fissure	A long, narrow opening or line of breakage made by cracking or splitting, especially in rock or earth. <i>A fissure between philosophy and reality.</i>
gouge	An impression in a surface (as made by a blow).
groove	A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process such as erosion or by a tool as e g a groove in a phonograph record. <i>Her vocals drift delicately across a soaring soul groove.</i>
gutter	A shallow trough fixed beneath the edge of a roof for carrying off rainwater. <i>Men who had fought their way out of the gutter.</i>
hollow	A depression hollowed out of solid matter. <i>He built himself a cabin in a hollow high up in the Appalachians.</i>
indentation	The act of cutting into an edge with toothlike notches or angular incisions. <i>Coastal indentations.</i>
line	Space for one line of print one column wide and 1 14 inch deep used to measure advertising. <i>A nice line of shoes.</i>
rut	A long, deep track made by the repeated passage of the wheels of vehicles. <i>A stretch of road made impassable by ruts holes or waterlogging.</i>
seam	An underground layer of a mineral such as coal or gold. <i>The buried forests became seams of coal.</i>
track	The soundtrack of a film or video. <i>The CD contains early Elvis Presley tracks.</i>
trench	A trench coat. <i>Dig a trench around the perimeter of the fire.</i>
trough	A hollow between two wave crests in the sea. <i>Seasonal peaks and troughs in the demand for goods and services.</i>
wrinkle	A slight line or fold in something, especially fabric or the skin of the face. <i>They finally have the wrinkles pretty well ironed out.</i>

chamfer	Cut a bevel on; shape to a bevel. <i>A neat chamfered edge.</i>
chase	Go after with the intent to catch. <i>She chased him out of the house.</i>
corrugate	Contract or cause to contract into wrinkles or folds. <i>Corrugate iron.</i>
<u>crease</u>	Cause a crease to appear temporarily in the face or its features typically as a result of the expression of an emotion or feeling. <i>He sank into the chair careful not to crease his dinner jacket.</i>

line	Mark or cover with lines. <i>Lined books are more enduring.</i>
pucker	Draw together into folds or puckers. <i>She puckered her lips.</i>
ridge	Form into a ridge. <i>A field ploughed in narrow stretches that are ridged up slightly.</i>
rut	Hollow out in the form of a furrow or groove.
screw up	Defeat someone through trickery or deceit.
scrunch up	Raise.
till	Work land as by ploughing, harrowing, and manuring, in order to make it ready for cultivation. <i>Till the soil.</i>
turn up	Become officially one year older.
work	Give a workout to. <i>Do you want to work after the age of 60.</i>
wrinkle	Gather or contract into wrinkles or folds pucker. <i>The camera focuses on the wrinkled laughter lines around the man s eyes.</i>

cortex	An outer layer of another organ or body part such as a kidney the renal cortex the cerebellum or a hair.
cortical	Relating to or forming an outer layer of tissue immediately below the epidermis of a stem or root. <i>The outline of the kidney is irregular due to cortical scarring.</i>
deep	Relatively deep or strong affecting one deeply. <i>She took a deep breath.</i>
<u>delve</u>	Turn up, loosen, or remove earth. <i>The approach from the surface above had awed her so hugely delved were the tunnels.</i>
dig	The act of digging. <i>The book was in good condition except for a dig in the back cover.</i>
groove	A long narrow furrow cut either by a natural process such as erosion or by a tool as e g a groove in a phonograph record. <i>Groove a vinyl record.</i>
harrow	Draw a harrow over land. <i>They ploughed and harrowed the heavy clay.</i>
lesion	A region in an organ or tissue which has suffered damage through injury or disease, such as a wound, ulcer, abscess, or tumour.
necrosis	The death of most or all of the cells in an organ or tissue due to disease, injury, or failure of the blood supply.
<u>nerve</u>	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>She nerved herself to enter the room.</i>
neural	Of or relating to the nervous system. <i>Neural network.</i>
neuron	A specialized cell transmitting nerve impulses; a nerve cell.
parietal	Of or relating to or associated with the parietal bones in the cranium. <i>The parietal cortex.</i>
<u>passage</u>	Subject a strain of microorganisms or cells to a passage. <i>Each recombinant virus was passaged nine times successively.</i>
phloem	Tissue that conducts synthesized food substances (e.g., from leaves) to parts where needed; consists primarily of sieve tubes.

plow	Move in a way resembling that of a plow cutting into or going through the soil. <i>Farmer Jones plowed his east field last week.</i>
seed	Sow land with seeds. <i>Mulches encourage many plants to seed freely.</i>
sensorimotor	(of nerves or their actions) having or involving both sensory and motor functions or pathways.
shovel	A machine or part of a machine having a shape or function similar to that of a shovel. <i>He shovelled in the backyard all afternoon long.</i>
skull	Hit (someone) on the head. <i>He broke his collar bone and fractured his skull.</i>
synapse	A junction between two nerve cells, consisting of a minute gap across which impulses pass by diffusion of a neurotransmitter. <i>Nerve impulses cross a synapse through the action of neurotransmitters.</i>
