<b>play</b>	In games or plays or other performances the time during which play proceeds. <i><b>Play</b> families are arranged in <b>play</b> houses.</i>
<b>revel</b>	Lively and noisy enjoyment, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Late night <b>revels</b>.</i>
<b>romp</b>	An easy victory. <i>Their UEFA Cup <b>romp</b> against the Luxembourg part timers.</i>
<b>sport</b>	Someone who engages in sports. <i>Team <b>sports</b> such as soccer and rugby.</i>
<b>spree</b>	A spell or sustained period of unrestrained activity of a particular kind. <i>He went on a six month crime <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	A creature (especially a whale) that has been prevented from attaining full growth.

<b>frisk</b>	Search as for concealed weapons by running the hands rapidly over the clothing and through the pockets. <i>A horse was <b>frisking</b> his back legs like a colt.</i>
<b>gambol</b>	Play boisterously. <i>The mare <b>gambolled</b> towards her.</i>
<b>hop</b>	Jump lightly. <i>A blackbird was <b>hopping</b> around in the sun.</i>
<b>jump</b>	Jump from an airplane and descend with a parachute. <i>The cat <b>jumped</b> off his lap.</i>
<b>lark</b>	Play boisterously.
<b>lark about</b>	Play boisterously.
<b>leap</b>	Cause to jump or leap. <i>The widow <b>leapt</b> into the funeral pyre.</i>
<b>prance</b>	(of a horse) move with high springy steps. <i>She <b>pranced</b> around the lounge impersonating her favourite pop stars.</i>
<b>rollick</b>	Play boisterously. <i>A satirical novelist who <b>rollicks</b> through the sleaze of the American psyche.</i>
<b>romp</b>	Run easily and fairly fast. <i>A 33 1 no hoper <b>romped</b> home.</i>
<b>run around</b>	Travel rapidly, by any (unspecified) means. (especially of a small animal or child) run with quick light steps, especially through fear or excitement.
<b>scamper</b>	<i>He <b>scampered</b> in like an overgrown puppy.</i>
<b>skip</b>	Cause to skip over a surface. <i>The younger girls had been <b>skipping</b> rope.</i>
<b>skylark</b>	Pass time by playing tricks or practical jokes; indulge in horseplay. <i>He was <b>skylarking</b> with a friend when he fell into a pile of boxes.</i>
<b>sport</b>	Wear or display in an ostentatious or proud manner. <i>He was <b>sporting</b> a huge handlebar moustache.</i>
<b>spring</b>	Spring back spring away from an impact. <i>The president sought to <b>spring</b> the hostages.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>I would like to know if I m the one who s <b>trippin</b> or if it s him.</i>

**playful** Full of fun and high spirits.  
*He gave me a **playful** punch on the arm.*

**skittish** (of an animal, especially a horse) nervous or excitable; easily scared.  
*My **skittish** and immature mother.*

**spirited** Made lively or spirited.  
*A **spirited** campaigner for women s rights.*
