Definitions of "Furthermore" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “furthermore” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In addition.*
- *In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument).*

Synonyms of "Furthermore" as an adverb (11 Words)

additionally	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
also	In addition. <i>Also a car is very expensive to run.</i>
as well	To the same degree (often followed by `as).
besides	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more besides.</i>
by the same token	So as to pass a given point.
further	In addition or furthermore. <i>Before going any further we need to define our terms.</i>

in addition	To or toward the inside of.
moreover	As a further matter; besides. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
over and above that	Beyond the top or upper surface or edge; forward from an upright position.
too	In addition. <i>Is he coming too.</i>
what's more	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.

Usage Examples of "Furthermore" as an adverb

- *Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time; furthermore, their quality is improving.*
- *It was also a highly desirable political end. Furthermore, it gave the English a door into France.*

addition	A person or thing added or joined. <i>The addition of cinnamon improved the flavor.</i>
additionally	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>He serves additionally as the CEO.</i>
also	In addition. <i>Dyslexia also known as word blindness.</i>
anyhow	Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement. <i>Two suitcases flung anyhow.</i>
anyway	Used in questions to emphasize the speaker's wish to obtain the truth. <i>I don't know what happened to it anyway it's gone.</i>
besides	In addition. <i>I don't want to go to a restaurant besides we can't afford it.</i>
either	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like 'likewise' or 'also.'
exceedingly	Extremely. <i>The supply multiplied exceedingly.</i>
excessive	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>

excessively	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>Excessively high taxes.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Need extra help.</i>
extremely	To an extreme degree. <i>Extremely unpleasant.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate spending.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
instead	On the contrary. <i>She never married preferring instead to remain single.</i>
intemperate	Excessive in behavior. <i>Intemperate outbursts concerning global conspiracies.</i>
<u>likewise</u>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age likewise the attainment targets.</i>
more	Moreover. <i>More quickly.</i>
<u>moreover</u>	In addition. <i>Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
<u>over</u>	Over the entire area. <i>He leant over and tapped me on the hand.</i>
<u>overly</u>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
<u>probably</u>	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence. <i>He is probably out of the country.</i>
prolix	(of speech or writing) using or containing too many words; tediously lengthy. <i>A prolix lecturer telling you more than you want to know.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>Do you really expect me to believe that.</i>
similarly	In a similar way. <i>A similarly priced property.</i>
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.

superfluous	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for superfluous information.</i>
<u>too</u>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>You re too kind.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances. <i>His dress stops just short of undue elegance.</i>
<u>whatever</u>	At all; of any kind (used for emphasis). <i>We told him we d back him whatever.</i>
