caper	A playful skipping movement. <i>A cop caper about intergalactic drug dealers.</i>
escapade	Any carefree episode. <i>He told of their escapade with a borrowed truck.</i>
exploit	A bold or daring feat. <i>Despite a series of colourful exploits his agents obtained little intelligence of value.</i>
fling	The act of flinging. <i>One final fling before a tranquil retirement.</i>
gambol	Gay or light-hearted recreational activity for diversion or amusement. <i>The two of them run off to the woods for a gambol together.</i>
game	Games the score at a particular point or the score needed to win. <i>He was in the restaurant game for the glamour.</i>

play	In games or plays or other performances the time during which play proceeds. <i>Play families are arranged in play houses.</i>
revel	Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Late night revels.</i>
romp	An easy victory. <i>Their UEFA Cup romp against the Luxembourg part timers.</i>
sport	Someone who engages in sports. <i>Team sports such as soccer and rugby.</i>
spree	A spell or sustained period of unrestrained activity of a particular kind. <i>He went on a six month crime spree.</i>
stunt	A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.

Synonyms of "Frolic" as a verb (24 Words)

bob	Ride a bobsled. <i>She bobbed her head.</i>
bounce	Hit something so that it bounces. <i>The ball bounced away and he chased it.</i>
caper	Skip or dance about in a lively or playful way. <i>Children were capering about the room.</i>
cavort	Play boisterously. <i>The players cavorted about the pitch.</i>
cut capers	Allow incision or separation.
<u>dance</u>	Perform a particular dance or a role in a ballet. <i>Their cheeks were pressed together as they danced.</i>
disport	Occupy in an agreeable, entertaining or pleasant fashion. <i>A painting of ladies disporting themselves by a lake.</i>

frisk	Search as for concealed weapons by running the hands rapidly over the clothing and through the pockets. <i>A horse was frisking his back legs like a colt.</i>
gambol	Play boisterously. <i>The mare gambolled towards her.</i>
hop	Jump lightly. <i>A blackbird was hopping around in the sun.</i>
jump	Jump from an airplane and descend with a parachute. <i>The cat jumped off his lap.</i>
lark	Play boisterously.
lark about	Play boisterously.
leap	Cause to jump or leap. <i>The widow leapt into the funeral pyre.</i>
prance	(of a horse) move with high springy steps. <i>She pranced around the lounge impersonating her favourite pop stars.</i>
rollick	Play boisterously. <i>A satirical novelist who rollicks through the sleaze of the American psyche.</i>
romp	Run easily and fairly fast. <i>A 33 1 no hoper romped home.</i>
run around	Travel rapidly, by any (unspecified) means. (especially of a small animal or child) run with quick light steps, especially through fear or excitement.
scamper	<i>He scampered in like an overgrown puppy.</i>
skip	Cause to skip over a surface. <i>The younger girls had been skipping rope.</i>
skylark	Pass time by playing tricks or practical jokes; indulge in horseplay. <i>He was skylarking with a friend when he fell into a pile of boxes.</i>
sport	Wear or display in an ostentatious or proud manner. <i>He was sporting a huge handlebar moustache.</i>
spring	Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>The president sought to spring the hostages.</i>
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>I would like to know if I m the one who s trippin or if it s him.</i>

- *He denied allegations that he frolicked with a secretary.*

coltish	Energetic but awkward in one's movements or behaviour. <i>Their impossibly coltish legs.</i>
exuberant	Joyously unrestrained. <i>A noisy bunch of exuberant youngsters.</i>
frisky	Playful and full of energy. <i>He bounds about like a frisky pup.</i>
gleeful	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>She gave a gleeful chuckle.</i>
high-spirited	Joyously unrestrained.
jolly	Happy and cheerful. <i>We had a very jolly time.</i>
kittenish	Playful like a lively kitten. <i>Her voice had that kittenish quality.</i>

light-hearted Carefree and happy and lighthearted.

lively Full of zest or vigor.
*A **lively** homeward passage dodging aircraft and E boats.*

merry Cheerful and lively.
*A **merry** evening.*

perky Characterized by liveliness and lightheartedness.
*She certainly looked less than her usual **perky** self.*

playful Full of fun and high spirits.
*He gave me a **playful** punch on the arm.*

skittish (of an animal, especially a horse) nervous or excitable; easily scared.
*My **skittish** and immature mother.*

spirited Made lively or spirited.
*A **spirited** campaigner for women s rights.*
