| actualization | Making real or giving the appearance of reality. |
| fulfilment | The performance of a duty or role as required, pledged, or expected. <i>The need to eliminate excess by the security forces in fulfilment of their duties.</i> |
| materialization | Something that comes into existence as a result. <i>The materialization of her dream.</i> |
| realisation | A sale in order to obtain money (as a sale of stock or a sale of the estate of a bankrupt person) or the money so obtained. |

realization Something that is made real or concrete.
***Realization** dawned suddenly.*

Usage Examples of "Fruition" as a noun

- *The plans have come to fruition rather sooner than expected.*
- *The apples in the orchards gave a suggestion of sour fruition.*

| <u>dream</u> | See hear or feel something in a dream. <i>He went about his work as if in a dream.</i> |
| <u>dreaming</u> | A series of mental images and emotions occurring during sleep. |
| dreamy | Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i> |
| <u>envision</u> | Picture to oneself; imagine possible. <i>She envisioned the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.</i> |
| <u>hallucination</u> | An object perceived during a hallucinatory episode. <i>He continued to suffer from horrific hallucinations.</i> |
| hibernate | Be in an inactive or dormant state. <i>Some species hibernate in tree roosts.</i> |
| hibernation | An extended period of remaining inactive or indoors. <i>Grizzly bears gorge on seeds to prepare for hibernation.</i> |
| ideational | Being of the nature of a notion or concept. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and ideational factors.</i> |

| illusion | An instance of a wrong or misinterpreted perception of a sensory experience. <i>Stripes embellish the surface to create the illusion of various wood grain textures.</i> |
| illusive | Deceptive; illusory. <i>Illusive hopes of finding a better job.</i> |
| <u>imaginary</u> | Not based on fact; unreal- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>A small child s imaginary friends.</i> |
| materialize | Appear or be present when expected. <i>He plays a teenager whose make believe friend materializes.</i> |
| motivated | Provided with a motive or given incentive for action. <i>A highly motivated child can learn almost anything.</i> |
| nap | Sleep lightly or briefly, especially during the day. <i>She naps everyday after lunch for an hour.</i> |
| <u>nightmare</u> | A terrifying or deeply upsetting dream. <i>The nightmare of racial hatred.</i> |
| oversleep | Sleep longer or later than one intended. <i>We talked until the early hours and consequently I overslept.</i> |
| plan | A drawing or diagram made by projection on a horizontal plane especially one showing the layout of a building or one floor of a building. <i>I have no plans to retire.</i> |

| <u>reverie</u> | An abstracted state of absorption. <i>He defended and explained all the reveries of astrology.</i> |
| sleep | A period of time spent sleeping. <i>He didn t get enough sleep last night.</i> |
| <u>slumber</u> | A natural and periodic state of rest during which consciousness of the world is suspended. <i>Scaring folk from their slumbers.</i> |
| snore | A thing that is extremely boring. <i>She sings a version of Passionate Kisses that s a certified snore.</i> |
| <u>visualize</u> | View the outline of by means of an X-ray. <i>With this machine ultrasound can be visualized.</i> |
| waking | The state of being awake. <i>Worked every moment of my waking hours.</i> |
