As cold as ice.
icy	Extremely cold. <i>Icy northern waters.</i>
impersonal	Not relating to or responsive to individual persons. <i>Impersonal criticism.</i>
indifferent	Fairly poor to not very good. <i>A pair of indifferent watercolours.</i>
passionless	Unmoved by feeling. <i>This passionless girl was like an icicle in the sunshine.</i>
polar	Of an animal or plant living in the north or south polar region. <i>The polar regions.</i>
remote	(of an electronic device) operating or operated at a distance by means of radio or infrared signals. <i>Considerations entirely removed or remote from politics.</i>

reserved	Marked by self-restraint and reticence-Victoria Sackville-West. <i>He is a reserved almost taciturn man.</i>
siberian	Of speech sounds produced by forcing air through a constricted passage (as `f', `s', `z', or `th' in both `thin' and `then.
steely	Resembling steel in hardness. <i>Steely nerves like those of a steeplejack.</i>
stiff	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>A stiff breeze stirring the lake.</i>
stony	Covered with or full of small pieces of rock. <i>Stony ground.</i>
unaffectionate	Feeling, showing, or having no fondness or tenderness. <i>Her husband s isolated unaffectionate personality.</i>
unapproachable	Not welcoming or friendly. <i>Some regions were unapproachable to the Romans.</i>
uncaring	Lacking affection or warm feeling. <i>An uncaring father.</i>
undemonstrative	Not given to open expression of emotion. <i>The English are an undemonstrative lot.</i>
unemotional	Cool and formal in manner. <i>A flat unemotional voice.</i>
unenthusiastic	Not having or showing enthusiasm. <i>Unenthusiastic applause.</i>
unfeeling	Unsympathetic, harsh, or callous. <i>My mother is a cold unfeeling woman.</i>
unloving	Not loving. <i>An unloving father.</i>
unresponsive	Aloof or indifferent. <i>Was unresponsive to her passionate advances.</i>
unsmiling	(of a person or their manner or expression) serious or unfriendly; not smiling. <i>A large unsmiling woman.</i>
very cold	Being the exact same one; not any other.
wintry	Devoid of warmth and cordiality; expressive of unfriendliness or disdain. <i>Suffered severe wintry weather.</i>
wooden	Made or consisting of (entirely or in part) or employing wood. <i>A kind of dull wooden sound.</i>

arctic	Of or relating to the Arctic. <i>An arctic climate.</i>
callosity	An area of skin that is thick or hard from continual pressure or friction (as the sole of the foot).
cold	A low temperature cold weather a cold environment. <i>The cold helped clear his head.</i>
coldness	A lack of affection or enthusiasm. <i>The bitter coldness of the British weather.</i>
coolness	Freedom from excitement, anxiety, or excessive emotion. <i>The coolness of this phone was worth the extra money.</i>
floe	A sheet of floating ice.
freezing	The freezing point of water 0 C. <i>He was freezing and miserable.</i>
frostbitten	Affected by frostbite from exposure to extreme cold. <i>Both men were badly frostbitten losing all their toes.</i>

frosty	Cold and unfriendly in manner. <i>Crisp clear nights and frosty mornings.</i>
frozen	Incapable of being changed or moved or undone; e.g. <i>The frozen North.</i>
gelid	Icy; extremely cold. <i>She gave a gelid reply.</i>
glacial	A glacial period. <i>Thick glacial deposits.</i>
ice	Put ice on or put on ice. <i>The ice in his voice was only to hide the pain.</i>
iceberg	A large mass of ice floating at sea; usually broken off of a polar glacier. <i>Iceberg is still the most popular lettuce.</i>
icecap	A mass of ice and snow that permanently covers a large area of land (e.g., the polar regions or a mountain peak).
icicle	Ice resembling a pendent spear, formed by the freezing of dripping water.
icy	Very unfriendly; hostile. <i>Icy hands.</i>
midwinter	The middle of winter. <i>In midwinter the track became a muddy morass.</i>
polar	Having electrical or magnetic polarity. <i>The polar regions.</i>
refrigeration	The process of cooling or freezing (e.g., food) for preservative purposes. <i>Refrigeration by immersing the patient's body in a cold bath.</i>
rime	Correspondence in the sounds of two or more lines (especially final sounds). <i>The rime was thick and crisp on the grass.</i>
sherbet	A flavoured sweet effervescent powder eaten alone or made into a drink. <i>I went down the local pub for a few sherbets.</i>
sleet	Sleet falls. <i>It was sleeting so hard we could barely see.</i>
snow	Falls of snow. <i>We were trudging through deep snow.</i>
snowfall	A fall of snow. <i>Heavy snowfalls made travel absolutely impossible.</i>
snowy	Of or like snow, especially in being pure white. <i>A long snowy winter.</i>
