- *Fill or meet a want or need.*
- *Gain happiness or satisfaction by achieving one's potential.*
- *Fill, satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.*
- *Complete (a period of time or piece of work.*
- *Achieve or realize (something desired, promised, or predicted.*
- *Carry out (a duty or role) as required, promised, or expected.*
- *Meet the requirements or expectations of.*
- *(of a retailer) pack and dispatch (a customer's order.*

### **attain**

Succeed in achieving (something that one has worked for).

*He **attained** the rank of Brigadier.*

### **bring about**

Cause to come into a particular state or condition.

### **bring off**

Cause to come into a particular state or condition.

<b>bring to fruition</b>	Induce or persuade.
<b>carry off</b>	Have or possess something abstract.
<b>carry out</b>	Capture after a fight.
<b>carry through</b>	Transfer (entries) from one account book to another.
<b>comply with</b>	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes.
<b>conduct</b>	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Many metals <b>conduct</b> heat.</i>
<b>conform to</b>	Be similar, be in line with.
<b>consummate</b>	Complete (a transaction). <i>They did not <b>consummate</b> their marriage until months after it took place.</i>
<b>deliver</b>	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>The company has <b>delivered</b> a body blow to this city.</i>
<b>discharge</b>	Go off or discharge. <i>His memory was impaired and he was <b>discharged</b> from the RAF.</i>
<b>effect</b>	Cause (something) to happen; bring about. <i><b>Effect</b> a change.</i>
<b>effectuate</b>	Put into force or operation. <i>School choice would <b>effectuate</b> a transfer of power from government to individuals.</i>
<b>execute</b>	Make (a legal instrument) valid by signing or sealing it. <i>The Mafioso who collaborated with the police was <b>executed</b>.</i>
<b>fill</b>	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He said the scheme would <b>fill</b> a gap in the market.</i>
<b>fit</b>	Make fit. <i>This man can't <b>fit</b> himself into our work environment.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Fill or meet a want or need.
<b>implement</b>	Apply in a manner consistent with its purpose or design. <i>The scheme to <b>implement</b> student loans.</i>
<b>live up to</b>	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not <b>manage</b> 24 March after all.</i>
<b>meet</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>The teams will <b>meet</b> in the European Cup final at Wembley.</i>
<b>obey</b>	Be obedient to. <i>The officer was convicted for refusing to <b>obey</b> orders.</i>

<b>perform</b>	Carry out or perform an action. <i>The play has already been <b>performed</b> in Britain.</i>
<b>realize</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>The drawings are expected to <b>realize</b> 500 000.</i>
<b>respond to</b>	Respond favorably or as hoped.
<b>satisfy</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>There was insufficient collateral to <b>satisfy</b> the loan.</i>
<b>succeed in</b>	Attain success or reach a desired goal.



## Usage Examples of "Fulfil" as a verb

- *Friends whose ill-timed speed fulfilled my soon-repentent deed.*
- *Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to fulfil themselves.*

- *He wouldn't be able to fulfil his ambition to visit Naples.*
- *Goods must fulfil three basic conditions.*
- *Some officials were dismissed because they could not fulfil their duties.*
- *Customers expect online orders to be fulfilled reliably, quickly, and cheaply.*

- accomplish** Achieve or complete successfully.  
*The planes **accomplished** their mission.*
- action** Take action on deal with.  
*The rank and file want to call the **action** off.*
- activity** A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient.  
*The level of **activity** declines with age.*

<b>actual</b>	Presently existing in fact and not merely potential or possible. <i>Using <b>actual</b> income to measure expected income.</i>
<b>actuality</b>	The state of existing in reality. <i>A hope that progressed from possibility to <b>actuality</b>.</i>
<b>attain</b>	Find unexpectedly. <i>Dolphins can <b>attain</b> speeds in water which man cannot yet emulate.</i>
<b>bulge</b>	Cause to bulge or swell outwards. <i>The veins in his neck <b>bulged</b>.</i>
<b>content</b>	Make content. <i>Not <b>content</b> with being a hugely successful pop star he now intends to venture into movies.</i>
<b>covenant</b>	Undertake to give a sum of money regularly to charity by means of a covenant. <i>The nations <b>covenanted</b> to fight terrorism around the world.</i>
<b>do</b>	Doctor's degree in osteopathy. <i>I never really got the chance to finish school or <b>do</b> my exams.</i>
<b>fill</b>	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>I <b>filled</b> the bottle with water.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Fill, satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
<b>fulfillment</b>	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc.)
<b>garnishment</b>	A decoration or embellishment.
<b>gratification</b>	State of being gratified or satisfied. <i>Dull repetitious work gives no <b>gratification</b>.</i>
<b>gratify</b>	Indulge or satisfy (a desire). <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
<b>indulge</b>	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>I don't <b>indulge</b> in idle gossip.</i>
<b>indulging</b>	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
<b>meet</b>	A meeting at which a number of athletic contests are held. <i>In the final group match England will <b>meet</b> the Australians.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Give a performance of something. <i>The band will be <b>performing</b> live in Hyde Park.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Promise to undertake or give. <i>What happened to all those firm <b>promises</b> of support.</i>
<b>reliably</b>	In a faithful manner. <i>Few of these paintings can be <b>reliably</b> dated.</i>

<b>replete</b>	Filled or well-supplied with something. <i>I went out into the sun drenched streets again <b>replete</b> and relaxed.</i>
<b>restock</b>	Stock again. <i>He <b>restocked</b> his land with pheasants.</i>
<b>sate</b>	Supply (someone) with as much as or more of something than is desired or can be managed. <i>I am <b>sated</b>.</i>
<b>satisfaction</b>	What is felt to be owed or due to one, especially in reparation of an injustice or wrong. <i>In full and final <b>satisfaction</b> of the claim.</i>
<b>satisfy</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>Social services is trying to <b>satisfy</b> the needs of so many different groups.</i>
<b>sooth</b>	Truth or reality. <i>In <b>sooth</b>.</i>
<b>supplement</b>	Add as a supplement to what seems insufficient. <i><b>Supplement</b> your diet.</i>
<b>vouch</b>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>I <b>vouch</b> for the quality of my products.</i>
