- *Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization.*
- *The merging of adjacent sounds or syllables or words.*
- *Music that is a mixture of different styles, especially jazz and rock.*
- *The state of being combined into one body.*
- *Referring to food or cooking which incorporates elements of both Eastern and Western cuisine.*
- *A nuclear reaction in which nuclei combine to form more massive nuclei with the simultaneous release of energy.*
- *The act of fusing (or melting) together.*
- *The combining of images from the two eyes to form a single visual percept.*
- *An occurrence that involves the production of a union.*
- *The process of causing a material or object to melt with intense heat so as to join with another.*

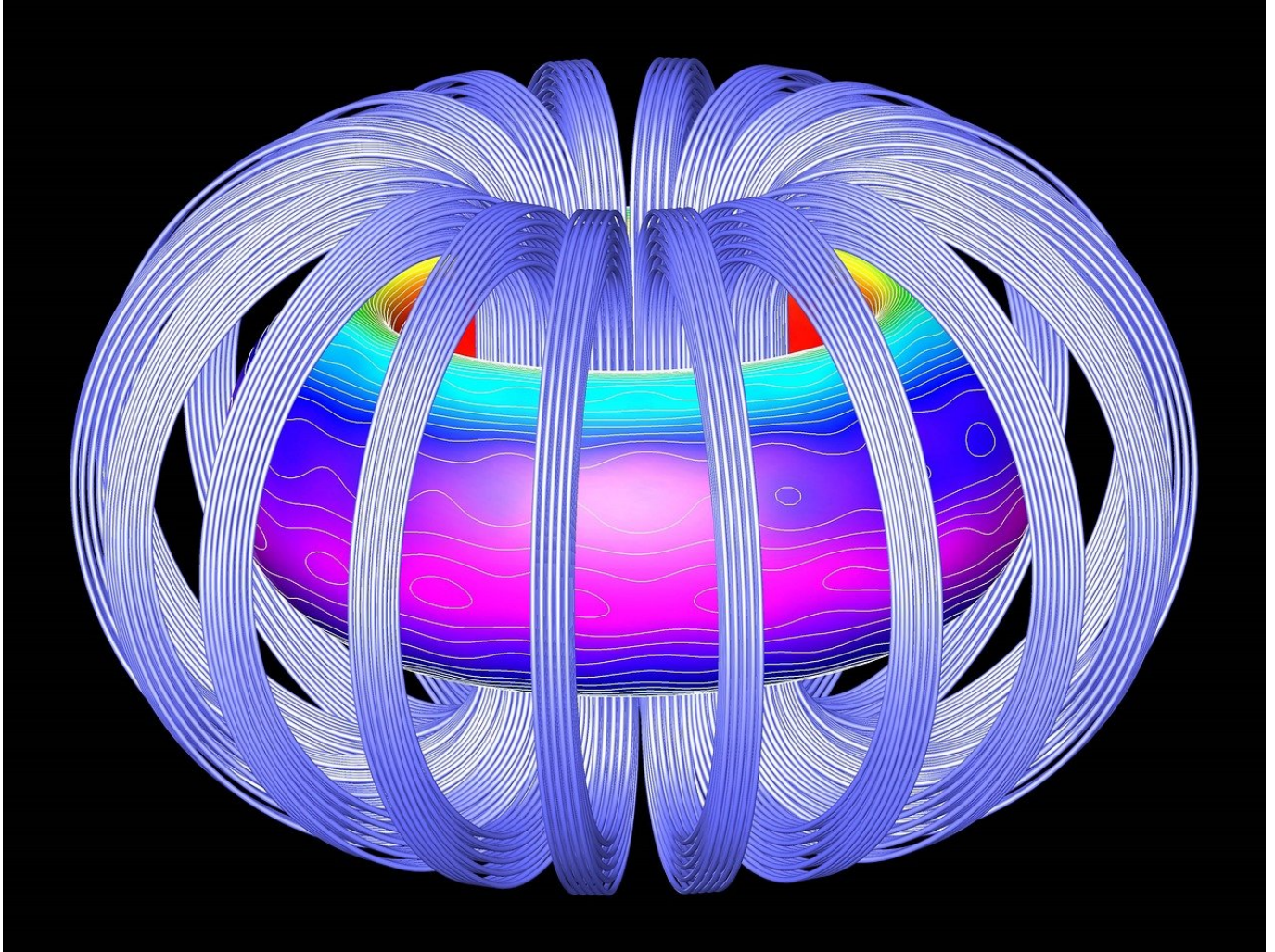
- *The process or result of joining two or more things together to form a single entity.*

blend	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Smog is a blend of smoke and fog.</i>

<u>dissolution</u>	The action of formally ending or dismissing an assembly, partnership, or official body. <i>The dissolution of their marriage.</i>
dissolving	A gradual transition from one scene to the next; the next scene is gradually superimposed as the former scene fades out. <i>The dissolving of salt in water.</i>
integration	The process by which a well-balanced psyche becomes whole as the developing ego organizes the id, and the state which results or which treatment seeks to create by countering the fragmenting effect of defence mechanisms. <i>Integration of individual countries into trading blocs.</i>
intermixture	The mixing together of different things. <i>The increasing intermixture of different communities.</i>
joining	The act of bringing two things into contact (especially for communication). <i>The joining of hands around the table.</i>
liquefaction	The conversion of a solid or a gas into a liquid. <i>Helium can be obtained from the liquefaction of natural gas.</i>
melting	The action or process of liquefying due to heat. <i>The melting of the polar ice caps can cause floods.</i>

merger	The merging of one estate or title in another. <i>Local companies ripe for merger or acquisition.</i>
merging	The act of joining together as one. <i>The merging of the two groups occurred quickly.</i>
mingling	The action of people mingling and coming into contact. <i>All the random mingling and idle talk made him hate literary parties.</i>
smelting	Small trout-like silvery marine or freshwater food fishes of cold northern waters. <i>Tin smelting.</i>
spinal fusion	The combining of images from the two eyes to form a single visual percept.
synthesis	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect). <i>The synthesis of methanol from carbon monoxide and hydrogen.</i>
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>There were conversations about unification between the Church of England and the Methodist Church.</i>

coeducation	Education of men and women in the same institutions.
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Combine resources.</i>
combined	Made or joined or united into one.
commingle	Mix or blend. <i>His book commingles sarcasm and sadness.</i>
consolidation	Combining into a solid mass. <i>He dropped the consolidation into the acid bath.</i>

thermonuclear	Relating to or involving weapons in which explosive force is produced by thermonuclear reactions. <i>Thermonuclear war.</i>
unification	An occurrence that involves the production of a union. <i>The costs of German unification.</i>
<u>unify</u>	Join or combine. <i>Opposition groups struggling to unify around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
