- *Achieve or realize (something desired, promised, or predicted.*
- *Carry out (a duty or role) as required, promised, or expected.*
- *Meet the requirements or expectations of.*
- *(of a retailer) pack and dispatch (a customer's order.*

achieve	To gain with effort. <i>The killings achieved nothing.</i>
action	Take action on deal with. <i>Your request will be actioned.</i>
adhere to	Be loyal to.
answer	Give the correct answer or solution to. <i>Answer a question.</i>
<u>attain</u>	Succeed in achieving (something that one has worked for). <i>He attained the rank of Brigadier.</i>
bring about	Cause to come into a particular state or condition.
bring off	Cause to come into a particular state or condition.

bring to fruition	Induce or persuade.
carry off	Have or possess something abstract.
carry out	Capture after a fight.
carry through	Transfer (entries) from one account book to another.
comply with	Act in accordance with someone's rules, commands, or wishes.
conduct	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>Many metals conduct heat.</i>
conform to	Be similar, be in line with.
consummate	Complete (a transaction). <i>They did not consummate their marriage until months after it took place.</i>
deliver	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>The company has delivered a body blow to this city.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>His memory was impaired and he was discharged from the RAF.</i>
effect	Cause (something) to happen; bring about. <i>Effect a change.</i>
effectuate	Put into force or operation. <i>School choice would effectuate a transfer of power from government to individuals.</i>
execute	Make (a legal instrument) valid by signing or sealing it. <i>The Mafioso who collaborated with the police was executed.</i>
fill	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He said the scheme would fill a gap in the market.</i>
fit	Make fit. <i>This man can't fit himself into our work environment.</i>
fulfill	Fill or meet a want or need.
implement	Apply in a manner consistent with its purpose or design. <i>The scheme to implement student loans.</i>
live up to	Continue to live through hardship or adversity.
manage	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not manage 24 March after all.</i>
meet	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>The teams will meet in the European Cup final at Wembley.</i>
obey	Be obedient to. <i>The officer was convicted for refusing to obey orders.</i>

perform	Carry out or perform an action. <i>The play has already been performed in Britain.</i>
realize	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>The drawings are expected to realize 500 000.</i>
respond to	Respond favorably or as hoped.
satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>There was insufficient collateral to satisfy the loan.</i>
succeed in	Attain success or reach a desired goal.



Usage Examples of "Fulfil" as a verb

- *Friends whose ill-timed speed fulfilled my soon-repenting deed.*
- *Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to fulfil themselves.*

- *He wouldn't be able to fulfil his ambition to visit Naples.*
- *Goods must fulfil three basic conditions.*
- *Some officials were dismissed because they could not fulfil their duties.*
- *Customers expect online orders to be fulfilled reliably, quickly, and cheaply.*

- accomplish** Achieve or complete successfully.
*The planes **accomplished** their mission.*
- action** Take action on deal with.
*The rank and file want to call the **action** off.*
- activity** A thermodynamic quantity representing the effective concentration of a particular component in a solution or other system equal to its concentration multiplied by an activity coefficient.
*The level of **activity** declines with age.*

actual	Presently existing in fact and not merely potential or possible. <i>Using actual income to measure expected income.</i>
actuality	The state of existing in reality. <i>A hope that progressed from possibility to actuality.</i>
attain	Find unexpectedly. <i>Dolphins can attain speeds in water which man cannot yet emulate.</i>
bulge	Cause to bulge or swell outwards. <i>The veins in his neck bulged.</i>
content	Make content. <i>Not content with being a hugely successful pop star he now intends to venture into movies.</i>
covenant	Undertake to give a sum of money regularly to charity by means of a covenant. <i>The nations covenanted to fight terrorism around the world.</i>
do	Doctor's degree in osteopathy. <i>I never really got the chance to finish school or do my exams.</i>
fill	Fill or meet a want or need. <i>I filled the bottle with water.</i>
fulfill	Fill, satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
fulfillment	The act of consummating something (a desire or promise etc.)
garnishment	A decoration or embellishment.
gratification	State of being gratified or satisfied. <i>Dull repetitious work gives no gratification.</i>
gratify	Indulge or satisfy (a desire). <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
indulge	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>I don't indulge in idle gossip.</i>
indulging	The act of indulging or gratifying a desire.
meet	A meeting at which a number of athletic contests are held. <i>In the final group match England will meet the Australians.</i>
perform	Give a performance of something. <i>The band will be performing live in Hyde Park.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>What happened to all those firm promises of support.</i>
reliably	In a faithful manner. <i>Few of these paintings can be reliably dated.</i>

replete	Filled or well-supplied with something. <i>I went out into the sun drenched streets again replete and relaxed.</i>
restock	Stock again. <i>He restocked his land with pheasants.</i>
sate	Supply (someone) with as much as or more of something than is desired or can be managed. <i>I am sated.</i>
satisfaction	What is felt to be owed or due to one, especially in reparation of an injustice or wrong. <i>In full and final satisfaction of the claim.</i>
satisfy	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>Social services is trying to satisfy the needs of so many different groups.</i>
sooth	Truth or reality. <i>In sooth.</i>
supplement	Add as a supplement to what seems insufficient. <i>Supplement your diet.</i>
vouch	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>I vouch for the quality of my products.</i>
