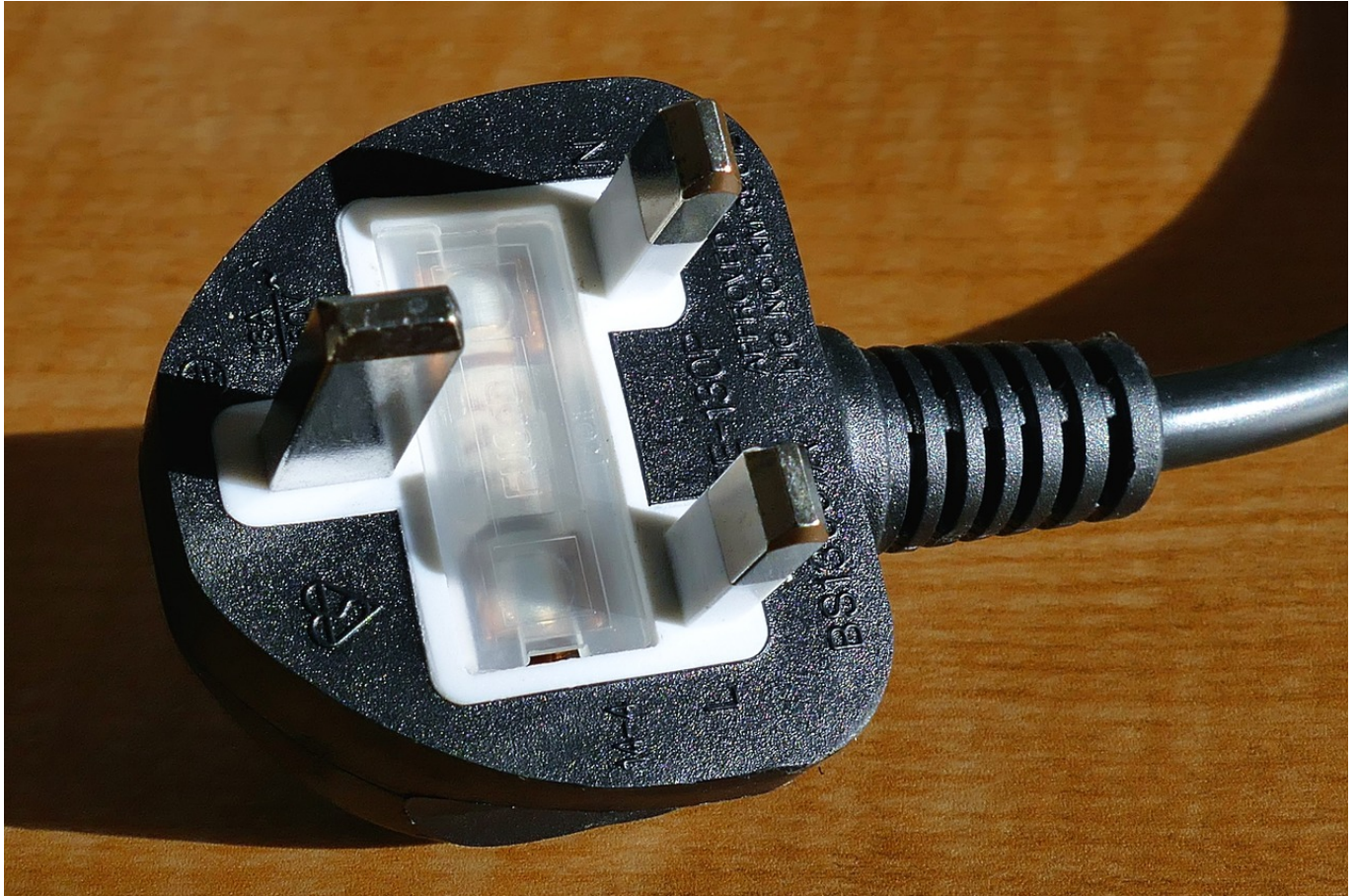

- *A safety device consisting of a strip of wire that melts and breaks an electric circuit if the current exceeds a safe level.*
- *Any igniter that is used to initiate the burning of a propellant.*
- *An electrical device that can interrupt the flow of electrical current when it is overloaded.*

circuit breaker	The boundary line encompassing an area or object.
fusee	A railway signal flare.
fuze	Any igniter that is used to initiate the burning of a propellant.
fuzee	A colored flare used as a warning signal by trucks and trains.
primer	A small pump for pumping fuel to prime an internal combustion engine, especially in an aircraft. <i>No more than four pumps of the primer usually suffice.</i>
priming	The second canonical hour; about 6 a.m. <i>He checked the priming of his gun.</i>
residual current device	A payment that is made to a performer or writer or director of a television show or commercial that is paid for every repeat showing.
safety fuse	A score in American football; a player is tackled behind his own goal line.

Definitions of "Fuse" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "fuse" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Melt (a material or object) with intense heat so as to join it with something else.*
- *Equip with a fuse; provide with a fuse.*
- *Make liquid or plastic by heating.*

- *Join or blend to form a single entity.*
- *Become plastic or fluid or liquefied from heat.*
- *Cause (an electrical appliance) to stop working when a fuse melts.*
- *Mix together different elements.*
- *(of groups of atoms or cellular structures) join or coalesce.*
- *Provide (a circuit or electrical appliance) with a fuse.*
- *(of an electrical appliance) stop working when a fuse melts.*

blend	Blend or harmonize. <i>I blend basic information for the novice with some scientific gardening for the more experienced.</i>

<u>flux</u>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
immix	Mix together different elements.
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>The protest forced the bus companies to integrate the buses.</i>
intermingle	Mix or mingle together. <i>Riesling grapes were always intermingled with other varieties.</i>
intermix	Mix together. <i>Along its southern edge low trees intermix with the shrubs.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>Join up the points in a different colour.</i>
<u>meld</u>	Mix together different elements. <i>Australia s winemakers have melded modern science with traditional art.</i>

merge	Mix together different elements. <i>He placed a sheet of paper over the fresh paint to merge the colours.</i>
mingle	Move among and engage with others at a social function. <i>A chance to mingle with celebs.</i>
mix	Mix together different elements. <i>Keith mixes great house music featuring tunes with an African Latin and soulful flavour.</i>
put together	Adapt.
short-circuit	Create a short circuit in.
solder	Join with solder. <i>Solder these two pipes together.</i>
stick	Stick to firmly. <i>Stick the photo onto the corkboard.</i>
stop working	Put an end to a state or an activity.
synthesize	Make (something) by synthesis, especially chemically. <i>His operas synthesize music and drama in perfect harmony.</i>
trip	Make a trip for pleasure. <i>Somebody tripped the alarm.</i>
weld	Forge an article by welding. <i>Steel plates were being welded.</i>



Usage Examples of "Fuse" as a verb

- *The crew were left in darkness after the lights fused.*
- *When fired in a special kiln, the metals fused on to the pot.*
- *Attempts to fuse nuclei together.*
- *He will fuse the entire lighting system of the camp.*
- *The substances fused at a very high temperature.*
- *The storm fused the electric mains.*
- *Intermarriage had fused the families into a large unit.*
- *Powdered glass was fused to a metal base.*
- *The two nuclei move together and fuse into one nucleus.*
- *There is no need to fuse the circuit any higher unless there is other equipment on the same circuit.*

- breaker** A break dancer.
*Those steam engines were now gone to the **breaker** s yard.*
- commingle** Mix together different elements.
*His book **commingles** sarcasm and sadness.*
- conflate** Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one.
*The urban crisis **conflates** a number of different economic political and social issues.*
- defrost** (of a refrigerator or freezer) become free of accumulated ice, usually by being turned off for a period.
*She opened the door to let the fridge **defrost**.*

dilution	Weakening (reducing the concentration) by the addition of water or a thinner. <i>He is resisting any dilution of dogma.</i>
disconnect	Make disconnected disjoin or unfasten. <i>If customers agree a payment plan they will not be disconnected.</i>
fluid	A substance that is fluid at room temperature and pressure. <i>The fluid motion of a cat.</i>
flux	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The flux of ions across the membrane.</i>
furnace	Used to describe a very hot place. <i>Her car was a furnace.</i>
fusible	Capable of being melted and fused.
heat	A single operation of heating something especially metal in a furnace. <i>Winners of the regional heats.</i>
helium	The chemical element of atomic number 2, an inert gas which is the lightest member of the noble gas series.
ice	A rink with a floor of ice for ice hockey or ice skating. <i>She scraped the ice off the windscreen.</i>
iceberg	A large mass of ice floating at sea; usually broken off of a polar glacier. <i>Iceberg is still the most popular lettuce.</i>
iconoclast	A Puritan of the 16th or 17th century.
liquefaction	The conversion of a solid or a gas into a liquid. <i>A gas liquefaction plant.</i>
liquefy	Become liquid. <i>Liquefy the silver.</i>
meld	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A meld of many contributions.</i>
melt	Metal or other material in a melted condition. <i>Melt butter.</i>
merge	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>He crouched low and endeavoured to merge into the darkness of the forest.</i>
meter	Stamp with a meter indicating the postage. <i>Meter the flow of water.</i>
mix	The act of mixing together. <i>The decor is a fascinating mix of antique and modern.</i>
soluble	(of a substance) capable of being dissolved in some solvent (usually water). <i>The puzzle is soluble.</i>

thaw	A period of warmer weather that thaws ice and snow. <i>The thaw came yesterday afternoon.</i>
thawing	The process whereby heat changes something from a solid to a liquid. <i>The thawing of a frozen turkey takes several hours.</i>
<u>viscosity</u>	Resistance of a liquid to shear forces (and hence to flow). <i>Cooling the fluid raises its viscosity.</i>
weld	A welded joint. <i>Cross curricular themes would weld the curriculum together.</i>
welding	Fastening two pieces of metal together by softening with heat and applying pressure.
