### Definitions of "Furthermore" as an adverb

- *In addition.*
- *In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument).*

### Synonyms of "Furthermore" as an adverb (11 Words)

<b>additionally</b>	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>Brokers finance themselves <b>additionally</b> by short term borrowing.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition. <i><b>Also</b> a car is very expensive to run.</i>
<b>as well</b>	To the same degree (often followed by `as).
<b><a href="#">besides</a></b>	Making an additional point; anyway. <i>I m capable of doing the work and a lot more <b>besides</b>.</i>
<b>by the same token</b>	So as to pass a given point.
<b><a href="#">further</a></b>	In addition or furthermore. <i>Before going any <b>further</b> we need to define our terms.</i>

<b>in addition</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>moreover</b>	As a further matter; besides. <i>Moreover</i> statistics show that competition for places is growing.
<b>over and above that</b>	Beyond the top or upper surface or edge; forward from an upright position.
<b>too</b>	In addition. <i>Is he coming too.</i>
<b>what's more</b>	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.

## Usage Examples of "Furthermore" as an adverb

- *Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time; furthermore, their quality is improving.*
- *It was also a highly desirable political end. Furthermore, it gave the English a door into France.*

## Associations of "Furthermore" (30 Words)

<b>addition</b>	A person or thing added or joined. <i>The <b>addition</b> of cinnamon improved the flavor.</i>
<b>additionally</b>	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>He serves <b>additionally</b> as the CEO.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition. <i>Dyslexia <b>also</b> known as word blindness.</i>
<b>anyhow</b>	Used to indicate that a statement explains or supports a previous statement. <i>Two suitcases flung <b>anyhow</b>.</i>
<b>anyway</b>	Used in questions to emphasize the speaker's wish to obtain the truth. <i>I don't know what happened to it <b>anyway</b> it's gone.</i>
<b>besides</b>	In addition. <i>I don't want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can't afford it.</i>
<b>either</b>	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like 'likewise' or 'also.'
<b>exceedingly</b>	Extremely. <i>The supply multiplied <b>exceedingly</b>.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	More than is necessary, normal, or desirable; immoderate. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>

<b>excessively</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Need <b>extra</b> help.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To an extreme degree. <i><b>Extremely</b> unpleasant.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> spending.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>instead</b>	On the contrary. <i>She never married preferring <b>instead</b> to remain single.</i>
<b>intemperate</b>	Excessive in behavior. <i><b>Intemperate</b> outbursts concerning global conspiracies.</i>
<b><u>likewise</u></b>	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age <b>likewise</b> the attainment targets.</i>
<b>more</b>	Moreover. <i><b>More</b> quickly.</i>
<b><u>moreover</u></b>	In addition. <i><b>Moreover</b> statistics show that competition for places is growing.</i>
<b><u>over</u></b>	Over the entire area. <i>He leant <b>over</b> and tapped me on the hand.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b><u>probably</u></b>	Easy to believe on the basis of available evidence. <i>He is <b>probably</b> out of the country.</i>
<b>prolix</b>	(of speech or writing) using or containing too many words; tediously lengthy. <i>A <b>prolix</b> lecturer telling you more than you want to know.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>Do you <b>really</b> expect me to believe that.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	In a similar way. <i>A <b>similarly</b> priced property.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.

<b>superfluous</b>	More than is needed, desired, or required. <i>The purchaser should avoid asking for <b>superfluous</b> information.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>You re <b>too</b> kind.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Not appropriate or proper (or even legal) in the circumstances. <i>His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.</i>
<b><u>whatever</u></b>	At all; of any kind (used for emphasis). <i>We told him we d back him <b>whatever</b>.</i>
