Definitions of "Fuse" as a verb


According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "fuse" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Melt (a material or object) with intense heat so as to join it with something else.*
- *Equip with a fuse; provide with a fuse.*
- Make liquid or plastic by heating.



- Join or blend to form a single entity.
- Become plastic or fluid or liquefied from heat.
- Cause (an electrical appliance) to stop working when a fuse melts.
- Mix together different elements.
- (of groups of atoms or cellular structures) join or coalesce.
- Provide (a circuit or electrical appliance) with a fuse.
- (of an electrical appliance) stop working when a fuse melts.






Usage Examples of "Fuse" as a verb

- The crew were left in darkness after the lights fused.
- When fired in a special kiln, the metals fused on to the pot.
- Attempts to fuse nuclei together.
- *He will fuse the entire lighting system of the camp.*
- The substances fused at a very high temperature.
- The storm fused the electric mains.
- Intermarriage had fused the families into a large unit.
- Powdered glass was fused to a metal base.
- The two nuclei move together and fuse into one nucleus.
- There is no need to fuse the circuit any higher unless there is other equipment on the same circuit.
