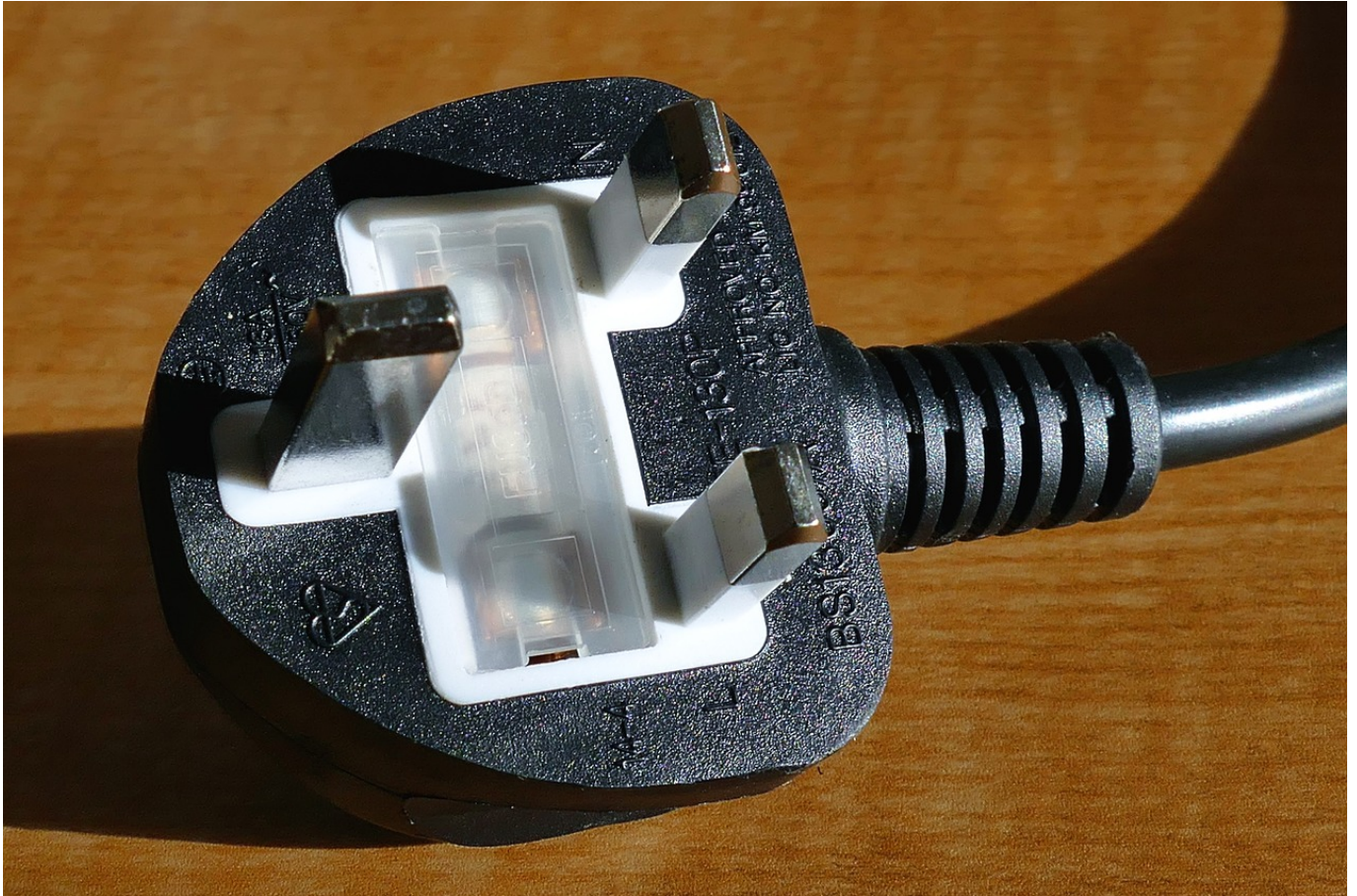

### Definitions of "Fuse" as a noun

- *A safety device consisting of a strip of wire that melts and breaks an electric circuit if the current exceeds a safe level.*
- *Any igniter that is used to initiate the burning of a propellant.*
- *An electrical device that can interrupt the flow of electrical current when it is overloaded.*



## Synonyms of "Fuse" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>circuit breaker</b>	The boundary line encompassing an area or object.
<b>fusee</b>	A railway signal flare.
<b>fuze</b>	Any igniter that is used to initiate the burning of a propellant.

<b>primer</b>	A small pump for pumping fuel to prime an internal combustion engine, especially in an aircraft. <i>No more than four pumps of the <b>primer</b> usually suffice.</i>

### Definitions of "Fuse" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "fuse" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Melt (a material or object) with intense heat so as to join it with something else.*
- *Equip with a fuse; provide with a fuse.*
- *Make liquid or plastic by heating.*

- *Join or blend to form a single entity.*
- *Become plastic or fluid or liquefied from heat.*
- *Cause (an electrical appliance) to stop working when a fuse melts.*
- *Mix together different elements.*
- *(of groups of atoms or cellular structures) join or coalesce.*
- *Provide (a circuit or electrical appliance) with a fuse.*
- *(of an electrical appliance) stop working when a fuse melts.*

<b>commingle</b>	Mix or blend. <i>The part of the brain where the senses <b>commingle</b>.</i>
<b><u>conflate</u></b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The urban crisis <b>conflates</b> a number of different economic political and social issues.</i>
<b><u>flux</u></b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
<b>immix</b>	Mix together different elements.
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The protest forced the bus companies to <b>integrate</b> the buses.</i>
<b>intermingle</b>	Mix or mingle together. <i>Riesling grapes were always <b>intermingled</b> with other varieties.</i>
<b>intermix</b>	Mix together. <i>Along its southern edge low trees <b>intermix</b> with the shrubs.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i><b>Join</b> up the points in a different colour.</i>
<b><u>meld</u></b>	Mix together different elements. <i>Australia s winemakers have <b>melded</b> modern science with traditional art.</i>

<b>merge</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>He placed a sheet of paper over the fresh paint to <b>merge</b> the colours.</i>
<b>mingle</b>	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>A chance to <b>mingle</b> with celebs.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>Keith <b>mixes</b> great house music featuring tunes with an African Latin and soulful flavour.</i>
<b>put together</b>	Adapt.
<b>short-circuit</b>	Create a short circuit in.
<b>solder</b>	Join with solder. <i><b>Solder</b> these two pipes together.</i>
<b>stick</b>	Stick to firmly. <i><b>Stick</b> the photo onto the corkboard.</i>
<b>stop working</b>	Put an end to a state or an activity.
<b>synthesize</b>	Make (something) by synthesis, especially chemically. <i>His operas <b>synthesize</b> music and drama in perfect harmony.</i>
<b>trip</b>	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>Somebody <b>tripped</b> the alarm.</i>
<b>weld</b>	Forge an article by welding. <i>Steel plates were being <b>welded</b>.</i>

- *He will fuse the entire lighting system of the camp.*
- *The substances fused at a very high temperature.*
- *The storm fused the electric mains.*
- *Intermarriage had fused the families into a large unit.*
- *Powdered glass was fused to a metal base.*
- *The two nuclei move together and fuse into one nucleus.*
- *There is no need to fuse the circuit any higher unless there is other equipment on the same circuit.*

- breaker** A break dancer.

- commingle** Mix together different elements.  
*His book **commingles** sarcasm and sadness.*
- conflate** Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one.  
*The urban crisis **conflates** a number of different economic political and social issues.*
- defrost** (of a refrigerator or freezer) become free of accumulated ice, usually by being turned off for a period.  
*She opened the door to let the fridge **defrost**.*

<b>dilution</b>	Weakening (reducing the concentration) by the addition of water or a thinner. <i>He is resisting any <b>dilution</b> of dogma.</i>
<b>disconnect</b>	Make disconnected disjoin or unfasten. <i>If customers agree a payment plan they will not be <b>disconnected</b>.</i>
<b>fluid</b>	A substance that is fluid at room temperature and pressure. <i>The <b>fluid</b> motion of a cat.</i>
<b>flux</b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The <b>flux</b> of ions across the membrane.</i>
<b>furnace</b>	Used to describe a very hot place. <i>Her car was a <b>furnace</b>.</i>
<b>fusible</b>	Capable of being melted and fused.
<b>heat</b>	A single operation of heating something especially metal in a furnace. <i>Winners of the regional <b>heats</b>.</i>
<b>helium</b>	The chemical element of atomic number 2, an inert gas which is the lightest member of the noble gas series.
<b>ice</b>	A rink with a floor of ice for ice hockey or ice skating. <i>She scraped the <b>ice</b> off the windscreen.</i>
<b>iceberg</b>	A large mass of ice floating at sea; usually broken off of a polar glacier. <i><b>Iceberg</b> is still the most popular lettuce.</i>
<b>iconoclast</b>	A Puritan of the 16th or 17th century.
<b>liquefaction</b>	The conversion of a solid or a gas into a liquid. <i>A gas <b>liquefaction</b> plant.</i>
<b>liquefy</b>	Become liquid. <i><b>Liquefy</b> the silver.</i>
<b>meld</b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A <b>meld</b> of many contributions.</i>
<b>melt</b>	Metal or other material in a melted condition. <i><b>Melt</b> butter.</i>
<b>merge</b>	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>He crouched low and endeavoured to <b>merge</b> into the darkness of the forest.</i>
<b>meter</b>	Stamp with a meter indicating the postage. <i><b>Meter</b> the flow of water.</i>
<b>mix</b>	The act of mixing together. <i>The decor is a fascinating <b>mix</b> of antique and modern.</i>
<b>soluble</b>	(of a substance) capable of being dissolved in some solvent (usually water). <i>The puzzle is <b>soluble</b>.</i>

<b>thaw</b>	A period of warmer weather that thaws ice and snow. <i>The <b>thaw</b> came yesterday afternoon.</i>
<b>thawing</b>	The process whereby heat changes something from a solid to a liquid. <i>The <b>thawing</b> of a frozen turkey takes several hours.</i>
<u><b>viscosity</b></u>	Resistance of a liquid to shear forces (and hence to flow). <i>Cooling the fluid raises its <b>viscosity</b>.</i>
<b>weld</b>	A welded joint. <i>Cross curricular themes would <b>weld</b> the curriculum together.</i>
<b>welding</b>	Fastening two pieces of metal together by softening with heat and applying pressure.
